Board Of Education To Retain Kindergarten Classes

PRICE FIVE CENTS

At a recent meeting of the Madison Township Board of Education it was voted that Kindergarten Classes be retained in the school system. The approval followed a report from Dr. William Sample, Superintendent of Schools which read in part as follows: As an educator it is important for me to make a statement relative to kindergartens. Kindergarten is an integral part of the educational system. Kinder-

gartens have their own educational functions to perform, providing for the physical, mental, social and emtional development of a five year old child. They provide for growth in desirable habits, attitudes and skills which are needed for present and future development. They provide a readiness for the next level of the elementary school through a wide variety of carefully planned experiences. The child enters kindergarten

from the home where he has been dependent upon adults, and is helped through guided work and play activities to learn to adjust to a social group. Throughout the United States, teachers' colleges prepare teachers for position in Early Childhood Education. Certainly the value of kindergarten is recognized universally.

Specifically, if kindergartens were eliminated in Schools #18, #19, and #20, four rooms would become available. In Miller School one room would be freed. In Southwood (Jewish Community Center), one room; in Voorhees, one room; and Madison Park, one room; at Whited Brown (Cheesequake Fire House), one room; and at Memorial one room, would become available. All third grades would be on full session and at Memorial School the educable children would remain on all-day session with a finer facility being made available to them then previously, with provisions for their own toilet and drinking fountain facilities. The third grade being transported from Central Park to Memorial, under this plan would be returned to Whited Brown for a full session. It is with mixed feelings that one considers the alternatives. As an educator I feel each to be a most unsatisfactory solution. It is difficult to believe that the denial of what we in this land consider a reasonable right of every youngster to an education, is the only solution to the educational problem we face here. It appears that a school system can not hope for attainments beyond the aspirations, appreciations and understanding of the people comprising the school

here is indeed a serious matter. Since the Board of Education is faced with a situation which will become progressively worse over the next several years, it seems that retention of the kindergarten as an integral part of the modern school program is to be preferred to their elimination from the educational structure of the community, However, if

However, I am fully cognizant of the reasons for the request for this report and I appreciate the concern of the Board of Education to forestall double sessions entirely throughout all grade levels in the elementary and secondary schools. It is true that if double sessions are to be extended throughout the system, education in the township would suffer a further setback, hence the problem presented here becomes one of comparable values: (1) to continue to provide, FOR THE SCHOOL TERM 1962-63, schooling opportunities for kindergarten-age children, (numbering approximately 1,000 per year), at the expense of double sessions through the township in grades one, two and three, inclusive; or (2 by the complete elimination of kindergarten throughout the township, to permit all third grade children throughout the township to be placed on all-day sessions, thus restricting double sessions to

Not Half Day Session---But Rather "Platoon System"

Dr. William Sample, Madison Township Superintendent of Schools at a recent meeting of the Board of Education issued a report favoring the retention of Kindergarten in the local school system.

Dr. Sample's report to the Board points out the "crying need" for CLASSROOMS in Our Town. Note we say "classrooms" NOT JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS!

According to the report of the Superintendent of Schools all classes on half day sessions are well below the sixth grade. Why does the Board of Education insist that we build JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS if the severe shortage of rooms is in the Kindergarten and lower grades.

We believe that the most important period of education for a youngster is in the primary grades. It is during this period that use the information politically. dislike or like of school is formulated in the minds of the youngsters. The Board of Education has continually used the term of "half duplicate and also the suggestion day' sessions. We wonder if the Board of Education has ever heard of the "Platoon System"? This today, is used in many of our high schools, colleges and universities. The "Platoon System" offers the student a full day of study complete with lunch period and other recreational activities. We feel that additional pupils could be accomodated in the Madison Township High School if the "Platoon System" was used. When a youngster is taking gym, chemistry, typing or industrial arts he is not sitting in any classroom taking up space. When the student is attending lunch or auditorium activities he is not in a classroom. We feel that the High School Principal, Mr. Kenneth Smida should further investigate the "Platoon System", it seems to work in other school systems. Why can't it work in Madison Township? Let's concentrate on the building of a sound elementary school program. The construction and furnishing of a elementary or grammar school can be expedited much sooner than the construction and furnishing of a Junior High School. Let's BUILD THE NEEDED CLASSROOMS, today.



Rabbi and Mrs. Silberman will be in residence as of the 1st of August, at 6 Southwood Drive, Old Bridge.




The Middlesex County American Legion and Auxiliary Convention convened at the Jamesburg Legion Hall on July 13th and 14th.





A Step Into the Future





Board Of Education To Retain Kindergarten Classes

At a recent meeting of the Madison Township Board of Education it was voted that Kindergarten Classes be retained in the school system. The approval followed a report from Dr. William Sample, Superintendent of Schools which read in part as follows: As an educator it is important for me to make a statement relative to kindergartens. Kindergarten is an integral part of the educational system. Kinder-

gartens have their own educational functions to perform, providing for the physical, mental, social and emtional development of a five year old child. They provide for growth in desirable habits, attitudes and skills which are needed for present and future development. They provide a readiness for the next level of the elementary school through a wide variety of carefully planned experiences. The child enters kindergarten from the home where he has been dependent upon adults, and is helped through guided work and play activities to learn to adjust to a social group. Throughout the United States, teachers' colleges prepare teachers for position in Early Childhood Education. Certainly the value of kindergarten is recognized universally.

Specifically, if kindergartens were eliminated in Schools #18, #19, and #20, four rooms would become available. In Miller School one room would be freed. In Southwood (Jewish Community Center), one room; in Voorhees, one room; and Madison Park, one room; at Whited Brown (Cheesequake Fire House), one room; and at Memorial one room, would become available. All third grades would be on full session and at Memorial School the educable children would remain on all-day session with a finer facility being made available to them then previously, with provisions for their own toilet and drinking fountain facilities. The third grade being transported from Central Park to Memorial, under this plan would be returned to Whited Brown for a full session. It is with mixed feelings that one considers the alternatives. As an educator I feel each to be a most unsatisfactory solution. It is difficult to believe that the denial of what we in this land consider a reasonable right of every youngster to an education, is the only solution to the educational problem we face here. It appears that a school system can not hope for attainments beyond the aspirations, appreciahere is indeed a serious matter. Since the Board of Education is faced with a situation which will become progressively worse over the next several years, it seems that retention of the kindergarten as an integral part of the modern school program is to be preferred to their elimination from the educational structure of the community. 

Not Half Day Session---But Rather "Platoon System"

Dr. William Sample, Madison Township Superintendent of Schools at a recent meeting of the Board of Education issued a report favoring the retention of Kindergarten in the local school system.

Dr. Sample's report to the Board points out the "crying need" for CLASSROOMS in Our Town. Note we say "classrooms" NOT JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS!

According to the report of the Superintendent of Schools all classes on half day sessions are well below the sixth grade. Why does the Board of Education insist that we build JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS if the severe shortage of rooms is in the Kindergarten and lower grades.

We believe that the most important period of education for a youngster is in the primary grades. It is during this period that dislike or like of school is formulated in the minds of the youngsters. The Board of Education has continually used the term of "half day'' sessions. We wonder if the Board of Education has ever heard of the "Platoon System"? This today, is used in many of our high schools, colleges and universities. The "Platoon System" offers the student a full day of study complete with lunch period and other recreational activities. We feel that additional pupils could be accomodated in the Madison Township High School if the "Platoon System" was used. When a youngster is taking gym, chemistry, typing or industrial arts he is not sitting in any classroom taking up space. When the student is attending lunch or auditorium activities he is not in a classroom. We feel that the High School Principal, Mr. Kenneth Smida should further investigate the "Platoon System", it seems to work in other school systems. Why can't it work in Madison Township? Let's concentrate on the building of a sound elementary school program. The construction and furnishing of a elementary or grammar school can be expedited much sooner than the construction and furnishing of a Junior High School. 
Doing A First Class Job For Last Class Pay




