The boiling dispute over Madison Hills Gardens Apartments finally came to a head Monday night, when the council, after months of arguments and hearings, voted to approve the 960-unit apartment development.

joined with Mayor Harry Messenger and councilmen Leonard Hornster and Victor O'Brien to give the apartments their needed majority vote. Only Councilman Donald D. Tierney opposed the application in the balloting, although Richard J. Dealy abstained on the grounds that he felt that current state statutes do not permit council action on garden apartments.

Township attorney Richard F. Plechner ruled against Dealy's contention, however, pointing out that township ordinance required council action, and that Dealy had himself, as a member of the planning board and as a councilman voted in favor of the current ordinance provision for council

approval.

The meeting was disrupted by heated outbreaks and exchanges as members of the audience sought to delay the council vote and speak on various "points of order."

Mayor Harry Messenger cautioned the public that the council would not be subjected to "mob rule" and that he would order the session adjourned if the disturbances continued.

Councilman Leonard Hornster stated that each councilman should vote "according to his conscience, not according to pressure from a mob which brings organized protest to a council meeting."

manded recognition on points of order and then yielded the floor to members of the audience. Township attorney Plechner stated the procedure was not in order, but the council decided to hear the points expressed by two residents.

Robert Reed of Sayre Woods South demanded that Cancellieri disqualify himself from voting on the application on the grounds that his lumber firm sells lumber to garden apartment developers.

Cancellieri immediately denied any connection with Madison Hills. When Mayor Harry Messenger demanded of Reed, "Are you accusing Mr. Cancellieri of a conflict of interest, Reed softened his charges and declined to state his argument so strongly.

Herbert Gordon of Sayre Woods South demanded that Messenger, O'Brien and Hornster disqualify themselves from voting on the application in that their campaign manager in the recent primary election is an employee of Jacobson, Goldfarn and Tanzman Real Estate firm, which represents Madison Hills.

Attorney Plechner ruled the connection "too remote" to constitute any form of a conflict.

When Gordon and Reed had made their accusations, one member of the audience shouted, "They're stooping pretty low when they have to smear half the council just to defeat this apartment project."

The organized opposition to Madison Hills came for the most part from Sayre Woods South residents, both Republican and Democrat, a factor which reaffirmed the existence of a coalition of "development dissidents" in both parties functioning in opposition to the present township administration.

One of Tierney's contentions in opposing the application was that Madison Hills had not complied with all the requirements established by the planning board as conditions for approval by the council.

He cited a requirement of approval by the Borough of Sayreville for a proposed breaking of a curb in that borough to permit a flow of traffic onto Ernston Road.

Messenger and Macrae contended that all requirements for council action had been met, and read a verbatim transcript of planning board minutes to prove their case.

Lengthy speeches by residents opposing the apartment application were roundly cheered by the group of residents in attendance. But the councilmen remained firm in their stand on the controversial application.

An equally controversial subject for discussion at the council session was the new system of assessments practiced by Tax Assessor Frank R. Viofora under the new Chapter 51 legislation.

Angry citizens contended that the assessor had been discriminatory towards some sections of town to help others receive tax breaks. They contended the central section received "stupendous" increases while Sayre Woods South, Central Park and some Madison Park homes received mild decreases.

Viofora explained the complicated system used in evaluating the various pieces of property in the township and contended that the system was accepted and approved by county and state officials.

It Doesn't Make Sense

The township council Monday night was once again deluged by a mob of "development dissidents" who demanded that the governing body reject the Madison Hills Garden Apartment application.

We think it's great that township residents should attend council sessions and voice their ideas on local affairs. In fact, more people should get down to see their town fathers in action.

But the unruly group which attends township meetings and tries to "bully" the members of the council is not contributing to the overall good of the town.

It seems strange that the opposition to the garden apartments appears to come from certain elements in one or two large housing developments, and yet it is precisely from these same developments that the township's most critical tax problems arise.

Madison Township residents are faced with sky-rocketing taxes because we must educate a growing army of youngsters, coming primarily from these large developments. We don't object to education, make that clear enough. But we just don't think it makes sense that, when Our Town fathers try to bring in the garden apartment ratables in order to support soaring education costs, the very people who do most of the protesting are the residents who are at the base of the problem.

These people would apparently prefer that the township just stand still and let taxes break the bank of the home-owner instead of moving forward to get new ratables.

We should know this by now--that either Our Town is going to expand and develop and therefore provide better education for our youngsters or else it is going to sit tight and watch taxes go out of this world and the education of the township go to pot.

The "development dissidents" say "sit tight--stand still." We just don't think it makes sense.
