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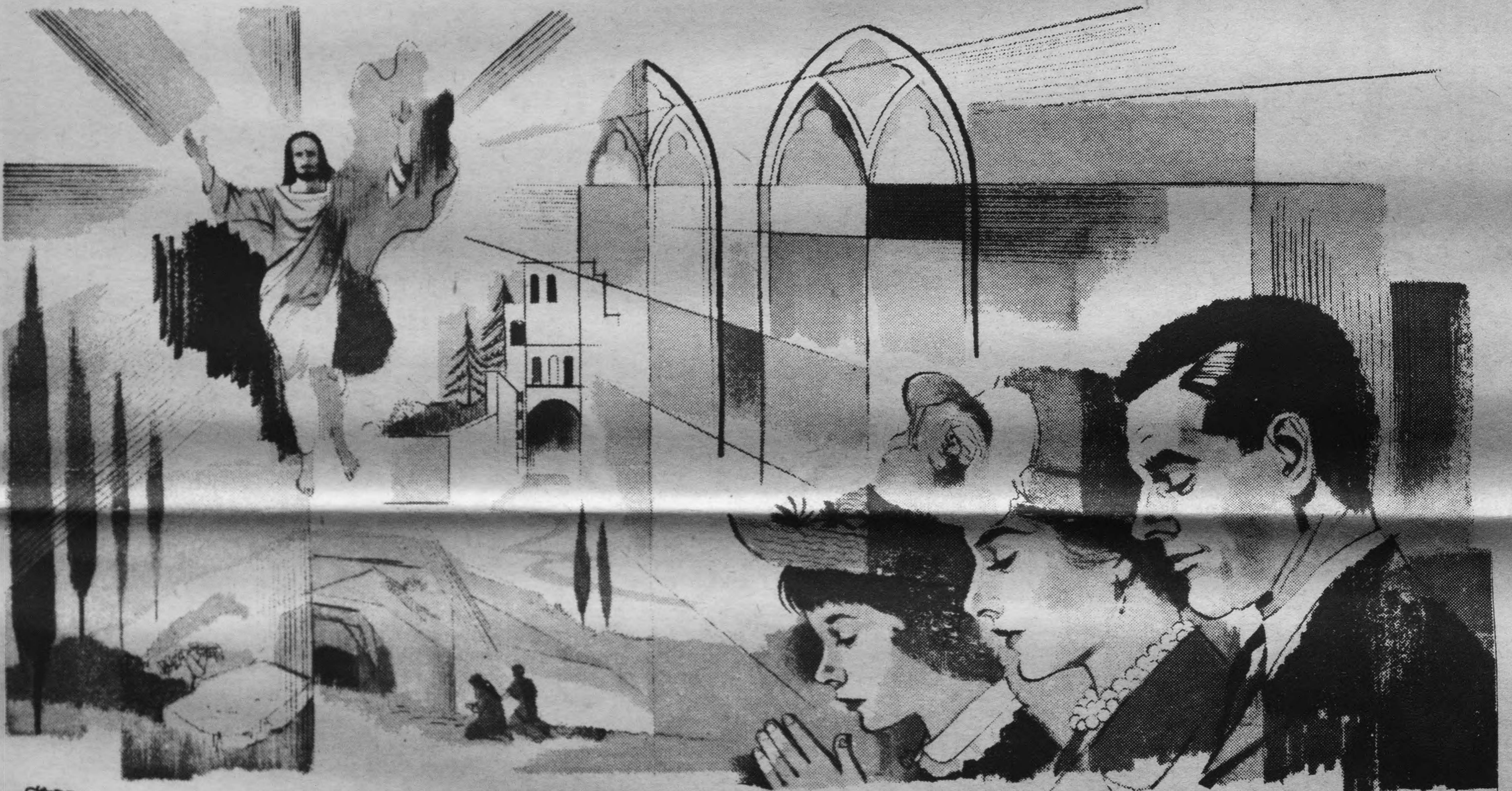
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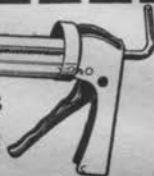
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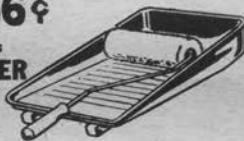

Nothing New At Local Budget Hearing

There wasn't anything new at the Madison Township Municipal Budget hearing held Tuesday evening at the Municipal Building on Route 9. The persons attending the meeting were just about the same as last year. The only great difference we

could see was just which side of the table they were sitting on. John Keating of Old Bridge was in the audience protesting the proposed 1964 Municipal Budget, course last year he was sitting at the council table as mayor. Donald Macrae who was

sitting in the audience last year was now seated as mayor. The auditor wasn't the same. You could go on and on. Vincent Cancelleri, Donald Tierney, Richard Dealy, Kenneth Banks who were seated in the audience last year were now at

the council table. Last year they had quite a bit to say about the proposed budget for 1963 but had very little to say for or against the 1964 budget.

Joseph Pandozzi was at the meeting but of course he was sitting in the audience. The questions and answers were just about the same the only thing we got out of the entire meeting was that the taxes were going to be increased and in Madison Township this is nothing new.

The meeting started at 8:15 with the pledge of allegiance to the flag followed by a short prayer led by Mayor Macrae.

Following reading of the resolution adopted and approved by the council the fire works started. Township Councilman Harry Messenger felt that the proposed "Budget" was too tight and pointed out the snow removal account and felt that this was an example that the township would not be able to operate within the frame-work of the budget.

Once again the Assistant Business Manager, or deputy clerk or finance director was brought under fire. Lee who had served as the GOP campaign manager in 1963 election came under fire for holding three jobs. Leo protested that the budget hearing wasn't the time and place to argue about his qualifications and that he was only drawing one salary of \$6,500 and no more.

Business Manager Herman, who stated that he had not prepared the present budget, had examined the budget and he too felt that it was very tight.

Thomas Miller of Old Bridge, long time opponent of all budgets protested various items in the budget and wanted to know from the council what he was getting for his tax dollars from the county. Miller also protested the police account and stated that "there were too many chiefs and too few Indians. He wanted to bring in the State

Troopers to patrol the highways of Madison Township after all we're paying them for that. Miller explained that the police department would price themselves out of existence. Miller stated that he was against this budget and it could be cut but that it wouldn't be said "that in all his years attending budget hearings he hadn't seen one cut yet".

Joseph Pandozzi of Sayre-Woods South irked Miller visibly. Pandozzi through the chairman asked two questions (1) If Mr. Miller was a political candidate and (2) If Mr. Miller was on the local municipal payroll.

Mayor Macrae answered the questions "that Mr. Miller is not a local candidate although he is a local resident, that he is seeking election to Freeholder on the GOP ticket and that he serves as a Building Inspector.

A few seconds later Miller jumped to his feet and shouted back at Pandozzi, "I am running for Freeholder and what's more I'm the Building Inspector but I don't know for how long, I took the job at \$1,200 per year on a part-time basis and it's cost me more than that already, if you want the job as building inspector Joe you can have it. Miller angrily continued "people sit there and prepare budgets that don't even know how to run their own business" Miller then apologized to several persons in the audience that he wasn't referring to them. He again stated "I'm against this budget it's too high and should be cut, we're a poor town with poor people, we can't have Cadillac taste with a Ford pocketbook".

Kenneth Banks, Township Councilman answered a question in regards to the recreation program and said that the reduction in the Recreation Budget was a result of cutting out some of the political help.

The residents at the public portion of the meeting protested the erection of two gasoline stations as a definite traffic hazard to the residents of Central Park.

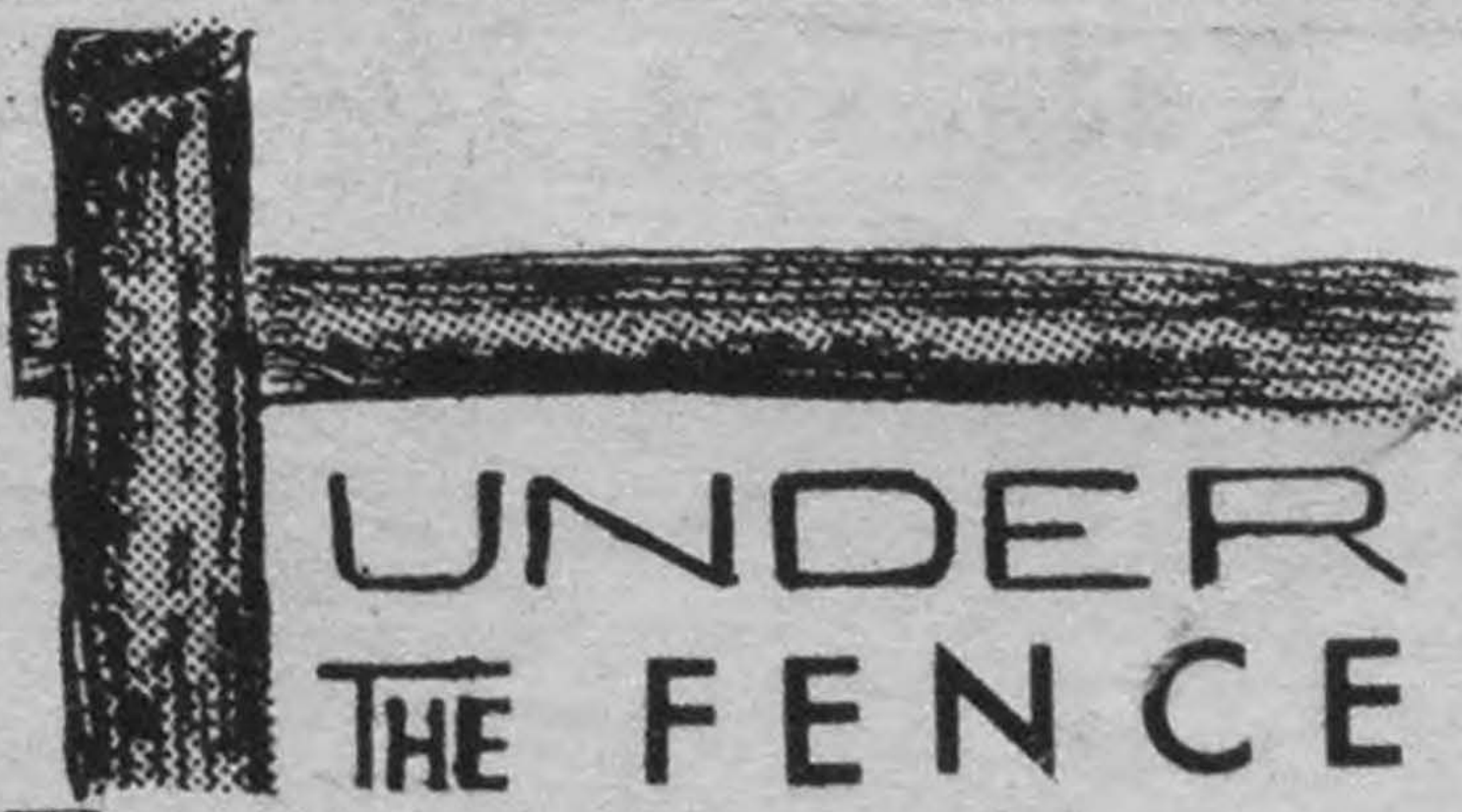
At the meeting they were told that a modern motel would be built at the site and this would include a swimming pool.

BALL AT WAIST LEVEL ADDS POWER IN APPROACH

Resting the ball comfortably at waist level prior to the approach steps an' swing is a requisite for "strikepower." Ray Schanen of Milwaukee, one of the nation's top professional bowlers and member of the Miller High Life advisory staff, demonstrates the proper stance and ball position prior to the approach and swing. As the approach starts, the ball should be pushed forward, away from the body. As your forward motion continues, the ball should be allowed to follow a natural pendulum swing down, back and forward into the release. The backswing should follow a natural course and should not be forced into excessive heights. A few practice sessions will eliminate the chest and shoulder-high starting positions which detract from good balance and aim.

The Better Education Committee, at a meeting held at the high school recently, voted to hold regular monthly meetings on the Wednesday before the third Thursday of each month.

"This night was chosen," explained president Roland Bessette, "because the Board of Education meets on the second and fourth Thursdays, and because Wednesday causes less conflict with other activities in town than other week nights."

Featured speaker at the BEC meeting was Mrs. Dorothy Carter, president of the Sayreville Committee on Public Education. Mrs. Carter outlined the background and achievements of SCOPE and answered questions from the floor.

She stressed the importance of keeping a township-wide perspective by concentrating on


major issues rather than detailed local problems. "Otherwise you wind up stepping on ants while the elephants are walking by," she said.

Mrs. Carter also emphasized the value of maintaining an active program year-round. "The School Board meets all summer," she noted, "and its then that many important decisions concerning the coming school year are made."

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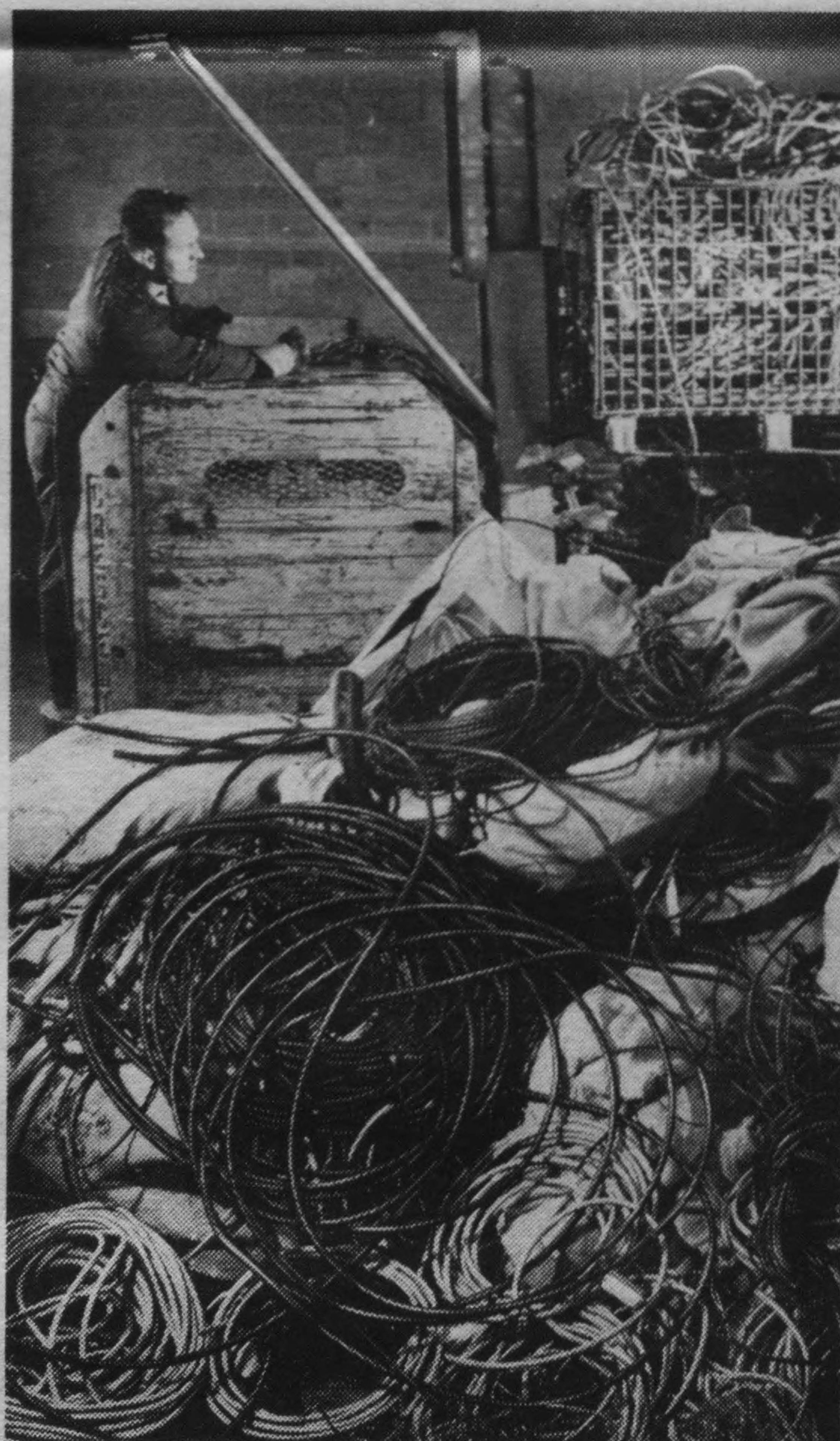

Mayor Macrae's Municipal Budget Statement

The costs of operating the municipal government will actually decline on a per capita basis this year, even though the reduction will be offset by increased costs for schools and deferred charges from the previous administration.

This observation was made recently in a statement by Mayor Donald Macrae.

The 1964 municipal budget was adopted on first reading by the municipal council Feb. 25, and met final approval at Tuesday evening's budget hearing by a 5 to 2 vote.

Macrae pointed out that, if the over-all tax rate were dependent only upon the expenses for local government, his administration could present to the taxpayers a reduction of at least 7 points in the tax rate this year.

He attributed this reduction in local governmental costs to "the adoption of sound, business-like procedures in the operation of municipal government, as a result of the hiring of professional administrators under the new council-manager form of government."

Macrae pointed to savings in the administration of the tax offices, the department of public works and in the operation of

the board of health as "areas of substantial reduction, reflecting tax dollar savings to the taxpayer."

He noted, on the other hand, that charges of about \$65,000 over which his administration had no control, must be presented to the taxpayers in this year's budget, to pay for debts incurred by the previous administration.

"It will be up to my administration to pick up the tab for emergency authorizations, over-expenditures and expenditures without appropriation by the last administration—all of which add up to some 26 points on the local tax bill.

"Our meeting these deferred charges will not only liquidate the 7 point saving we could have presented to the taxpayer this year, but it will also force the local purposes tax to increase by 19 additional points."

Macrae continued, "At the same time, the costs of the school referendum approved last year by the voters of this community will be reflected in this year's overall tax rate, as will be the additional costs of the new veterans and senior citizens' exemption approved as one of the public questions on the ballot during the November, 1963 general election.

"It is generally understood by the voters that these, as well as the county tax rate are not connected in any way with local government expenses.

"However, in the realm of municipal government operating costs, tight spending policies and sound administration will permit us to provide marked savings to the local taxpayer.

"And these will go a long way towards helping us meet our 1963 deadline for actually reducing the local purposes tax in Madison Township."

Macrae noted that members of the Republican majority which now controls the council pledged last year that they would effect a reduction in the municipal purposes tax before the November, 1965 general election.

"In view of the savings we have already been able to make, we are more confident than ever that we will fulfill that platform pledge next year."

He added that the municipality's last tax cut was introduced during the last Republican administration. "We did it before and we are going to do it again," he concluded.
