# Not France World War 1

# One Of The Better Roads In Laurence Harbor



The above picture is not a World War I movie scene of the fighting in France. If you scattered a few German helmets and some weapons around it might appear as a page out of a history book on World War I.

This is Miller Avenue in Laurence Harbor following work by contractors installing sanitary sewers in the area. The Madison American received information from a resident of Miller Avenue that her garbage had not been picked up for sometime.

We spoke to Road Superintendent Theodore Bastedo who reported that he had ordered that garbage service be ceased because the road was impassable and the garbage trucks had to be towed out on more than one occasion. The Road Superintendent fixed the blame for the condition of the road with the Madison Township Sewerage Authority. The superintendent stated that the road wasn't one of the better roads in the Harbor area but it was in far better condition until the installation of the sanitary sewerage system in the area. Bastedo said "that he has called Mr. Walter Zizik, Executive Director of the Sewerage Authority on more than one occasion to complain to him about this road and other similar situations in the Harbor to little or no avail.

According to Bastedo, the former Township Engineer had estimated that road damage in the area could amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars. Bastedo claims that when the sewers were installed in many cases clay which was at the bottom of the trenches was placed on the top for a foundation for

the road and the roads are now like "jelly" in many areas. When the roads thaw or with rain there is very little that can be done in the line of road maintenance. Huge amounts of stones have been used by the Township Road Department in a effort to afford easier travel for motorists in the area, however, according to the Road Superintendent it doesn't hold for very long.

We spoke to Mr. Joseph Leo, acting business mana ger about the garbage pick-up and the condition of the road. We were later informed by Leo that the garbage had been picked up on Wednesday and that it wasn't too "soft" because the ground had frozen. The acting business manager said "that he had spoken to Mr. Zizik and that some action would be taken."

The collection of garbage is just one of the minor problems resulting from a terrible road condition. We wonder if the fire trucks would be able to reach the area in the event of a fire, or would they become bogged down in the mire?

We wonder if the ambulances could get to some of the homes in the area if First Aid or other emergency treatment were required.

We certainly hope that Mr. Leo will continue to press the Madison Township Sewerage Authority on the issue. Perhaps he will be able to get some of the streets in passable condition.

Now candidates seeking election to the Madison Township Board of Education charge that the Board of Education kept the facts from the residents of the town.



# Candidates Hit at School Building Program

In a joint statement issued today, James B. Garland, Richard Pine, Eugene Vroom and Robert Nixon severely criticized the Board of Education for withholding information from the voters during their effort to pass the Elementary School Building Program last June. The above four candidates pointed out that the Board, which at every opportunity extolls itself for keeping the residents informed through the press and its heralded publication "Across the Board", con-

veniently forgot to tell the people the following facts about the elementary school building program:

1. That in order to add-on to the Rehfus School, it would be necessary to close the school for one year and transport the students of Cheesequake and Central Park to "rented facilities" somewhere in the Township.

In order to add-on to the Madison Park School, one of the Madison Park buildings would be closed for one year and those Madison Park students transported to "rented facilities" somewhere in the township.

3. That the land around the present Southwood School is so unsuited for building that expensive shorings and pilings would be necessary to put the land in shape for building. The cost of these pilings and shoring has been estimated as high as seventy thousand dollars by reliable sources.

The danger to children at-tending schools that were being added-on to was constantly pointed out to the Board by James Garland during last year's Board of Education race and he was laughingly told that he was being overly concerned and there would be no danger. What he wasn't told and what the voters were not told was that there would be no danger because there would be no children attending these schools. The cost of these "rented facilities" is in this year's budget as an expenditure of eight thousand dollars. Also during last year's campaign Garland pointed out the unsuitability of the Southwood land and was told time and again that the land

was good.
This is just three examples of the deceitful tactics of the present Board of Education. We need a complete change, the candidates urged, in order to bring the Board back to the people. If the slate of Garland, Pine, Vroom and Nixon is elected, the people of Madison Township can be assured that all pertinent facts to any future building program will be presented to them and nothing will be withheld from the public.



# Not France World War 1-

# One Of The Better Roads In Laurence Harbor



The above picture is not a World War I movie scene of the fighting in France. If you scattered a few German helmets and some weapons around it might appear as a page out of a history book on World War I.

This is Miller Avenue in Laurence Harbor following work by contractors installing sanitary sewers in the area. The Madison American received information from a resident of Miller Avenue that her garbage had not been picked up for sometime.

We spoke to Road Superintendent Theodore Bastedo who reported that he had ordered that garbage service be ceased because the road was impassable and the garbage trucks had to be towed out on more than one occasion. The Road Superintendent fixed the blame for the condition of the road with the Madison Township Sewerage Authority. The superintendent stated that the road wasn't one of the better roads in the Harbor area but it was in far better condition until the installation of the sanitary sewerage system in the area. Bastedo said "that he has called Mr. Walter Zizik, Executive Director of the Sewerage Authority on more than one occasion to complain to him about this road and other similar situations in the Harbor to little or no avail.

According to Bastedo, the former Township Engineer had estimated that road damage in the area could amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars. Bastedo claims that when the sewers were installed in many cases clay which was at the bottom of the trenches was placed on the top for a foundation for

the road and the roads are now like "jelly" in many areas. When the roads thaw or with rain there is very little that can be done in the line of road maintenance. Huge amounts of stones have been used by the Township Road Department in a effort to afford easier travel for motorists in the area, however, according to the Road Superintendent it doesn't hold for very long.

We spoke to Mr. Joseph Leo, acting business mana ger about the garbage pick-up and the condition of the road. We were later informed by Leo that the garbage had been picked up on Wednesday and that it wasn't too "soft" because the ground had frozen. The acting business manager said "that he had spoken to Mr. Zizik and that some action would be taken."

The collection of garbage is just one of the minor problems resulting from a terrible road condition. We wonder if the fire trucks would be able to reach the area in the event of a fire, or would they become bogged down in the mire?

We wonder if the ambulances could get to some of the homes in the area if First Aid or other emergency treatment were required.

We certainly hope that Mr. Leo will continue to press the Madison Township Sewerage Authority on the issue. Perhaps he will be able to get some of the streets in passable condition.



In a joint statement issued today, James B. Garland, Richard Pine, Eugene Vroom and Robert Nixon severely criticized the Board of Education for withholding information from the voters during their effort to pass the Elementary School Building Program last June. The above four candidates pointed out that the Board, which at every opportunity extolls itself for keeping the residents informed through the press and its heralded publication "Across the Board", conveniently forgot to tell the people the following facts about the elementary school building program:

2. In order to add-on to the Madison Park School, one of the Madison Park buildings would be closed for one year and those

3. That the land around the present Southwood School is so sive shorings and pilings would be necessary to put the land in shape for building. The cost of these pilings and shoring has been estimated as high as seventy thousand dollars by reliable sources.

The danger to children attending schools that were being added-on to was constantly pointed out to the Board by James Garland during last year's Board of Education race and he was laughingly told that he was being overly concerned and there would be no danger. What he wasn't told and what the voters were not told was that there would be no danger because there would be no children attending these schools. The cost of these "rented facilities" is in this year's budget as an expenditure of eight thousand dollars. Also during last year's campaign Garland pointed out the unsuitability of the Southwood land and was told time and again that the land was good.

This is just three examples of the deceitful tactics of the present Board of Education. We need a complete change, the candidates urged, in order to bring the Board back to the people. If the slate of Garland, Pine, Vroom and Nixon is elected, the people of Madison Township can be assured that all pertinent facts to any future building program will be presented to them and nothing will be withheld from the public.
