





Record School Registration

Madison Township had a record school enrollment for the 1963-64 school year of 7,656 students. This is an increase of 789 puptles over last year's total of 6,867.

The High School, which will operate for the first time this year on split sessions, had an opening enrollment of 2,633 stu-dents. A total of 1,170 pupils in Grades 10, 11 and 12 attended the morning session with Grade 10 registering 473 young people 10 registering 473 young people and Grade II registering 578, The Tweith Grade, with an en-rollment of 319, will be the first class to graduate from the new High School, Grades 7, 8 and 9 attended the afternoon session with an opening registration of 1463. There were 509 students in Grade 7; 481 students in Grade 9, and 473 students in Grade 9,

The elementary schools wel-comed some 5,023 pupils to clas-ses, There was an opening Kindergarten enrollment of 1,018, The First, Second and Third

Grades, representing a total of 2,174 youngsters, will again operate on split sessions. The Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Grades however will attend full time classes

Meeting Held

Judge Aldona Appleton, of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court of Middlesex County, was guest speaker at the first meeting of the Fall season of the Woman's Club of Laurence Harbor which was held Monday evening at Webster Hall, Laurence Harbor Community Church.

"Women's Clubs were instrumental in making possible the first juvenile courts in America" Judge Appleton said. "Perhaps we can build a better opportunity for our children and grandchildren'' she continued

"perhaps by our interest and efforts we will be able to cut down juvenile delinquency. The first Juvenile Court in Middlesex County was created in 1958. Today's statistics indicate that such a court was justified. Next to nuclear warfare juvenile delinquency is the greatest threat to our national security." Judge Appleton also stated that "the prevention of juvenile delinquency is primarily the duty of the parents." 
