School Bells Set To Ring For Madison Youngsters

According to Dr. William J. Sample Superintendent of Schools there will be a record breaking attendance when all Madison Township Schools are opened for the 1963-64 School term on Monday, September 9th. According

to the Superintendent the policy of conducting Orientation Workshops for new teachers will be followed as in the past.

Some forty new teachers will attend sessions on September 4th and September 5th. The sessions

will deal with an introduction to the school system, meetings with school principals and scheduled meetings with the school system's social worker, the psychologist and other special teachers. On September 6th all teachers in

the entire school system will attend a general session and luncheon. Sample stated "that we have found this the very best way to introduce our new teachers to our old and makes for better harmony and understanding of the Madison Township School system".

Released by the office of the Superintendent of Schools the following classes have been designated for various schools in the school system. MADISON PARK, Grades Kindergarten to 6th; BRUNSWICK GARDENS, Grades 4 and 5; VOORHEES SCHOOL, Grades Kindergarten to the 6th; WILLIS, Grades 1 to 5; SOUTHWOOD, Grades 1 to 4; MILLER, grades Kindergarten and 4th, 5th and 6th; JEWISH COMMUNITY CENTER, grade, Kindergarten; P.S. #18, Sayre Woods South, Grades, Kindergarten to 4th; P.S. #19, Sayre Woods South, Grades Kindergarten to 6th; P.S. #20, Sayre Woods South grades Kindergarten to 6th. All first,

second and third grades will be on double sessions with hours either from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. or 12:01 until 4:00 p.m. Kindergarten hours will be either 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. or 12:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Labor Day Weekend Warning Drive Slow



FATAL WRECK: Mrs. Marie Ruddy of Elizabeth, N.J. became Madison Township's third auto fatality for 1963. The fatal accident occurred late Saturday evening on Route 34, south of Disbrow Road.

Several other persons were also injured in the accident. The New Jersey Safety Council warns that 11 lives might be lost in New Jersey over the Labor Day Weekend due to motor vehicle accidents.

Estimate 11 Deaths For State

The New Jersey State Safety Council estimates that 11 lives are expected to be lost on New Jersey's streets and highways during the three-day Labor Day holiday weekend. The estimate includes the 78-hour period from 6:00 p.m. Friday until Midnight Monday. The Council also estimates that upwards of 1200 other persons will be injured in traffic mishaps and close to 3,000 vehicles will be damaged to the extent of \$100 or more in the state during the period.

Three major factors that are expected to figure prominently in the fatal and injury accidents are: speed too fast for conditions; fatigue, particularly during the hours of darkness; and drinking and driving. The Council also emphasizes that there are four other unsafe driving practices which could cause fatalities to approach a figure higher than estimated. These are: driving left of the center of the road; following too closely; failing to heed Stop and Yield signs and traffic lights; and passing on hills and curves.

The Council again calls attention to the high rate of single vehicles in traffic mishaps in the records in New Jersey to date this year. "Ran off road" and "struck fixed object" types of accidents this year account for approximately 85% of the single vehicle accidents and far outnumber total deaths resulting from "head on" and "same direction" types of mishaps.

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It Could Happen Here!

The brutal murder of two Lodi, N.J. police officers in the performance of their duty should be a grim reminder to the residents of Our Town and the members of the Township Committee that it can happen here.

The Madison Township Police Department is often supplemented by the use of Special Police Officers, many of these men have had little or no training at all. On occasion we have seen them in the patrol cars with regular police officers, unarmed.

We have also seen Police Reserves in the patrol cars, unarmed.

A demented potential murderer is not going to ask if the Special Police Officer or Reserved Officer is armed or not, they are not going to be asked if they are doing the work on a volunteer basis or for \$1.00 per hour. They are going to be shot and murdered in cold blood.

Police Reserves and Special Officers unarmed have been used in Road Spot Checks, up to now they have been fortunate, they have stopped motorists who have motor vehicle violations, the next car that is stopped might contain, armed, demented killers.

Perhaps, the township committee has already forgotten that Sgt. George Hanson was wounded when he was shot by two teen-age "punks". More recently another police officer was shot at by a fellow who is wanted by the FBI. This came about as part of a routine check-out.

The Lodi incident could be repeated in Our Town!

The population of Madison Township is approximately 24,000 persons and is steadily climbing. The crime rate unfortunately is also climbing. The mode of operation of stick-up artists, burglars and other criminals is changing. Most of the burglaries of business and homes are committed by out of town offenders. The "heat" is on in the larger cities and the "hoods" have been traveling out of town to do their jobs.

If additional police protection is needed for Our Town, let's appoint regular police officers and train them adequately to do the job. This is 1963 not 1943. There is a time and place for Special Police Officers and Police Reserves. We are not trying to discredit the capabilities of any of the men in the Reserves or doing work as Special Police Officers.

Quit kidding Madison Township has been fortunate, the Lodi incident could happen here!

Dear Mr. White:

I am writing in reference to the answer you gave the writer of "Count Your Blessings", in the Aug. 22 issue of your paper. As a parent of a teenager and two pre-teens, I agree with you whole heartedly that if parents aren't interested in what their children do, and give them encouragement when needed, naturally the blame falls on our shoulders. I would like to give you an example of what happened at a recent lawn band concert.

For the past several summers, our elementary and High School band students have attended "summer band" rehearsals, that terminate in a concert given at the end of the session. These rehearsals are not compulsory, but students faced with a long summer of "really nothing to do," look forward to this get-together. Many make vacation changes with their parents in order to attend, and at this last concert, a youngster who had a summer job, arranged to get the afternoon off so he could participate. The band instructors worked with these students, not one day a week, but two. Now -- if these kids were so determined, why couldn't grownups, parents, friends, neighbors, etc., reward these kids with a better attendance than there was at this concert?

Our bands are good, and in parades you'll hear people say, "Here comes OUR band, listen to them play." But, where would we be if the kids were to say, "What's the sense of being good and working hard if no one cares?"

I don't know how many of you have attended a High School concert, but I haven't missed one of them. I'm willing to do anything required of me to help these kids. I've worked with them as a "band parent", and I'll say this; their morale is high; they are out to do their best to please their band director, and the public, but I hope the day never comes that my daughter or my sons can say what I heard a youngster say as he put his instrument away in its case after the concert that day. Said he, "Well, I don't even know why I bothered to come today, my folks were home because we had company." (Pretty valid excuse wasn't it, because who wants to go hear a bunch of kids tootin' a bunch of horns?) Isn't this the first step down? I think it is, because if we as parents don't care enough what our children do, who can they turn to? Worse than that, what can they turn to? Regardless of whether our children are in a band, in a church choir, scouts, or anything that makes them feel they are accomplishing something worthwhile, isn't it easier to give them a pat on the back and say "well done" than to have to appear in juvenile court, and wonder, "Where did I go wrong with this child?"

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LEGAL NOTICE

"AN ORDINANCE GOVERNING CO-OPERATION WITH THE UNITED STATES AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY IN CONNECTION WITH SHORE PROTECTION WORK FOLLOWING THE GREAT ATLANTIC STORM OF MARCH, 1962."

WHEREAS, the Great Atlantic storm of March, 1962, has caused severe damage to the shore of Madison Township; and WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of Madison Township to restore the sand dunes, vegetation and other protection; and WHEREAS, it is in the interests of health, safety and public welfare of Madison Township to obtain such assistance; and

WHEREAS, the United States of America proposes to perform emergency shore protection work along the Atlantic Ocean shore of Madison Township pursuant to P. L. 875, s 81 through the Office of Emergency Planning and the Corps of Engineers, United States Army; based on petition of the State of New Jersey; and WHEREAS, P. L. 875, s 81 requires local cooperation as hereinafter described as prerequisite to federal action;

The Township Committee of the Township of Madison in the County of Middlesex does ordain:

Section: It is the policy and purpose of the Township of Madison to cooperate with the United States and the State of New Jersey in performance of emergency shore protection work along the Atlantic Ocean shore front of the Township of Madison pursuant to P. L. 875, s 81, through the Office of Emergency Planning and the Corps of Engineers, United States Army; based on petition by the State of New Jersey; Section 2: In order to effectuate such policy and purpose the Mayor, acting for, on behalf, and in the name of the Township of Madison is hereby directed to execute such instruments and enter into agreements to accomplish the following purposes:

(1) Hold and save harmless the United States and the State of New Jersey for claims of damages as a result of the aforesaid emergency shore protection work;

(2) Acquire all lands, easements and rights of way deemed necessary by the United States for placement of beach-fill and sand fences as required and for the borrow of beachfill materials from waterways and upland sources.

(3) Obtain and furnish to the United States and the State of New Jersey all necessary releases and permits from all parties in interest for removal by and at the expense of the United States of drift and debris in advance of sand beachfill placement, including removal of any buildings which have been damaged beyond repair, when such structures, in the opinion of the United States, will interfere with proper beachfill and dune placement;

(4) To do all other acts and things necessary to carry out the powers expressly granted herein, including the furnishing of such police protection as may be required.

Section 3: That the Township of Madison acquire such privately owned lands pursuant to all applicable laws of the State of New Jersey regulating the Township of Madison and the expenditure of municipal funds.

Section 4: That the Township of Madison maintain, restore and construct protective dunes and furnish and provide for the protection thereof in such measure as prescribed by law, including the power to act in the acquisition of privately owned lands in accordance with the provision of

Section 4: All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE LIMITING AND PROHIBITING PARKING ON CERTAIN DESIGNATED AREAS OF CERTAIN STREETS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Township Committee of the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex and State of New Jersey, that the above-entitled Ordinance be amended as follows:

No person shall park a vehicle at any time upon any of the following described streets:

1. Along the north side of County Road 3-R-14 beginning at a point 435' east of Sunset Avenue and extending to the point where County Road 3-R-14 meets the spur of New Jersey Route #18.

2. Along the south side of County Road 3-R-14 beginning at Sunset Avenue and extending to the point where County Road 3-R-14 meets the spur of New Jersey Route #18.

No person shall park a vehicle for longer than the time limit shown upon the following streets:

1. One hour parking along the north side of County Road 3-R-14 beginning 35' east of Sunset Avenue and extending to a point 400' east thereof.

Unless another penalty is expressly provided by New Jersey Statute, every person convicted of a violation of a provision of this Ordinance or any supplement thereto shall be liable to a penalty of not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) or imprisonment for a term not exceeding 15 days or both.

All Ordinances or sections of Ordinances, amendments thereof or supplements thereto, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage and publication according to law.
