Revolt Brewing In Democratic Party— 11 Hit The Road—May Seek Ouster Of Pandozzi

There are four candidates for Township Council which must be elected presently, the seats are held by Harry Messenger, Democrat; Leonard Hornster, Democrat; Victor O'Brien, Democrat; and Vincent Cancellieri, Republican. In order for the Democratic Party to take complete control of the Township Council they must elect four members to the council.

Nine members of the Democratic County Committee walked out of the meeting protesting the action of the Democratic Municipal Chairman. According to some reports various County Committeemen and County Committeewomen, will contact Mr. David T. Wilentz in regards to the meeting.

The next regular meeting of the Democratic County Committee is scheduled for May and at this time a move might come about to oust Pandozzi and Democratic Municipal Chairman. Members of the County Committee are elected at the Primary election and in some instances where persons have resigned, the vacancies are filled by appointment.

The Democratic Municipal Chairman is selected by majority vote between the members of the County Committee.

Many Republican leaders in the Township are taking a wait and see attitude in regards to the Democratic split. If the Democrats split in the Primary it may take some real doing to bring them back together for the November election regardless of who the candidates for council are.

New League Being Formed In Township

Ray Blankenhorn, president of the Madison Township Pop Warner League, announced that plans are under way to organize a bantam division football team and that men experienced in coaching the sport are needed for the new eleven.

The bantam division play operates for boys from 13 to 16 years of age and weighing from 115 to 135 pounds. The league presently fields teams from Sayre Woods South, Old Bridge, Madison Park and Laurence Harbor, in both the pee wee and midget

classes. These two divisions are for younger boys.

Richard Pine, athletic chairman of the Board of Education, said that the local Pop Warner movement "is a great boon to the future of the Madison Township High School football fortunes as it prepares the youth of our township for greater accomplishments on the gridiron during the coming years."

Blankenhorn's league provides supervised play for over 300 boys throughout Madison every Autumn. The league was organized by Robert Knight four years ago.

Inspection Fees For Madison Hills Set At Over \$39,000

The proposed Madison Hills garden apartment development awaiting action next week by the township council will represent an income to the township of between \$45,000 and \$50,000 in building fees if approved, it was revealed today.

In response to an inquiry from municipal manager Paul H. Hermann's office, building inspector Edward Vasquez calculated today that the building fees for Madison Hills would average at least \$40 per unit for the 960 units—or almost \$39,000.

In addition, Vasquez noted that certificate of occupancy fees would net the township approximately eight dollars per unit, or about \$7600.

It has been customary for developers to apply for all building permits at the same time.

the building inspector stated. The income from building fees would therefore be an immediate source of income to the township. On the other hand, the certificate of occupancy fees would be collected as the units are completed.

Vasquez said the developer of Madison Hills has indicated that the entire project would require more than four years to construct.

Triangle Gardens, the last garden apartment project to apply for building permits, produced more than \$22,000 in building fees to the township, Vasquez said.

In releasing the figures, Hermann noted that the income which they reflected did not include revenue from plumbing fees and from building fees levied against garages planned in the Madison Hills development.

We feel that there will be a "third party" in the November Election Race and it is quite possible that certain elements are no more interested in their own political parties than the "man in the moon."



Madison High Receives Grant

Albert B. Jacobs, principal of the Madison Township High School, announced that the school has been the recipient of a grant from the Foundation for Re-employment of New York. This grant supplements a program coordinated and administered by Mrs. Mary S. Sisley of the guidance department.

The junior class students of the school constitute a pilot group with whom a technique in vocational guidance is now being used. This is a completely personalized technique. The group is studied, through a questionnaire, the achievements of a boy or girl in chronological periods of his or her life.

The achievements of the study are then translated into a job structure. This operation has been used successfully with adults in identifying skills that are transferrable to job families.

If used early in a student's career, this evaluation measurement could have a direct effect on programming, motivation, goals and future plans of each pupil. In this way more terminal students of the local secondary

Manager Sees Apartments As \$\$\$ In The Bank

A critical factor in the study of garden apartment development which Municipal Manager Paul H. Hermann is currently preparing for the Township Council is the impact upon the tax picture of the community, it was noted today.

Hermann said in a statement that "new sources of revenue must be constantly sought by the Township if it is to resist spiraling increases in the tax rate for school costs."

"An illustration of this problem is seen in the tax picture of the Sayre Woods South development. Our figures reveal that the 1808 homes in the four sections of Sayre Woods South and Creighton Village produced \$620,000 in school taxes last year.

At the same time, the school system absorbed 2,017 children from those homes, at a cost of more than one million dollars for education alone.

Hermann continued, "Obviously, it can be seen that single-dwelling development homes are not in a position to 'pay their way' for educational costs.

"Sayre Woods South, from the financial standpoint of the community, represents a loss of more than \$300,000 in school expenses. Some of this loss is offset by state aid, but there still exists a deficit of between one quarter of a million dollars and \$300,000.

"If we are to properly educate

the youngsters in Sayre Woods South, therefore, the rest of the Township, along with various commercial retailables, stores, industries and garden apartments, must pick up the difference between the school taxes the homeowners of Sayre Woods South pay and the costs which the municipality must meet in order to educate the children of Sayre Woods South.

The Manager stated, "Since it is the job of our office to develop the sources of income that can support the municipal operation, it is of great importance that we secure some reliable indication as to whether garden apartment development represents a profitable direction for the Township to go."

"It has already been established that multiple-dwelling units tend to have much fewer children than do single-unit development type homes, and therefore are more attractive as a ratable than housing subdivisions."

"What remains to be seen is just how profitable such a ratable will be for the Township. And this can be done by studying the number of school-age children garden apartment development tends to bring into a municipality, the increase in the municipal services which may be required and the degree to which these are offset by the tax revenues to the Township which will be forthcoming," Hermann concluded.



AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAIR, CLOSING AND DEMOLITION OF ANY BUILDING OR BUILDINGS THAT ARE SO OLD, DELAPIDATED OR HAVE BECOME SO OUT-OF-REPAIR AS TO BE DANGEROUS, UNSAFE, UNSANITARY OR OTHERWISE UNFIT FOR HUMAN HABITATION OR OCCUPANCY OR USE, ARE INIMICAL TO THE WELFARE AND DANGEROUS AND INJURIOUS TO THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON, PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY SET FORTH IN CHAPTER 112 OF THE LAWS OF 1942, AND THE AMENDMENTS AND SUPPLEMENTS THERETO.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX, that:

**ARTICLE I
DEFINITIONS**

Section 1 - a. "Public Authority" shall mean any housing authority or any officer, including the Township Manager, who is in charge of any department or branch of the government of the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex, or State of New Jersey, relating to health, fire, building regulations, or to other activities concerning buildings in the municipality.

b. "Owner" shall mean the holder or holders of the title in fee simple.

c. "Parties in Interest" shall mean all individuals, associations and corporations who have interests of record in a building and any who are in actual possession thereof.

d. "Building" shall mean any building, or structure, or part thereof, whether used for human habitation or otherwise, and includes any outhouses, and appurtenances belonging thereto and usually enjoyed therewith.

Section 2 - The building inspector of the Township of Madison is hereby designated and appointed to exercise the powers prescribed by this Ordinance.

Section 3 - Whenever a petition is filed with the building inspector of the Township of Madison by a public authority or by at least five (5) residents of the Township of Madison charging that any building is unfit for human habitation or occupancy or use or whenever it appears to the building inspector (on his own motion) that any building is unfit for human habitation or occupancy or use, the building inspector shall, if his preliminary investigation discloses a basis for such charges issue and cause to be served upon the owner of and parties in interest in such building a complaint stating the charges in that respect and containing a notice that a hearing will be held before the building inspector at a place therein fixed not less than ten (10) days nor more than thirty (30) days after the serving of said complaint; the owner and parties in interest shall have the right to file an answer to the complaint and to appear in person, or otherwise, and give testimony at the place and time fixed in the complaint; the rules of evidence prevailing in the courts shall not be controlling in hearings before the building inspector.

Section 4 - If, after such notice and hearing, the building inspector determines that the building under consideration is unfit for human habitation or occupancy or use, he shall state in writing his findings of fact in support of such determination, and shall issue and cause to be served upon the owner thereof and parties in interest, an order:

1. Requiring the repair, alteration or improvement of the said building to be made by the owner, within a reasonable time, which time shall be set forth in the order or at the option of the owner to vacate or have the said building vacated and closed within the time set forth in the order; and

2. If the building is in such a condition as to make it dangerous to the health and safety of persons on or near the premises, and the owner fails to repair, alter or improve the said building within the time specified in the order, then the owner shall be required to remove or demolish the said building within a reasonable time as specified in the said order of removal.

Section 5 - If the owner fails to comply with an order to repair, alter or improve or, at the option of the owner, to vacate and close the building, the building inspector may cause such building to be repaired, altered or improved, or to be vacated and closed; that the building inspector may cause to be posted on the main entrance of any building so closed, a placard with the following words: "This building is unfit for human habitation or occupancy or use; the use or occupation of this building is prohibited and unlawful."

Section 6 - If the owner fails to comply with an order to remove or demolish the building, the building inspector may cause such building to be removed or demolished or may contract for the removal or demolition thereof after advertisement

for, and receipt of, bids therefor.

Section 7 - The amount of

1. The cost of the filing of legal papers, expert witnesses' fees, search fees and advertising charges, incurred in the course of any proceeding taken under this act determined in favor of the municipality, and

2. Such cost of such repairs, alterations or improvements, or vacating and closing, or removal or demolition, if any, or the amount of the balance thereof remaining after deduction of the sum, if any, realized from the sale of materials derived from such building or from any contract for removal or demolition thereof, shall be a municipal lien against the real property upon which such cost was incurred. If the building is removed or demolished by the building inspector, he shall sell the materials of such building. There shall be credited against the cost of the removal or demolition thereof, the proceeds of any sale of such materials or any sum derived from any contract for the removal or demolition of the building. If there are no such credits or if the sum total of such costs exceeds the total of such credits, a detailed statement of the aforesaid costs and the amount so due shall be filed with the municipal tax assessor or other custodian of the records of tax liens and a copy thereof shall be forthwith forwarded to the owner by registered mail. If the total of the credits exceed such costs, the balance remaining shall be deposited in the Superior Court by the building inspector, shall be secured in such manner as may be directed by such court, and shall be disbursed according to the order or judgment of the court to the persons found to be entitled thereto by final order or judgment of such court; provided, however, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to impair or limit in any way the power of the Township to define and declare nuisances and to cause their removal or abatement, by summary proceedings or otherwise. Any owner or party in interest may, within sixty (60) days from the date of the filing of the lien certificate, proceed in a summary manner in the Superior Court to contest the reasonableness of the amount or the accuracy of the costs set forth in the municipal lien certificate.

**ARTICLE II
STANDARDS**

The Building Inspector may determine that a building is unfit for human habitation or occupancy or use if he finds that conditions exist in such building which are dangerous or injurious to the health or safety of the occupants of such building, the occupants of neighboring buildings or other residents of the Township; such conditions may include the following (without limiting the generality of the

foregoing): defects therein increasing the hazards of fire, accident, or other calamities; lack of adequate ventilation, light, or sanitary facilities; dilapidation; disrepair, structural defects; uncleanness:

**ARTICLE III
SERVICE OF COMPLAINTS AND ORDERS**

Complaints or orders issued by the Building Inspector pursuant to this Ordinance shall be served upon persons either personally or by registered mail, but if the whereabouts of such persons is unknown and the same cannot be ascertained by the building inspector in the exercise of reasonable diligence, and the building inspector shall make an affidavit to that effect, then the serving of such complaint or order upon such persons may be made by publishing the same once each week for two successive weeks in a newspaper printed and published in Middlesex County and circulating in Madison Township and designated by the Council of the Township of Madison as a newspaper to be used for the publication of legal notices and advertisements of the Township. A copy of such complaint or order shall be posted in a conspicuous place on premises affected by the Complaint or order. A copy of such complaint or order shall be duly recorded or lodged for record with the county recording officer of the county in which the building is located.

**ARTICLE IV
REMEDIES**

Any person aggrieved by an order issued by a building inspector under this ordinance, may, within sixty (60) days after the posting and service of such order, bring an action for injunctive relief to restrain the building inspector from carrying out the provisions of the order and for any other appropriate relief. The court may proceed in the action in a summary manner or otherwise. The remedy herein provided shall be exclusive, and no person affected by an order of the building inspector shall be entitled to recover any damages for action taken pursuant thereto, or because of noncompliance by any person with any order of the building inspector.

**ARTICLE V
ADDITIONAL POWERS OF BUILDING INSPECTOR**

The Building Inspector shall have the following powers in addition to others herein granted:

1. To investigate the building conditions in the Township of Madison in order to determine which buildings therein are unfit for human habitation or occupancy or use;

2. To administer oaths, affirmations examine witnesses and receive evidence;

3. To enter upon premises for the purpose of making examinations; provided, that such entries shall be made in such manner as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the persons in possession;

4. To appoint and fix the duties

of such officers, agents and employees as he deems necessary to carry out the purposes of this ordinance; and

5. To delegate any of his functions and powers under this ordinance to such officers and agents as he may designate.

**ARTICLE VI
SUPPLEMENTAL NATURE OF ORDINANCE**

Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to obrogate or impair the powers of the courts or of any department of the Township of Madison to enforce any provisions of its charter or its ordinances or regulations nor to prevent or punish violations thereof; and the powers enumerated in this Ordinance shall be in addition and supplemental to the powers conferred by any other law.

**ARTICLE VII
SEVERABILITY**

If any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage and publication according to law.

PUBLIC NOTICE


