\$1,000,000 Shore Erosion Program

Corps of Engineers to
Receive Bids Aug. 15th

Plans were unfurled for the beach erosion program at a recent meeting held at the Madison Township Municipal Building. The project which will effect the entire shoreline in the Laurence Harbor-Cliffwood Beach area is estimated to cost approximately

\$1,100,000.

Attending the meeting for Madison Township was Mayor John Keating while Mayor John Marz, Jr., represented Matawan Township.

The meeting was called in order to determine if the Town-

ship's involved had obtained the necessary property easements, it was pointed out by James K. Rankin, Chief Engineer of the Navigation Bureau that this was necessary before bids could be awarded. According to the present schedule bids will be ad-

vertised on the 15th of August and it is hoped that work on the million dollar project would begin in October.

According to best estimates the project will take about one year to complete. Various bulk heads, sand barriers will be constructed and tons of dirt will be dredged to form a protective area to the Laurence Harbor - Cliffwood Beach shoreline. Land elevations will be raised. The Raritan Bay area has been hard hit in the past few years by various hurricanes and much property damage was caused by the rising tides. The project will extend from the Cheesequake Creek to Whale Creek in Madison Township.

Township Engineer Frederick H. Kurtz explained that the property descriptions as laid out were of little use and suggested that means and bounds include the entire parcels of land, as the project would effect at least 75 to 85% of the property.

James J. Harrigan, Negotiator for Madison Township explained that he was in the process of obtaining easements, while some of the property owners have accepted his estimates others are "far out of line". The owner

of one of the larger tracts of land affected by the program is presently in Japan and is expected to return to California this weekend. Harrigan suggested that some of the property easements might have to be obtained by condemnation proceedings.

Half of the cost of the one million dollar Federal Aid project will be paid for by the local government. It is hoped that the State of New Jersey will pay 50% of this cost. The township would then have to finance approximately \$250,000, this would be done by the sale of bonds. According to estimates it will cost approximately \$16,000 - 17,000 per year for maintenance of the entire project, the Federal Government would pay 50% of this cost.

Mayor John Keating lauded the entire program stating that this will give Madison Township the only salt-water beach in Middlesex County and will open the area for continuous improvement. The township hopes to acquire

Hearing Set For Ordinance On Tax Map

At a special meeting of the Madison Township Committee held Monday evening at the Municipal Building on Route 9, the township introduced an ordinance on first reading establishing the process of obtaining a tax map and the payment for same, a public hearing on the proposed ordinance: "In May 19, 1958 an ordinance establishing the preparation of a tax map was approved, however it did not set forth a fee or appropriate the necessary money to pay for the services. Nothing further was

sone until in July 1958 when a resolution was approved by the Township Committee instructing Robert Baier to start work on the tax map and that the cost should not exceed \$50,000.

On June 6th, 1960 the township committee revoked and rescinded the resolution made on July 21, 1958 naming Baier to do the Tax Map. The committee then approved a resolution naming Lenox Associates to complete the Tax Map and that the cost not exceed \$30,000. According to Smith, it appears that

no agreement was entered into at that time.

The township Attorney recommended that the June 6th, 1960 resolution be rescinded and that an appropriate ordinance be introduced setting the preparation of the tax map and the payment of the same.

Mayor John Keating set the hearing on the ordinance for August 26th. Keating explained that the regular meeting scheduled for the 19th of August would be a long and lengthy Committee. Joseph Hoff moved that the Committee go on record as in accord with the findings of the Madison Township Zoning Board in regards to an application for a gas station at the corner of Route 9 and Cindy Street. Voting for the move was Hoff, Keating and Messenger. Joseph Pandozzi, disqualified himself because he was a witness in the Zoning Board hearings on the gasoline station. Committeeman Victor O'Brien was not present at the meeting.

Township Committeeman Harry Messenger Chairman of the Township Recreation Committee announced that 25 Madison Township youngsters will compete at the Brookside Pool in Milltown on August 10th.

Permission was granted to the SayreWood South Little League to hold Tag Days on the 16th and 17th of August at the various Shopping Centers in Madison Township provided they obtain the necessary permission from the owners.

Mayor Keating instructed Township Attorney Harold G. Smith to prepare final draft of the zoning ordinance as prepared by the township committee and that Township Engineer Frederick Kurtz draw the official zoning map.

Fire Report

John Perhacs, chief of the Laurence Harbor Fire Co. No. 1 reports that the company answered 19 alarms during the last month. One was a house fire on Shoreland Circle, where the fire was confined to the wiring.

There was a car fire in Cliffwood Beach where damage was done to the top of the motor and hood of the car. One car fire was out on arrival. Another call for a car fire turned out to be a car overheated on the Parkway. There was one gas fire caused by a man starting a car. There was one alarm for a hose laying drill. Boys set fire to construction equipment belonging to Cruz Construction Co.

There were 7 brush fires, including one call for help from South Old Bridge for a fire on Runyan Road, one on Shadyside Ave., two at the Railroad, one on Woodland Ave., one on Oliver Ave. and one on the Parkway; a fence fire on Summerfield Ave; an oven fire on Laurence Parkway where the fire was confined to the oven electric light; one pole fire on Bayview Drive and one stand-by at Cliffwood Beach firehouse, covering for them while they helped fight a factory fire at Hanson-Van Winkle-Munning.


Rummage Sale

Just a year ago the Madison Township Junior Chamber of Commerce selected the town's four ambulance squads to be the recipients of the township's share of the proceeds from the first annual Giant-Eagle Football Classic.

This event was sponsored by the New Jersey Jaycees and all proceeds were donated directly by the State organization to many charities. The part played by our local chapter was (1) to designate the local charities, and (2) to help run the football game in order to merit our town's share of the proceeds.

The only requirement that the State Jaycees had for a local charity was that it be on a list of tax-exempt organizations furnished by the Federal Internal Revenue Service. Our chapter was informed by the State Jaycees that two of our four ambulance squads were not on this list. Members of our chapter made many contacts with these two squads during the year, requesting them to straighten out their status with Internal Revenue. Finally we wrote the two squads on May 5, telling them that Madison Township's share of the money would have to be split among those squads cleared with Internal Revenue and State Jaycees by May 17.

Many members of our chapter were disappointed that all four squads didn't get checks as about half our members live in areas covered by the two that missed out.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AN EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION FOR PREPARATION OF AN APPROVED TAX MAP.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey, that pursuant to Chapter 48, P.L. 1956, the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars is hereby appropriated for the Preparation of an Approved Tax Map and shall be deemed an emergency appropriation as defined and provided for in R.S. 40:50-12.

Such appropriation and/or the "special emergency notes" authorized to finance the appropriation shall be provided for in succeeding annual budgets by the inclusion of at least 1/5 of the amount authorized pursuant to this act.

All ordinances or sections of ordinances, amendments thereof or supplements thereto inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage, approval and publication as prescribed by law.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the above ordinance was duly passed on first reading by the Township Committee of the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex, N.J., on the 5th day of August, 1963, and that said ordinance will be considered for final adoption at a meeting of the said Township Committee to be held in the Municipal Building, Route 9, on the 26th day of August, 1963 at 7:30 p.m. at which time and place a public hearing will be held prior to final passage of said ordinance and all interested persons will be given an opportunity to be heard concerning the same.




