## Authority To Purchase Browntown Water Co.

The Madison Township Municpal Authority (Water Authority) meeting at its office on Route 9 passed a resolution to purchase holdings of the Browntown Water Company. The purchase price for the water company according to George Kress, attorney for the Water Authority was \$1,408,000 for up to 1950 equivalent units. The next 400 units will cost the authority \$295,000 at the rate of 150 units per year. The closing date for the transaction was listed

as December 16. The Browntown Water Company had originally asked in the neighborhood of \$2,800,000 for

the holdings.


It was also announced that Lake Lefferts Estates had offered to give \$60,000 to the authority if they would run a water line down Route 516 to the proposed development.

The authority is seeking \$75,000 for the water line, according to the authority the developer would pay all other installation costs plus water meters for the 375 home development.

The authority will also purchase a building on Throckmorton Lane for the sum of \$16,000 to be used as an office building for the authority.

## Full Time Engineer

During the recent election the G.O.P. candidates brought out several points and selected these for campaign issues. The fees or charges for services of the Township Engineer were a target for cartoons and newspaper statements.

It is reported that the Township Engineer will seek legal action against the G.C.P. candidates because he feels that some of the statements made in the papers were libelous against him and hurt his professional reputation.

The MADISCN AMERICAN had continually urged that the Township Committee appoint a full time engineer. We still feel that it would be beneficial and more economical for Our Town if a full time engineer was appointed.

We would urge at this time that the Township Committee consider the creation of a Department of Engineering and Licensing. Heading this department would be a full time salaried engineer. All building inspectors and plumbing inspectors would be directly under his supervision. Building permits and all other licenses Here To There with the exception of those pertaining to health. taverns and dogs would be issued by this department.

Creation of this department would simplify many of the operations at the Municipal level and in the end prove more economical for the taxpayers of Our Town.

## Very Good Ordinance

Committeeman Victor O'Brien at the regular meeting of the Township Committee introduced on first reading an ordinance regulating the conduct of people and fixing penalties. The ordinance was recommended by Chief of Police Charles Boice.

The enforcement of the ordinance would prevent gangs of teen-agers from hanging around in front of various stores and shopping areas.

The ordinance would also be invoked in Civil Rights Demonstrations and other strifes. We feel that the ordinance should be adopted and that the residents of the township and various civic groups openly endorse the ordinance.

We feel that with the adoption of the ordinance there would be no purpose in the adoption of a "curfew ordinance".

There is only a small percentage of youths that cause all the trouble in the township, quite a few of the trouble-makers do not reside in Madison Township. A curfew ordinance would affect all youngsters, the quiet ones, the fine ones, we would not like to see this happen.

"He makes me lie down in green pastures." Psalm 23:2. No one has the final answer as to why people get sick or invalid. There are no easy solutions to this question. It is God's power finally that accomplishes things and not us.


