Cerra States Reason For Filing

Frank W. Cerra of 207 Princeton Road, Madison Park announced his reasons for filing for the April Primary election at a meeting of workers held in his home recently.

Cerra stated "there have been many rumors and reports and threats being spread in the Madison Park area, let it be known right now that as a candidate for County Committeeman for Madison Park District #7, I am opposing one candidate and one candidate only in the Democratic Primary Election on April 16,-1963. Mud-Roads-Schools Main Topic At Meeting

It was the same old cry of roads, mud and lack of schools at the recent meeting of the Madison Township Committee held at the municipal building on Route 9.

Residents of the Laurence Harbor area pointed out the very poor condition of the roads in the area and said that there was mud all over the place. They complained about the hazard to the safety of children forced to walk in the streets going to school. One man stated that his daughter had sunk up to her thighs in the mud before being pulled out by firemen. Others were concerned that in the event of fire the equipment might not be able to negotiate the streets.

Road Chairman, Joseph Hoff of Laurence Harbor said that he was fully aware of the situation and that the committee is doing everything possible to keep the streets open and in repair. Hoff blamed the condition on the extremes of freezing and thawing periods during the past winter and the still unpaved condition of

Garden Apartments Substitute For Industry

We're very much surprised the Industrial Commission of Our Town doesn't get the "lead out of their pants" and get behind the proposed garden apartment developments. We're not getting industry. Meeting Set Garden apartments are a stimulating and worthwhile substitute for industry.

As a matter of fact, it could be more beneficial, financial and "Block Captains" will be named healthwise, than industry.

> Statistics prove that there are few, if any, children of school age in one of these garden apartments. They would present no traffic hazard, no extra services that would cost Our Town money. They have no stench or smoke or pollution of the air.

> The units would collect their own garbage, clean their own streets, and attract a middle age group of dignity and refinement. It has been figured out that for every 100 apartments the town would benefit by at least a net revenue of \$40,000. The purchasing power of the apartment dwellers would amount to over \$1,000,000 for every 100 apartments. Isn't this better than industry? Let's give it a try. Nothing ventured nothing gained. We're not going anywhere right now as far as industrial advancement is concerned, so why not Garden apartments?

, some of the roads because of the installation of sanitary sewers.

Hoff said that the township committee would accept no roads until they are returned to the same condition they were in before being ripped up for sewer installation last spring. Hoff stated "that the Madison Township Sewerage Authority is overseeing the installation and has promised full cooperation with the committee in making sure the contractors return the roads in proper condition.

Mayor John Keating urged the group attending the meeting to register their complaints to the Sewerage Authority at the next regular meeting of the group. He pointed out that the Township Committee has no direct control over the authority. Complaints to the sewerage authority can be made to the Madison Township Sewerage Authority, 71 Blvd. West, Cliffwood Beach.

The Township Committee passed a resolution prepared by Township attorney Harold G. Smith urging the state legislature to allow municipalities to require "in the public interest" that housing developers provide school facilities. The resolution also asked that the developers donate 7% of the total land area in any major sub-division for use by the Township for recreational purposes.

Copies were ordered sent to Governor Richard Hughes, Sen. John Lynch, Assemblymen J. Edward Crabiel, Joseph C. Doren, Norman Tanzman and Guido J. Brigiani. The resolution is to be sent to every township attorney of every municipality in Middlesex County and to the League of Municipalities, Legislative Committee.

Joseph Pandozzi termed the resolution "as a great step forward and that such a proposal if made into law would aid growing communities such as Madison". Joseph G. Hoff said that "he was whole-heartedly in favor of the proposal but doubted that much support would come from communities which have already been fully developed."

The Madison Township Committee in the past had required that developers of housing developments provide necesary velopments provide necessary class rooms or "school building donation funds". The school rooms and money donations were made by agreements. Recent court rulings found that the Township or municipality had not legal right to force the developers to make such agreements.






