

Public Service To Operate PA 1-7847 New Bus Service

Another new service, provided by Public Service Coordinated Transport, will begin Monday, November 5, 1962, between the Browntown Shopping Center and Journal Square, Jersey City.

Busses will leave the Browntown Shopping Center at 7:25 a.m., with one service operating via County Highway #516 to U.S. Highway #9, then north on U.S. Highway #9, to the New Jersey Turnpike and Skyway to Journal Square, Jersey City, Arrival in Jersey City is scheduled for about 8:20 a.m.

Buses will pick up on signal at all regular bus stops between the Browntown Shopping Center and Coby's in Sayreville.

A second departure will leave the Browntown Shopping Center at 7:25 a.m., but will operate via County Highway #516 to the Old Bridge Interchange, then via N.J. Highway #18 through East Brunswick to New Jersey Turnpike Interchange 9, then via the New Jersey Turnpike and Skyway to Journal Square. This trip will also arrive at Journal Square about 8:20 a.m.

Connections can be made at Journal Square with numerous bus lines operating to many points in Hudson County and with the Port Authority Trans-Hudson Tubes (PATH) for Hudson Terminal, downtown New York, or to points along Sixth Avenue (Avenue of the Americas) up to, and including, 33rd Street.

On the return trip, buses over both routes will leave Journal Square at 5:30 p.m.

Fare will be 95 cents oneway plus tax with a ten-trip ticket available at \$7.25. After November 15, the tax will not be collected.


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
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Had To Wait For My Building Permit

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


