"Independent" Hits At Industrial Commission

The candidates were there, the newspaper reporters were there the only thing lacking at the recent township committee meeting was a good old hot "donney-brook". Several spectators left the meeting mumbling they had expected to see fireworks at the meeting. Township committee meetings in previous election years have been "political battle-grounds"

where anything and everything goes. Robert "Jack" Sapir, running

as a Independent Candidate for

the Township Council claimed that Phillip Romeo and James Tortorice had "conflicts" of interest in holding their appointments on the Madison Township Industrial Commission, Sapir quote a section of a law which he said applied to the situation.

Mayor John Keating instructed Township Attorney Harold G. Smith to investigate the charges and report his findings to the Township Committee.

Sapir also questioned the Township Engineers fees, to this Keating replied that the engineer was hired on a \$1,200 per year retainer fee.

Township Attorney Harold G. Smith further clarified the question of the acceptance of the land. Smith said that the township committee could accept the land only if the property owner certified to the fact that he was the sole owner of the property involved.

Township Committee The awarded a bid on road material to the Manzo Contracting Company of Matawan. The Manzo firm was the sole bidder on the road material and the acceptance of the bid, hinged on the approval by the State of New Jersey.

Township Committeeman Joseph Pandozzi reported that new type lights had been installed on Throckmorton Lane to give better lighting in the area so that youngsters walking to the Madison Township High School would be able to see better. G.O.P. candidate Robert J. Gavlin questioned Mayor Keating about the Industrial brochure which was reported at the last meeting. Keating seemed to have the edge on the G.O.P. candidate and angered Gavlin on several occasions by mispronouncing his name at one point Gavlin spelled out the name as G-A-V-L-I-N.

The G.O.P. candidate wanted with the Industrial brochure and

questioned "do we have special ground or something or maybe uranium or possibly uranium. Keating replied that part of

the brochure had been completed and that information had already been made available to several prospective industries. Keating again stated that the brochure was not for distribution to everyone but would upon completion be made available to realtors and industrialists interested in locating in Madison Township.

The meeting was adjourned at approximately 9:15 p.m. making it one of the shortest on the record. One spectator in leaving the meeting mumbled "well I guess I have to get my television set fixed there's nothing hot going on around here".






