Details for the establishmen of a child health program in Madison Township were outlined today by Councilman Kenneth H. Banks, president of the board of health.

Banks said the new program will provide health supervision for well infants and children under five years of age and guidance for parents with regard to their children's health needs.

Undertaken in conjunction with the Visiting Nurse Association In Middlesex County,' the first child health station is slated to be held on Wednesday, Nov. 4 at the American Legion Home, Summerfield Ave., Laurence Harbor.

Election only 20 days away there is a relative calm feeling with the

voters of Madison Township. The local G.O.P. forces and Dem.

Chairman and ex - Township Building Inspector is seeking election as an Independent Candidate in the November Election. Conover was very popular with the members of the Republican Party at one time following various primary fights where he opposed organization candidates. A serious rift developed between Conover and Donald Borst who presently heads the G.O.P. organization on the local level. Conover made several unsuccessful attempts to gain a seat in the local G.O.P. Ticket in several Primary races. He is now seeking election as an Independent Candidate. Carl Hood of Laurence Harbor is presently serving as his Campaign Manager, it is expected that most of his vote (Conover) will come from the Laurence Harbor - Cliffwood Beach area.

Seeking election on the Repub-lican Ticket is Kenneth Banks from the Cheesequake area of Madison Township. Banks was a long time resident of the Cliffwood Beach area and is popular in the Cliffwood Beach and Laurence Harbor area. On two previous occasions Banks has been defeated at the polls as a candidate. He was appointed for a one year term at the reorganizameeting of the Township Council following the resignation of John Gavlin of SayreWoods

Decide Council Race The Democratic Candidate is Lenard Hornster of Cliffwood Beach. Hornster is fairly new to the political game in Madison Township. His wife served several terms as Democratic Committeewoman from the Cliffwood Beach area. Hornster was se-

lected prior to the Democratic

Primary by the Democratic County Committee. Closest con-

tender was Joseph Pandozzi of

SayreWoods South. Pandozzi had

lost his bid for re-election in the

November election by a mere twenty votes. The election in 1964 for Councilman will not change control of the Township Committee which is presently made up of two Demo-

crats and five Republicans. Hornster's bid for election has been made a little more difficult due to the fact that Harry Messenger and Victor O'Brien. Democratic Councilmen, have voted on almost all major issues such as housing, garden apartments, zoning, issuing of liquor licenses with the G.O.P. majority. This closes the door on many of Hornster's attacks and has actually "ham-strung" many of his prime areas of attack.

The local campaigns as of todate have been quiet, attendance at the various functions hasn't been spectacular for either the or Democratic affairs. G.O.P. The bulk residents of Madison Township seem to be quietly and patiently waiting for Election Day when anything can happen. We feel that the local campaign will be decided on a National Issue, if large numbers of the voters turn out and vote for President Johnson, then Horn-ster will be elected. 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Vote No On NameChange

The voters of Madison Township will be asked on the November ballot to vote for the changing of the name of the Township.

We urge the voters of Our Town to leave the name as it is.

There are many stories circulating that if the name of the Township is changed Madison Township will be able to get it's very own post office. This is not so. Madison Township will get a central post office only when the need for one arises.

The Post Cffice Department has been seeking ways of curtailing expenses and it seems unlikely that they would come down to Madison and build us a Post Cffice just because we changed the name of the Township.

The question of a name change was put on the ballot by the signing of a petition. Regardless of the number of names on the petition we feel that most signers did not realize the cost and expenses it would involve in changing the Township name. We have a petition in our possession which asks the Board of Education to change the color of the toilet paper used in the school system so there won't be any discrimination, this petition was signed by nearly 100 voters of the township, who were asked to read it and sign, we doubt if very many of them took the time to read the petition.

We do not feel that it will be in the best interest of the taxpayers of Our Town, to change the name of the Township at this time. We urge all the voters of the Township to vote against any name change at this time.

more efficient operation, bulk buying of equipment and insurance coverages. Further, the practice of contributing \$750 per year to the Tax Supported Fire Companies should be discontinued with a savings of another \$3000.

While combining the operation the great Inequity of charging some residents .83 per \$100 assessment as opposed to a minimum of .37 per \$100 assessment would be eliminated. There is no objection to paying Fire Taxes but we should expect to be paying on an equal proportion.

This is certainly one of the most serious problems which presently exist in our Township. Not only should the Council be called upon to rectify this great wrong but the candidates who seek office should be called upon to take a public stand. Shall we continue to have representation for the special interest minority or shall we return to the good principle of representation for the majority? Certainly the present system borders on the Conflict of Interest side of the law.

All the information and facts outlined have been gained as a result of my past affiliation as a fireman and from my past and present membership on the Board of Fire Commissioners, where I have served as District Clerk since January 1961.

WATER, WATER, WATER: It seems like just last year when the Democratic Administration was faced with a water rate increase in the Laurence Harbor area. Officials Seek To End Traffic Hazard

State, county, and local officials are at work attempting to solve a traffic safety hazard which has been distressing parents of children now attending the Willis and Miller schools in Old Bridge.

The hazard exists at the Route 516 bridge passing over Route 18 in Old Bridge. Hundreds of children use the bridge daily to travel west from the Englishtown Rd, area of Old Bridge to the two schools.

Township officials have been pressing the state highway department for the erection of a railing along the pedestrian walk on the bridge to protect children from injury by passing traffic. At the same time, they have asked for fencing along the outer side of the bridge to prevent children from falling to the highway below.

Township Manager Paul H. Hermann, deputy manager Joseph P. Leo and police captain William Wallis, head of the traffic safety bureau, conferred last week with State Highway Department and county officials for a solution to the problem. Route 516 is a county road, while Route 18 is a state highway. The Bridge was constructed by the State Highway Department in 1959.

Hermann says he is confident that the Highway Department will cooperate in the installation of the fencing on the outer side of the bridge, but that the department has several reservations concerning the rail along the pedestrian walk.

The state will conduct a study of traffic volume at the location and will also investigate possible changes in the traffic lanes to alleviate the problem, Hermann
