There are over 1,000 pupils attending parochial school in Madison Township, Perth Amboy.

Transportation of pupils to and from private schools is covered under State Statute 18;14-8. Provision has been made by the State Board of Education to supply 75% of the cost of such transportation.

Parents of youngsters attending private and parochial schools must provide their own tuition fees if any are involved. The parents must also pay all local

Several years ago a similar problem came up in the City of Perth Amboy when Town officials in an economy move voted to suspend bus transportation for parochial schools. The parochial schools responded to the issue by temporarily shutting down their school operations and informed the Board of Education that they would have to take care of the additional pupil load.



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
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WITH CAUTION

Boice Warns Of "Winter Driving Conditions"

"spring-like" Despite the weather enjoyed by residents of Madison Township earlier this week Chief Charles Boice of the Madison Township Police Department issued a warning that cold weather will soon be on it's way and motorists must now begin to prepare for winter driving before the first snowfall.

The Madison Police head stated that the individual motorist can help to reduce driving hazards by following the tips on winter driving contained in a folder which can be obtained from the New Jersey State Highway Department.

Boice said follow the simple requests and it will definitely keep you from becoming a casualty because of weather conditions.

Before cold weather sets in, make certain your car and all of its accessories are ready for the winter season. See to it that

mechanical condition and that your brakes are evenly balanced.

Check to see that you have good tread on your front tires and mount snow tires on your rear wheels.

Put a set of tire chains and a couple of warning flares into your car trunk.

Make sure that there is sufficient anti-freeze in the radiator and that your car heater and windshield defroster operate effectively.

Put a small plastic ice-scraper in your glove compartment and check the windshield wipers to be sure that they operate properly and that the blades don't streak. If they streak, replace them.

If your car is equipped with windshield washers, double check to see that they are operating properly and that the resevoir contains the proper fluid mixture.

When snow or ice is expected, your braking system is in good | don't drive unless it is absolutely

necessary. However, if you must drive, fill your gas tank at the first opportunity and keep it as nearly full as possible.

Put a bucket or bag of sand and a shovel in your car trunk. During a snowfall or immediately thereafter when roads

are relatively hazardous, there are many things that you can do to increase your personal safety factor.

Don't wait until you are stuck to put emergency chains over your regular or snow tires.

Make a habit of driving

smoothly. Don't try to accelerate rapidly, and take curves and corners with extreme caution.

Drive well in back of the car ahead so you'll have plenty of room for stopping. Be alert in anticipating stops, applying your brakes sparingly and in small doses -- don't hit them hard, you'll only skid and probably lose control of your vehicle.

If you approach a traffic tie-up, don't attempt to cut across center islands or go in the wrong direction on one-way streets or ramps - stay in line.

Listen to road condition reports on your car radio. You may be able to avoid routes that are in a poor or congested condi-

One cardinal rule that would be to your advantage, as well as ours, would be to give snow

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plows and sand spreading trucks the right-of-way. They are trying to help you.

If you should be stopped for what might appear to be an ex-tended period, make every effort to conserve your gasoline supply and your battery. You can do this simply by shutting off your accessories and cutting the motor. Use a blanket to keep warm and unless you feel it is absolutely necessary, don't abandon your vehicle. Above all, cooperate fully with the local police and road maintenance crews who are working to clear the roads and to keep you safe.

Census Bureau To Conduct Health Survey In County

A number of residents of this county who were born in Great Britain or Norway will receive in the mail late this week a questionnaire from the U. S. Census Bureau as part of a Survey of Health Characteristics which that agency is con-ducting for the United States Public Health Service.

The purpose of the survey is to provide information for use in studying health problems involving diseases of the heart and lungs. Questions will be asked to determine if persons born in Great Britain and Norway are less or more likely to have these diseases than persons born in the United States, and whether these diseases have any relation to the places people have lived, kinds of work they have done, and similar factors. The collection of information rom British-Americans and Norwegian-Americans will permit comparisons with results of studies of persons now living in Great Britain and Norway, countries with different climates and living conditions than in the United States.

The survey is being conduc-ted here and in 244 other countries where there is a concentration of former residents of Great Britain and Norway. Nationally, questionnaires will be mailed to 32,000 persons




