Battle Of Words Underway In Madison

The political contest in Madison Township seems to have narrowed down to a contest of words, printed, verbal and otherwise. Campaign managers and "ghost writers" from both political

parties in Our Town have turned their attention to pouring out hundreds of words of charges and counter charges.

G.O.P. Municipal Chairman Donald Borst stated at a meeting

of G.O.P. Campaign Committee that the present township administration "can't double-talk itself out of the financial mess it is in".

At a meeting of the Republican campaign committee held recently at his Cliffwood Beach home, Borst discussed a Democratic statement last week which said the township administration is "working hard to reconcile" the recommendations of township auditors for the past two years that 15 major reforms in fiscal practices be effected.

GOP township committee candidates Kenneth R. Banks and Mrs. Eugenie F. Hampton charged last week that the township's million dollar business is operated "under a bookkeeping system which the owner of a corner news stand would laugh at." They also called upon the administration to explain its two-year delay in acting upon the changes requested by auditors.

Borst, who is campaign manager for Banks and Mrs. Hampton said last night that the Democrat reply "answers no questions and merely makes a feeble effort to double-talk around the admission that they haven't changed these obsolete practices and probably don't intend to change them."

"The reply is filled with typical Democrat gibberish which, true to form, attacks the Republican

candidates, promises action in the future but concedes the township hasn't acted on the auditor's proposals yet."

Borst continued, "All they care to say specifically is that they've 'finalized' eleven suggestions, which eleven? and what does 'finalized' mean? If any action has been taken, it's been behind closed doors and not at township committee meetings."

"They say some of the auditor's recommendations will require 'a number of years' for the township to comply. They've already had a number of years' to act and they've done next to nothing. Do they mean they need another 20 years?"

Borst ripped the Democratic reference to the budget "as just 'a guide provided by each department.' Thousands of families in this township run their households on budgets which they have to stick to rather closely. The auditor feels that the township can't be run any differently and asks simply for compliance with some basic rules of good book-keeping."

He continued, "It is hard to reconcile the Democrat position which says on one hand that they are working hard to comply with the auditor's recommendations but which on the other hand, in the same statement, tries to justify their refusal to maintain separate departmental accounts because other communities do the same thing. The auditor says it's a bad practice, regardless of who does it. Does the township intend to comply or not?"

"The Republicans feel it's not good business to run the township on a system in which departments don't keep monthly records, don't keep separate accounts and don't know, month by month, whether or not other departments have dipped into their funds to meet expenses," the GOP leader said.

"All the Democrat administration can say to defend themselves is that any department head can find out how much money has been spent from his budgeted funds by visiting the clerk's office."

"Apparently this explanation doesn't satisfy the auditor, who says the practice should be abandoned. It's the auditor who says the system has to be reformed, not the Republican. We merely seek compliance by the township with the recommendations of their own auditor."

"In fact," Borst concluded, "it's rather difficult to understand the vindictiveness of the Democrat administration on this issue. The auditor was hired by the present township administration, not by the Republican candidates. Their auditor says 'clean house'. We say 'by all means'."

Democratic Municipal Chairman John Phillips at a meeting of the Democratic Campaign Committee held at the home of Vice-Chairman Mrs. Mary M. Brown "challenged" the Republican Party and the Republican candidates to present one accomplishment besides stagnation and chaos that was presented by the G.O.P. in Madison Township in over 80 years of control in Our Town.

Phillips stated that the record of the Republican Party in Madison Township is a "big fat zero". Everything for the betterment of Madison Township was pre-

Former Democratic Vice Chairman Urges Support Of G.O.P. Candidate

Mrs. Eugenie F. Hampton, Republican candidate for township committee, today received the enthusiastic endorsement of Mrs. Julie Maskevich of 321 Lincoln Ave., Laurence Harbor, former municipal vice chairman of the Democratic Party.

Mrs. Maskevich, who is also former Democratic county committeewoman for the 5th election district and a founder of several women's Democratic units in the township, called upon women throughout Madison Township to "rally to the cause of one of our own."

"A female voice on the township committee is something sorely needed in Madison Township," she said.

Mrs. Hampton and her running-mate, Kenneth H. Banks, are seeking election to the currently all-Democratic 5-man township governing body.

The founder of the first Democratic women's club in Madison Township, Mrs. Maskevich has served as president of the Laur-

ence Harbor-Cliffwood Beach Women's Democratic Club and was treasurer for three years of the Laurence Harbor Democratic Club.

She said today, "Many women do a lot of complaining about being crowded out of the 'men's world' that is politics. Well, here's our chance to do something about it."

"The women of Madison Township, whether they call themselves Democrats, Republicans or independents, should get behind Jean Hampton as their candidate this year."

The prominent Democratic leader emphasized that she does not consider her endorsement of Mrs. Hampton "a matter of partisan party politics. I'm still a Democrat and proud to be one," she said. But there are things which rise above partisan party politics.

"Regardless of party affiliation, Jean Hampton should be on the township committee. She is a talented, very capable young

woman. Her knowledge of township affairs exceeds that of either of her opponents--and I voted for both of them last time."

Mrs. Maskevich said she has known Mrs. Hampton through political activities for a number of years, pointing out that the Republican candidate had become vice chairman of the Republican Party the same year that she (Mrs. Maskevich) has stepped out as vice chairman of the Democratic Party locally.

She continued, "Jean Hampton is a woman who can match her ideas on township problems against those of any man in Madison Township. She is a living symbol of the fact that women, more and more, are coming into the political limelight."

"If we miss this golden chance to elect one of our own sex to office, then we'll not be entitled to do any complaining about being banished to the kitchen with no opportunity to make our influence felt on politics."

Dear Mr. White:

I have just finished reading your editorial, "Stamp It Out Before It's Too Late", regarding what you appropriately term the "cancer of the black board jungle".

Editorials of this nature, intended to alarm and alert the citizenry of any community, are always timely; and their writers are to be commended for their spirited public concern.

The "cancer" that you speak of, however, is not "forming" in Madison Township in the sense that it is something new to our area (or anywhere else, for that matter). It may be making itself more manifest in our Township through exhibitions of disrespect, immorality and vandalism on the part of a percentage of the youth of our community; but the "cancer" itself is as old as the history of mankind, and will be with us always. All religious systems using the Bible as the basis of their teaching see the beginning of the "cancer" in the record of Adam and Eve and their children. And the biological transmission of the "cancer" can be traced through every generation and every race of mankind. No matter how fresh the air may be around us -- or how clean the countryside may be -- the "cancer" is there. To keep the "cancer" from manifesting itself, and making of our community another "black board jungle", is the problem we face.

Legislation may help; but it is only a partial solution. Church and school and civic organizations ought to plan programs and provide facilities for the youth of the community. But, again, these efforts, because the organizations behind them have neither the primary responsibility nor authority for the youth, can be only partially successful in solving the problem. In the last analysis, what happens in our Township will depend upon THE PARENTS of our youth. The Township as a whole will be as good or as bad as the average family residing in it. The moral fibre of the youth, and their respect for authority, and the personal rights of others, will be only as good as their parents make it by their oral INSTRUCTION AND EXAMPLE.

The general public is invited to attend.

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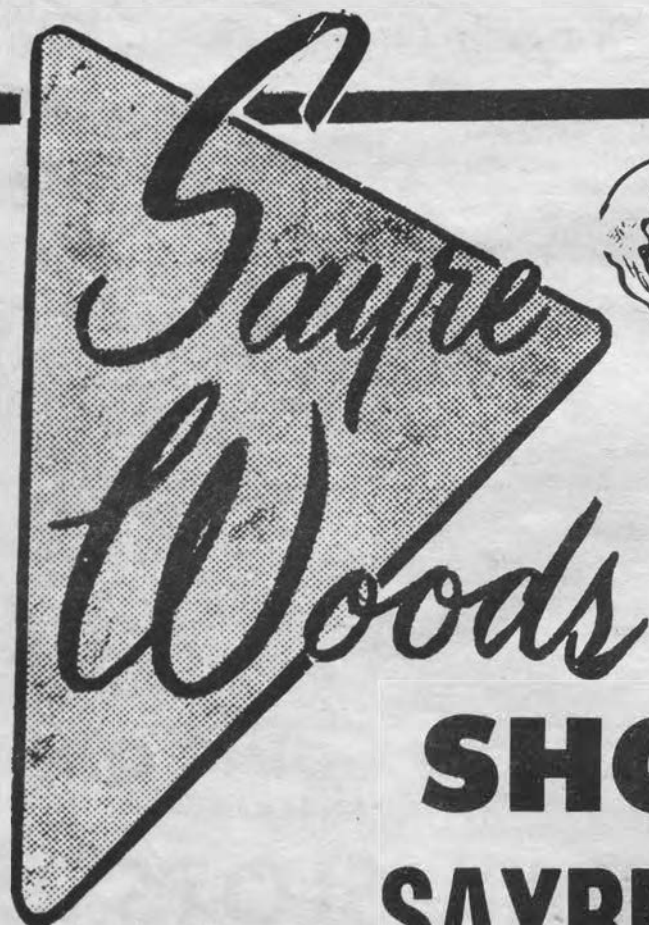

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH MAINTAIN, REGULATE AND CONTROL THE POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX AND TO PRESCRIBE AND ESTABLISH JUST RULES AND REGULATIONS RESPECTING SUCH DEPARTMENT," adopted April 9, 1942.
