Manager To Attend "Heatherwood" Hearing

Hermann has announced that he plans to attend the bankruptcy hearings slated in the case of Heatherwood Estates, the 190home development which filed for bankruptcy this week.

Hermann explained today that

his principal concern is the protection of township interests, particularly the residents of the development, itself, who are awaiting action by the developer on numerous complaints relating workmanship and contract

It's A Long Way To Camp Cowaw

"The township is responsible for road construction and maintenance and will act to see that the roads in Heatherwood are adequately provided for in whatever action the courts may take when the Heatherwood matter is disposed of," Hermann said.

"My chief concern will be to alert the authorities in the matter that the Township of Madison has a vested interest in any action which affects the Heatherwood residents. The amount of work-of both a private and public nature--which remains to be done in this development is tremen-

dous. "Our appearance in the proceedings will be aimed at guaranteeing that this work is performed and that our interest will be protected."

The Heatherwood Estates development has been a source of continual controversy in the township since its approval by the township committee in 1963.

Deputy Township Manager Joseph P. Leo, in his capacity as acting manager in 1964, and later Paul Hermann himself have each closed down all work on the development as a result of violations by the contractors.

Leo's action was prompted by the construction of foundations which were not in accordance with plans approved by the planning board and F.H.A. The builder subsequently remedied the defects.

Later, it was discovered that the developer was installing storm drain pipes which were smaller than the dimensions initially approved by the planning board. After Hermann closed down all work at the site, the developer finally agreed to in-

"The growing pains which Madison Township now is experiencing are a result of rapid housing development and the township's efforts to keep pace with the demands of the various housing developments.

"As township manager, it is my duty in a case such as that of Heatherwood to see that the final action taken in the bankruptcy matter will result in no new drain on the facities of the township," Hermann concluded.

pupils, both elementary and secondary, will attend classes on a full session schedule for the first time in many years.

With the exception of the outside site work at the various buildings, the schools will be completely functional according to the architect. Finishing touches are now in process and the school furnishings are ready to be put in place.

For the elementary population three new buildings will be ready, two in the Sayre Woods South area and one in Cliffwood Beach. These three halls of education will contain a total of 48 class rooms, three kindergarten and three all purpose rooms. The Carpenter School is the largest with 21 class rooms. The Schirra School boasts 17 class rooms and the Cooper School in Cliffwood Beach has ten classrooms.

The additions account for a total of 56 class rooms with Southwood School, 20 rooms; Voorhees School, 16 rooms; Cheesequake (Rehfus) School, 13 rooms; Madison Park, 7 rooms.

The Southwood School is equipped with two kindergarten teaching stations. Voorhees, Cheesequake and Madison Park each have one kindergarten room. All of the elementary units have an all-purpose room suitable for assemblages and physical education activities with basketball standards at each end of the room. Laurence Harbor's Memorial School which does not possess additional class room space also has a new all-purpose

Dedication ceremonies for the new buildings and additions are proceeding according to plan. Mrs. White and Pine, board public relations chairmen, are preparing a program for the event. The ceremonies will be held early in the fall.

Invitations will be extended to President Lyndon B. Johnson, Governor Richard Hughes, Senators Case and Williams, Representative Edward Patten, astronauts from NASA and local county and municipal officials. Complete details will be worked out by the end of this month.

Plans Should Be Made Now

The flow of traffic has been steadily increasing along Route 9 in Our Town. One of the most dangerous areas is near the Arbor Development near the Phillips Service Station just past the Army Base.

This development is building up quite rapidly, a garden apartment complex near the development is also taking shape and should be ready for occupancy in the very near future.

Traffic entering the Arbor's must make a left hand turn from Route 9. The general area is well known to the local Police Department as a "raceway".

Autos and trucks race from the intersection of Route 34 and 9 towards Route 516, several deaths have occurred in the general area and over a score of serious traffic accidents.

We feel that the State Highway Department should be prompted by the local police department and township officials to either install a traffic light at the entrance to the Arbors or provide for a better approach to this development. The time to plan is now, not after a series of traffic accidents!

Pastor Laurence Harbor Community Church

"After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions."

A friend of mine tells this story about his son and the need to listen. One day his boy came home all excited about something he had done. He began to tell his dad, but the father was preoccupied with his newspaper, and so gave him only a part of his attention. The boy kept talking and his father kept reading until in desperation the boy shouted, "Dad, listen to me!"

Then the father realized how important it was that he hear his son, and he put down the paper

and listened.

One reason why there are so many marital and family prob-lems is that people don't make the effort to listen to each other. Husbands don't listen to wives, parents don't listen to children, and so on. The listening I mean is more than being quiet when some one else speaks or giving a casual nod of agreement. It is taking time to be really interested in what the other person says and how he feels. This kind of hearing is at the heart of communication, and we must have communication if our life together is to be worthwhile.

In my ministry I constantly meet people who have families and numerous friends, and yet who desperately crave some one who will listen to them. I suspect that at least 25 per cent of all the difficulties in the home could be solved if we would only listen to one another. This is one of the finest things we can do for some one, to really hear what they

are saying.

Prayer: O God, forgive us for being so occupied with what we have to say, and help us to open our ears to other people. Amen.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND LICENSING OF KENNELS AND DOG SHELTERS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex: 1. DEFINITIONS: (a) "Kennel" shall mean any es-

tablishment wherein or whereon the business of boarding or selling dogs or breeding dogs is carried on, except a pet shop. 2. No person, corporation or firm shall

conduct a business of maintaining a kennel unless the said person, corporation or firm shall first apply to the Health Officer of the Township of Madison for a license entitling such person, corporation firm to keep or operate such an establishment.

3. No such person, corporation or firm shall conduct such business of maintaining a kennel until such person, corporation or firm shall first submit and present certain plans and specifications to the Planning Board of the Township of Madi-son containing the following information:

(a) The square footage to be used in the operation of said business enterprise.

(b) Specifically setting forth the nature, type and size of the buildings to be constructed or erected. (c) Showing the water facilities to

be installed,
(d) Showing the manner of disposal

of waste matter.
4. The operation and maintenance of all kennels shall be conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations promulgated by the State Department of Health pursuant to N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.14, 5. All kennels shall have at all times

a person or persons in constant attend-

ance to maintain the premises, except, however, in the event that the kennel accommodates less than ten animals. In the latter event, there shall be daily inspections by the owner or person main-

taining the kennel.
6. Waste matters, excrement and other unsightly or dangerous articles shall be cleaned away each day. They shall not be burned on the premises nor shall they be buried thereon. At least once a week, the kennels shall be washed down with a recognized disinfectant.

There shall be a regular inspection of the premises not less than once a month by the Health Officer and the records of the person maintaining the kennel shall be available for the inspection of the Health Officer, said records showing the type of dog, the ages of the dogs, whether they are registered with the American Kennel Club, and whether the said dogs

are for sale or for stud purposes.
8. The animals in the kennel shall be examined at least once a month by a competent veterinarian, whose report shall be examined at least once a month

8. The animals in the kennel shall be examined at least once a month by a competent veterinarian, whose report shall be submitted to the Board of Health. 9. All kennels shall be enclosed by

wire fencing of sufficient strength and size so that the animals shall not be able to wander on to premises other than those of the owner or operator of the kennel.

10. The construction and maintenance of all kennels shall be in accordance with the requirements of the American Kennel Club.

11. In the event this ordinance or any provision thereof is violated, the license of the owner or operator of the kennel shall be suspended subject to the licensee's requesting a hearing on the question of whether there shall be a revocation of the license. In the event no formal request for the hearing is received by the health authorities within two weeks after notice of suspension, the license may then be revoked.

12. In addition to the remedy set forth in the previous paragraph, for a viola-tion of this ordinance a complaint may be made by the Health Officer in the local Municipal Court. Upon conviction, a fine not to exceed \$200.00 for each violation or ten days in the County Jail, or both, may be imposed for the first offense. Any offense thereafter shall carry a fine of \$100.00 plus \$25.00 for each additional day that the violation continues.

13. All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency only.

14. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, portion or provision of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, sentence, clause, portion or provision so adjudged and the remainder of the ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective and not affected by such adjudication.

15. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication thereof after final passage and approval according to
