"Absolutely No Improprieties In Purchasing"

A two-month study of purchasing policies of the township manager has produced a report finding that there are "absolutely no improprieties in purchasing by the Township of Madison."

Township attorney Richard F. Plechner was authorized to make

the study at a council meeting after a daily newspaper in the area broke a story that certain items had been purchased by the manager without public bidding.

The story had been written by a reporter whose husband is

employed by a local equipment firm which had not received an order on apparatus purchased by the township.

Results of Plechner's exhaustive study were released to the township council, the manager's

office and the press at Monday night's council session.

Plechner examined every township voucher since the first of January, in compliance with Mayor Harry Messenger's request. He said eleven items had prices in excess of \$2,500, including two pick-up trucks and bodies for three township garbage trucks.

These items do not require public bidding, although Hermann sought competitive prices on them and informed the council accordingly.

Another item costing over \$2,500 was air conditioning ap-

paratus, which fell into the same category as the road department equipment.

Three items falling into the category of required public bidding were the rental of police cars. These Hermann sought bids for, in accordance with state statute. Five remaining vouchers were for stone and oil for road reconstruction. These, also, Hermann sought and received public bidding for.

Plechner's report stated, "An examination of the vouchers... falls to indicate one single violation of the statute dealing with bidding."

G.O.P. Endorse Cancellieri

Councilman Vincent Cancellieri write-in Republican candidate for re-election to the Township Council has received the unanimous endorsement of the Laurence Harbor Republican Club.

The vote came at the Club's regular monthly meeting at Burrell's Restaurant, Route 35, Laurence Harbor. Results of the vote were announced today by Club Vice-Chairman Thomas W. Wilson Jr., a Republican County Committeeman in Election District 14.

Wilson said that more than 40 members of the Club were present for the ballot. The Club has elected to support the candidacy of only Cancellieri in the present election campaign.

Wilson noted that the Harbor unit's support for Cancellieri is a result of "Vince Cancellieri's constant work for the

entire community, rather than for just one small section."

"Our membership was aware when we voted that Cancellieri now enjoys the support of a majority of the Republican Municipal Committee," Wilson said.

Seek Tierney's Ouster

Removal of Councilman Donald D. Tierney as council liaison to the industrial commission was sought this week in a letter from the commission's public relations chairman.

Tierney serves as liaison to the commission by virtue of his appointment by Mayor Harry Messenger at the beginning of the year. Messenger appointed a Democrat and a Republican to serve as liaison to the various agencies and commissions.

Councilman Leonard Hornster serves as the Democratic liaison to the commission.

Reasons for the requested replacement of Tierney were summed up in industrial commissioner Vincent J. Fox's letter to each member of the council. Fox attacked Tierney's release of information relating to industrial development without approval of the commission.

"The commission has already agreed that all information to be released will be released by the commission itself, rather than any politician. He said Tierney 'broke a trust of the commission' by releasing information which had not first been cleared by either that agency or himself as public relations chairman.

Hornster confirmed Fox's statement that the commission wanted first choice over publicity on new industries "in the interests of attracting better industrial ratables." He said the

council liaison post did not permit the councilmen holding it to make public releases of such information.

The council agreed to investigate Fox's charges against Tierney and take action at the next council session. Removal of Tierney is within the rights of Messenger's position as mayor, since he appointed Tierney in the first place. There was no indication at the meeting as to which councilman Messenger might consider as a replacement for Tierney.

In other business, the council approved an agreement with the State Highway Department authorizing the installation of a traffic signal at St. Thomas Church on Route 18 in Old Bridge.

The manager's office was able to secure the installation of a flashing amber signal at that location last year, but has continued to press for a traffic signal as well.

The new signal will cost about \$5,000, with the township paying approximately 25%.

It was reported that about half of the drainage work currently under way in the Laurence Harbor-Cliffwood Beach area in connection with the Shore Protection Program has been completed. Plans are now being finalized for construction of massive catch basins along Shoreland Circle in Laurence Harbor.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND PROHIBIT THE KINDLING OF FIRES AND BURNING OF PAPERS AND RUBBISH IN THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY, that:

1. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter kindle any fire in any public street or in any alley in the Township of Madison.

2. No person, firm or corporation shall kindle any fire in an open lot of land or yard in the Township of Madison, except in a proper receptacle of metal, brick, cement, stone or other fireproof material so constructed and guarded that sparks or embers can be transmitted therefrom to any other place, such receptacle shall not be placed within thirty feet of any other building or structure or within twenty feet of any fireproof building or structure.

3. No person, firm or corporation shall burn any garbage or refuse vegetable matter or any other offensive odor giving substance at any time or place within the Township of Madison.

4. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter kindle any fire in any open lot of land or yard within the fire limits of the Township of Madison without first having secured a permit to do so from either the Fire Marshal, Assistant Fire Marshal or Fire Chief of the fire district involved, in which the fire is to be located.

5. Every person, firm or corporation kindling any fire in any open lot or yard in the Township of Madison shall extinguish the same before leaving the place where such fire is kindled.

6. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction forfeit and pay a sum of not less than TWENTY-FIVE and no/100 (\$25.00) DOLLARS for each offense and in default of payment of such fine may be imprisoned for not less than five (5) days or both.

7. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any ordinances inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage and publication according to law.
