### AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, the Township of Madison, Middlesex County, New Jersey

heretofore gave its consent to the incorporation of a company known as the Browntown Water Company; and

WHEREAS, the Browntown Water Company proposes to engage in the water business in the Township of Madison; and

WHEREAS, the Browntown Water Company petitioned the Township Committee of the Township of Madison to adopt an ordinance giving to it the right to engage in the water business in the area specifically defined and described in said ordinance, and the Township Committee of the Township of Madison duly advertised said ordinance and adopted same,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable considerations the Browntown Water Company covenants and agrees to and with the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey, that it will at any time within 10 years from the date hereof grant, bargain, assign, transfer and sell to the Townsnip of Madison its entire water plant, appurtenances thereto and distribution system at the actual cost of the installation of said water plant, appurtenances thereto and distribution system less depreciation charges as computed in accordance with the practice and rules of the Public Utility Commission of the State of New Jersey, or the sconomic replacement value, whichever is the lesser,

This agreement shall be binding upon the Browntown Water Company,


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## Appointed Board Of Education
