## Zoning Approval Withheld

The scene at the Madison Township Municipal building was very similar, Monday, evening as the Township Council held their public hearing on the proposed zoning map for Madison Township. With the exception of a few new faces at the council table the atmosphere was the same as when the Democratic administration held their hearing on the zoning map.

Mayor Keating's administration advertised the long awaited zoning ordinance for the township just prior to the November election and many feel that the ordinance played an important part in the defeat of the Democratic Party in the November Election.

The meeting was held to capacity crowds with the room overflowing, the zoning ordinance proposal drew almost as many

spectators as the swearing-in ceremonies held on New Years Day.

Mayor Donald Macrae patiently listened to objectors in the long debated hearing and asked if there was anyone in the room that was in favor of the ordinance less than half a dozen hands appeared.

The prime difference between the Keating administration ordinance and the present ordinance is the size of the lots. The first zoning ordinance called for two acre lot sizes, this was vigorously protested by residents of the rural areas of the township that own large tracts of property. The present ordinance reduced the lot size to 1 1/2 acres, the move by the present administration did not appease the same landowners who protested that they would be unable to sell their land holdings if the 1 1/2 acre minimum lot size was approved.

The present ordinance was adopted under a Democratic Administration in 1956, various amendments to the ordinance have been added, such as lot sizes of 100' x 150' and increased road specifications. The ordinance was the first of its kind for Madison and was approved under the Jurman administration. That year the Zoning Ordinance coupled with a revaluation program was blamed for the defeat of the Democratic Administration.

There were many objections against industrial zones created in the ordinance. Residents of Central Park felt that a industrial zone in their area would create traffic hazards and would lead to "smog".

Residents in the Old Bridge area called for a commercial zone along Englishtown Road, claiming that the area had already been established as commercial area and cited the large number of stores and other business establishments along the route. Other residents objected to the commercial zoning of the area and claimed that it was a residential area and there was no need of a commercial zone along the road.

Mayor Macrae held a brief recess and then announced that the proposed ordinance would not be adopted and that it would be held over for further study.

### Zoning Ordinance Needed Now

The Madison Township Council failed to adopt the proposed zoning ordinance for Madison Township because of the variety of protests heard at the recent hearing on the ordinance.

Our Town is presently operating on a Zoning Ordinance that was adopted in 1956 which leaves much to be approved on. The ordinance adopted in 1956 was needed at the time and it did meet the needs in 1956, however, the year is now 1964.

We feel that it is about time that the residents of Madison Township realize that development is needed for Madison Township. We really believe that not one member of the township council is against development of the township.

The "development" issue has constantly been made a political football, at the present time the Democratic Candidate for Township Committee Leonard Hornster is "lambasting" the G.O.P. for allowing development in Madison Township. What of the previous Democratic administration, how many houses did they approve?

If either political party really wanted to stop development, all they would have to do is create an ordinance calling for concrete roads in all developments, increase the building material requirements, increase the size of the lots. This would certainly stop development and it would also stop Madison Township. We'd be dead.

The residents of our township that own large tracts of land would go under, many of the businessmen in the town would have to close up. Madison Township would soon be a ghost town.

In order for Madison Township to survive for the next ten years we must have development. We must bring in new ratables, whether they be homes, apartment houses, industrial ratables or commercial ratables. We need every ratable that we can get.

Adoption of a Zoning Ordinance is of dire importance to Our Town and the council should not waste anymore time on its adoption. A new zoning ordinance is needed now.

### Garden Apartments For Madison

Well at long last the Madison Township Planning Board has approved Garden Apartments for Madison Township. We feel that they will certainly be an asset for Our Town.

Not only will they be a tax ratable, and we sure can stand additional tax ratables but the purchasing power of additional adults certainly should give a "shot in the arm" to some of the business located in our area.

These people have to eat, purchase clothes, liquor and the other necessities. Funny thing about apartment dwellers, they live in their own little world of three or four rooms.

They work in the city, commuting back and forth. They rarely have a "beef" to make. They take out all their wrath on the building superintendent.

Of course like anything else "too much is a goody for not".

We welcome the Garden Apartments but let's kind of like try to keep them under control.

## UNDER THE FENCE

**FEUDING AND FUSSING:** Despite the appearance of "political" calm in both major parties in Madison Township. There is still a lot of "in" fighting going on. Following the primary election "things" will begin to jell and various groups in both political camps will begin to make deals. Both political parties are looking with interest at the campaign of John Conover who has filed as a Independent Candidate. Conover a former G.O.P. municipal chairman has strength in both G.O.P. and Democratic circles. He is well liked by members of both political camps. Rumor has it that John is busily working away to organize a John Conover Association. "If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' say, 'The Lord has need of it.'" Mark 11:3.

This text comes from the story of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on the first Palm Sunday. It is a thought provoking verse as there is so much in each of us that the Lord needs. This one was mucho higher than before.

Now after twenty years, I've been hearing after we put in the sewers we gonna fix the roads. Democrats say they gonna fix the roads, Republicans say they gonna fix the roads, but wait until the sewers are put in. It doesn't make much sense does it Joe to put in the road and then we put in the sewer and then we rip up the road.

So twenty years I wait, I don't go no more meetings and complain cause they raise my tax. I don't go and they raise my tax just same. Always everything go up and up, except my pension, that stay the same.

I canna afford a car anymore so don't make a bit of difference when it comes to driven on the road, but I can't even awalk a down the road anymore. I paida for the sewer hooking up, I'm paying for using the sewer, don't you think they shoulda pay for mixing up the road. All I say is whena they going to fix some of the roads.

I'm a sign my name to the letter but pleasea don't print because they push-up my tax some more. What are we going to do. (name withheld by request)

DEAR MR. WHITE,

I'm writing you in desperation, the situation is deplorable as far as the roads are concerned in Laurence Harbor. I complained to Mr. Leo the town manager recently and he did come down and look at the street, I guess because the next day the road department or somebody was working away.

With all the rain we've had it's worse now. I don't blame Mr. Leo, but I do feel that something should be done quickly.

Do you think it is fair to the people in the Harbor area, we pay taxes and yet our children are forced to walk in deep mired mud, we get mud in the house on our clothes and all over everything.

We try to keep clean but it is impossible to get out of the Harbor without getting some mud on you. There is mud and puddles all over the place.

Sometimes I feel like just crying, we can't move because no one would want to buy the house the way the street is without us taking a big loss on it.

Please keep after the officials Mr. White, maybe you can do something. If you'd want, I would get my neighbors to call the town hall and complain to them about it.

Please don't print my name or address cause my husband is in politics and he probably wouldn't like it. But I am so disgusted that I have to complain to someone. I imagine you get a lot of calls and letters about the roads.

## Dem Candidate Hits at G.O.P....So What's New?...

The Madison Park Democratic Club heard Mr. Leonard Hornster, Democratic Candidate for Township Committeeman Madison Township, assail the Republican Administration in Madison Township for its "TASTE FOR WASTE" and expensive additions in Patronage with a decrease in service.

Mr. Hornster added that the voters have already had their fill of poor service and waste of manpower under the short term of the Republican rule. He also stated that the Democratic party is confident the Independent and Democratic voters will support him in the coming elections.

### NOTICE OF SALE \$3,923,000 SCHOOL BONDS

Sealed proposals will be received by the Board of Education of the Township of Madison, in the County of Middlesex, New Jersey, at the office of said Board of Education, at the Madison Township High School, Route No. 316, Old Bridge, New Jersey, on the 31st day of March, 1964, at 8:00 o'clock P.M. (Eastern Standard Time) for the purchase of \$3,923,000 - SCHOOL BONDS, dated April 1, 1964 and maturing serially, in numerical order, on April 1 of each year, \$130,000 in 1965 to 1967, both inclusive, \$120,000 in 1968 to 1972, both inclusive, \$140,000 in 1973 to 1982, both inclusive, \$165,000 in 1983, \$200,000 in 1984 to 1989, both inclusive, and \$168,000 in 1990.
