Board Names New School Superintendent

Dr. John W. Khouri of Temple, Pennsylvania, was hired as the new Madison Township Superintendent of Schools. He replaces Dr. William J. Sample who resigned a few months ago following an argument with the board

accusing them of spying on his administration and interfering in school matters. Sample received \$17,000 per year. Dr. Khouri will be paid \$18,000 per year. Dr. Khouri, former superintendent of the Muhlenberg Town-

ship, Pennsylvania, school system, has an extensive educational background. He received his Doctorate of Education degree from the University of Pittsburgh. He holds a Master of Arts and a Master of Educational

degree from the same university. Dr. Khouri won his Bachelor of Arts diploma from Geneva College where he was graduated with the highest honors.

The new school chief has also done graduate work at Temple University and the University of Pennsylvania. He is the author of several publications, among them a book entitled "Basic Consideration in Pupil Classroom Control", which is used extensively in public schools by faculties.

Dr. Khouri is listed in "Who's Who in the East" and in "Who's Who in American Education." He is a member of the American Board of Scholars and a consultant for the White House Youth Conference.

His educational efforts include an instructorship at the University of Pittsburgh, a professor of history and head of the department at Albright College. He taught in the Pittsburgh Schools and was also a Research Fellow at the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. Khouri was superintendent of the Pennsylvania school district for ten years prior to the local appointment.

He was an active member of many civic organizations in Pennsylvania. He participated in historic and youth enterprises such as historical society efforts, Red Cross, Camp Fire Girls, YMCA and the county mental health board.

Dr. Khouri will be tendered a contract for two years starting at \$18,000 per year escalating to \$19,000 for the second year of employment.

He will not assume his new duties at Madison until sometime late next month. He will familiarize himself with the local system by frequent trips and weekend stays studying the local scene until he permanently moves here in October.

Dr. Khouri presently resides at 503 North Temple Boulevard, Temple, Pennsylvania, with his wife, Mary Louise and a daughter Mary Alice aged 12 and a son John David, aged 10.

Three Horses Die As Result Of Fire

Pine "Blasts" School Board Majority Over Football Field Site

Richard Pine, athletic chairman of the Madison Township Board of Education denounced the majority members of the school body by blasting five of the members calling them "Poor Sports and Wet Blankets", when they refused to go along with Pine's motion to permit the Sayre Woods South Rebels of the Madison Township Pop Warner Football League, to use part of School 19's property for a gridiron during the coming season. The Sayre Woods South football group which is coached by Gene Vroom, former Wisconsin University football star, offered to put the field in shape and later improve it as a playground for

all neighborhood children. This plan was opposed by a group of nearby residents who didn't want the field "in their backyards".

Voting for the motion to permit the use of the field for junior football and supporting Pine were Charles Thompson, Robert Nixon and James Garland. Voting against giving the youngsters a place to play football were William Kerr, Margery Turner, Carol Kosobucki, William Rice and Lindley Higgins.

Kerr said that the two groups, those for it and those against it, should get together on the field. Pine felt that the fight for the field's use was at an impasse

and the two parties just couldn't ever get together. Those against the motion tried to delay action on it.

Pine argued that "It was for the good of the children." Pine pressed for a vote on his motion claiming "We'll never resolve this matter by running away from it". At one point Pine exchanged angry words with several of the protesters who were in the audience.

In a parting shot after the vote Pine accused Kerr, Higgins, Rice, Miss Turner and Mrs. Kosobucki of being prejudiced and trying to "stifle an All-American sport."

The day's ceremonies will begin on the Gaub tract which is located at Margaret and Awn Streets, Sayre Woods South starting at 2 p.m.

The entourage then will move to School 21's site at Par and Cindy Streets, also Sayre Woods

South where the ground breaking will get underway at 2:45 p.m.

The third ceremony of the afternoon will be held at the head of Birchwood Drive, Cliffwood Beach, west of Route 35 and will begin at 3:45 p.m.

At no time have the Police been called by me while children have been playing on their own properties, or in front of same. I asked some boys that were playing ball directly in front of my house, politely as possible, to play elsewhere due to my wife's illness.

Manager Lists Achievements

Highlights of municipal Manager Paul H. Hermann's first six months in office are contained in a six month report currently being finalized for submission to the Council.

High on Hermann's list of principal accomplishments are tax dollar savings through improved business procedures, greater efficiency through renovations in the municipal building and an expanded public work program.

Hermann pointed to the institution of a central purchasing system and the revision of purchasing procedures which have resulted in savings of thousands of dollars in costs for the Township.

In the purchase of gasoline and asphalt material, for example, the Township has saved about \$4,500 annually because of these charges in business practices.

"In addition, the establishment of a new bookkeeping system has enabled us to keep a closer eye upon the operating cost of various departments," Hermann said.

The Municipal Manager said that renovation of the Municipal Building has improved the efficiency of the administrative operation of municipal government and has provided at the same time space for use as a manager's office.

Various changes and renovations in the Police Department have not only provided for proper quarters for the Chief of Police, but has also made possible more adequate facilities for the bureau of traffic safety and the police captains office.

Magistrate Samuel Sladkus stated that he is pleased with the appearance of the Court Room. "The increased volume of Court fines by more than \$8,000 over a corresponding six month period of last year, more than justifies the renovation of the violation Clerk's Office," Judge Sladkus added.

Hermann also pointed to "Madison Township's most ambitious road reconstruction and maintenance program in years as a result of taking full advantage of current and prior year's state aid formula money for roads.

"The Township has also equipped the police department with five new cruisers on a rental basis, thereby assuring maximum dependability at fixed cost," Hermann said.

He added that the old Police cars have been reassigned in order to provide adequate transportation for the Chief of Police, Detective Bureau and Department of Public Works.

"In addition, to establishing a central Department of Public Works, we have replaced a substantial amount of road department equipment, inaugurated several renovations in the works department headquarters and reduced substantially the overall cost of the public works operation.

Hermann also drew attention

to the establishment of a full-time building inspector's department, making possible inspections of buildings work undertaken in the Township during the day.

"In addition, we have revised an outdated building permit fee system. These revisions have yielded \$85,000 in a seven month

period, as compared to a total of \$8,700 for all last year, Hermann observed.

"Further administrative improvements are in the prospect with a comprehensive personnel ordinance already prepared and under study; along with feasibility study of Machine Book-keeping," Herman concluded.

Kickoff Meeting Of Madison Blood Bank

At the last meeting of the Madison Township Blood Bank, which was attended by Officials of the American Red Cross, several Township Organizations indicated their interest in participating in the Bloodmobile visit which will take place at the Madison Township High School on Saturday, October 10, 1964 from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Among those organizations represented were The Old Bridge First Aid and Rescue Squad. The Holy Name and Rosary Societies of St. Ambrose, St. Bernadettes and St. Thomas. The PTA's of Willis and Schools 18, 19 and 20, and the Knights of Columbus.

John J. Jaconetti, Chairman of the Blood Bank, addressed the audience giving a review of the

history of the Madison Township Blood Bank, the various uses of blood and the methods of recruiting blood donors. Mr. Jaconetti also pointed out the advantages of donating blood in that a donor automatically covers himself and his household for their normal blood needs for one full year and that he will experience a great deal of satisfaction as a result of donating blood because he knows he is helping his family and possibly his neighbor.

It was indicated that Blood Bank speakers are available to talk at any organization meeting in the Township to explain and discuss the benefits of donating blood on October 10, Saturday, at the Madison Township High School between 10 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

James P. Forbes, Co-Chairman, announced that the Blood Bank will be represented at the Madison Township Fair and that Officers of the Blood Bank will be there to answer questions and arrange for donor appointments.

The next Madison Township Blood Bank meeting will be held Tuesday, September 22 at 8:30 p.m. in the Madison Township High School. At that time, final plans for the forthcoming Bloodmobile visit will be discussed. All persons or organizations interested in participating are invited to attend.
