



Hoff and Township Engineer F. Kurtz will meet with the Area Director for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in New York. meetings and prepared many reports in New Brunswick, Freehold, Trenton and Atlantic City in pointing out the need to protect both public and private interests along the Bayshore Front in Madison Township.

In response to a request by the Federal Government, the Township is now obtaining the necessary right of way. Further, plans are being prepared for storm sewer work that must be done in coordination with the beach fill project.

Hoff asked the residents of the area to accept the inconvenience and probable restricted use of the beach areas during the next few months. He pointed out the comfort and security of our shores being protected plus the knowledge that the bathing and recreational areas will be greatly improved should be worth a little inconvenience for one season.



## Letters

Chief Charles Boice Madison Twp. Police Dept. Junction Hwys. #9 and #34 R.F.D. #1 Old Bridge, N.J. Dear Chief:

Enclosed is a copy of an article which appeared in Madison American on March 28, 1963 which concerns Old Bridge-Matawan Road (Co. Rd. 3-R-4 or Co. Rd. 516 or Temp. N.J. Rt. 18) in your Township.

As your records will show, this office, in conjunction with the New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles made speed surveys and investigations, since February 16, 1960 and this resulted in a resolution, which was requested by this office, being adopted by the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders on June 20, 1961 and approved by the New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles on July 31, 1961, establishing a 50 M.P.H. speed limit along the above mentioned roadway, with the understanding that portions of the roadway concerned will be signed in accordance with the resolution as adopted. The then Madison Township Chief of Police, Edward Adler received a copy of this letter of approval, dated July 31, 1961.

This office was cognizant of the fact that future developments may affect the speed limits along certain areas of the roadway and also that the opening of the new SH Route 18 would take off a large amount of traffic from this County road.

I feel that your Department should extend every effort to correct the existing signing along this roadway, as recommended by the New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles so that the traveling public is made aware of the legal rate of speed.

Also, I wish to inform you that I discussed the hazardous conditions along this roadway with Mr. Douglas Powell, Director of the Middlesex County Planning Board and suggested that the apple tree curves be eliminated and the possible widening of the secondary roads be considered in the long range planning for improvements in the County. This office is well aware of the danger which exists along portions of this roadway.

We shall endeavor to establish a double line "Passing" and "No Passing" zones along this roadway. Our efforts along this line met with very little success last year but I am hopeful of having it established this year and obtain the approval of the New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles. These lines are installed on the roadway leading to the High School and have proved very help-



AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE ACQUISITION OF TWO NEW GARBAGE TRUCKS FOR USE BY THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON, IN THE COUNTY OF MID-DLESEX, NEW JERSEY, TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION OF \$32,000 TO FIN-ANCE THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT AND AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PRO-VIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDAN-TICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Madison, in the County of Middlesex, New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Township of Madison, in the County of Middlesex, shall acquire for use in the Township automotive vehicles consisting of two new trucks together with the original apparatus and equipment suitable for use in the collec-

tion of garbage and other refuse.

Section 2. The sum of \$32,000 is hereby appropriated to the acquisition of such two new automotive vehicles with original equipments and apparatus. Such appropriation shall be made from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized, and the down payment provided, by this ordinance. No part of the cost of the acquisition of said automotive vehicles with equipment and apparatus shall be assessed against property specially bene-

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the acquisition of such vehicles (hereinafter referred to as "pur-

said Township and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of said Township pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey and (3) the estimated cost of said purpose is \$32,000 and (4) \$2,000 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (5) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$30,000, and (6) the cost of such purpose, as hereinbefore stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$2,000 which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purpose, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 40A: 2-20 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 4. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$2,000, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the captial improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Township are now available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$2,000 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said pur-

pose. Section 5. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Township of an aggregate principle amount not exceeding \$30,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 6. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said Township of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$30,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum, and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of 5 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office

of the Township Clerk of said Township, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Township, as defined in Section 40A:2-43 of said. Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$30,000 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance is permitted by an exception to the debt limitations of said Local Bond Law contained in subdivision of Section 40A:2-7 of said Local Bond Law.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

"The best way to assure such an effort is to nominate in the primary candidates who will work with the organization GOP workers and not at cross purposes."

The statement released by GOP candidates Robert J. Gavlin, Richard J. Dealy, Jr., Alexander F. Smeaton, Donald D. Tierney, Kenneth H. Banks, Vincent J. Cancellieri and Donald Macrae continued:

"Republican workers at the district level -- the unsung heroes of any election campaign

must not be saddled with any candidate who has spent his time attacking them and their leadership openly in the press.

"Nor should they be expected to show confidence in or respect for any candidate who refuses to acknowledge their solid record of service to the party."

The candidates said, "By the same token, any individual who attempts to describe himself as our party's 'only hope for victory' is really insulting the regular organization workers who must carry Republicanism to victory in November."

"We are entering this political to the local Republican organization and to the rank and file Republican voters who, through their open nominating convention, chose to honor us with their nomination for township council."

They concluded, "We have no doubt of our coming victory in the Republican primary and are confident of our ultimate victory at the polls in November."

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

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
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
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
