Magistrate Sladkus Ousted By G.O.P. Block

The Republican majority on the Township Council blocked re-appointment of Police Magistrate Samuel Sladkus. The four man G.O.P. bloc voted to appoint John E. Mullane of South Amboy as the magistrate.

Mayor Harry Messenger,

Hornster the three Democrats on the council all voted no. The Democrats are slated to take over control of the Township Council at the 1st of January 1966. Sladkus' term would have expired on December 18, 1965.

The move evidently caught the Victor O'Brien and Leonard | Democrats off guard, Mayor

Harry Messenger immediately went to the defense of Sladkus stating "Aren't you in favor of keeping a fine man in the town-ship?" Councilman Victor O'Brien who had served as Police Chairman on the old Township Committee pointed out the record of Sladkus, "Magistrate Sladkus has increased the receipts in the township, he has done a wonderful job with the police department, now you are trying to replace him. Remember the work he has done with the juvenile complaints, the time and energy that this man has devoted to the residents of Madison Township.

Following the vote which went along party lines, Councilman Leonard Hornster charged "that this wasn't necessary and you could have waited until the 1st of January, this is a 'lame duck' movement and I mean it.

Councilman Donald Tierney fired back at Hornster that "he himself had two more years on the council as well as Macrae and Dealy and Councilman Cancellieri's term runs until the 1st of January. This is no 'lame duck' session.

In 1960 Sladkus was originally appointed under similar circumstances when the late Maxwell Mayer of Laurence Harbor resigned as Magistrate because of ill health. The appointment at that time also came as a surprise to the Democratic minority, at the time of the appointment of Sladkus, John Mullane, a South Amboy attorney had been mentioned as a possible candidate for Township Magistrate. Following a Democratic sweep of the old township committee which consisted of five committeemen, Sladkus was re-appointed as police magistrate.

Sladkus was believed to have been a Republican and the four members of the G.O.P. ousted him, while Mullane is believed to be a Democrat and the three Democrats voted against him. Mullane has previously served in Madison Township as Township Attorney in 1956 during a Democratic administration.

In other business to come before the Township Council three ordinances were introduced on first reading for a scheduled hearing to be held on December 20, 1965.

One ordinance deals with regulations for the inspection of sewer lines in garden apartment developments and establishing inspection fees to be charged. During the 1965 general election campaign quite a bit of discussion was made over the fact that a jurisdictional gap has existed in the inspection of sewer lines at Garden Apartment sites. Chief Plumbing inspector Gene Hulse felt that he had to inspect plumbing work only five feet from the building. The felt that the township should be held responsible for the inspection from the curb line and the argument waged back and forth at


every other Board of Health meeting. The final agreement was ironed out between meetings of the attorneys for the Board of Health and the Sewerage Authority and the enactment of the ordinance arranges for the fees and outlines procedure for inspection, the inspection fee would be based on a 7% estimated cost of the sewerage line inspected.

The second ordinance read on first reading would delete as permitted use the construction of garden apartments in Highway development zone. The ordinance was recommended by the Township Planning Board and in effect would put a ban on the building of additional Garden Apartments. Donald Borst Chairman of the Planning Board spoke out in behalf of the adoption of the ordinance. He stated "that the township council had approved for construction of garden apartments somewheres in the neighborhood of 4,000 units, while we conducted a intricate study and complete survey two years ago in regards to the impact of garden apartments on the facilities of the township, we now feel that it is time to take a breather and see for ourselves just what effect if any garden apartments have created on our roads, schools, and services. We are not saying that we are against garden apartments or for them but we recommend adoption of the ordi-

The third ordinance introduced dealt with the establishing of an ordinance to establish personnel policy, practices and regulations of the Township. The ordinance or a similar ordinance had been discussed last year andfailure to adopt such an ordinance was blamed on much of the chaos that resulted in the election of a Democrat as mayor at the first of the year.

Some feel that the ordinance if adopted by the G.O.P. controlled council will be repealed at the first of the year when the Democrats come into control with the seating of Spiros Columbus of Old Bridge. Columbus was elected in the November election which saw the defeat of the "Good Government" candidates and Cancelleri running as a write-in candidate failed to muster enough votes to win. So at the first of January the Democrats should have enough votes to take over the control of the township. There speculation in some larters that the G.O.P. might be successful in electing one of their members as mayor but this is denied by Democratic leaders.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING PERSONNEL POLICY, PRAC-tices and regulations of THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON, MIDDLESEX COUNTY, NEW JER-SRY.

Be it ordained by the Township Council of the Township of Madison in the County of Middlesex.

The Council does hereby declare the fol-lowing principles to constitute the personnel policy of the Township;
(a) Employment in the Township

government shall be based on merit and fitness free of personal and political considerations.

(b) Just and equitable incentives and conditions shall be established and maintained in order to promote efficiency and economy in the operation of the Township government.

(c) Positions with similar duties and responsibilities shall be classified and com-

pensated on a uniform basis.

(d) Appointments, promotions and other personnel actions requiring the applications of the merit principle shall be

based on systematic rests and evaluations of knowledge and performance.

(e) Every effort shall be made to stimulate high morale by fair administration of this ordinance, and by consideration of the rights and interests of employees, consistent with the best interest of the public and the Township.

(f) Continuity of employment shall be subject to good behavior, satisfactory performance of work, necessity for the performance of work, and availability of funds.

2. Power of Appointment

All employees, officers and department heads of the Township shall be appointed and promoted by the Township Manager, except where the power to appoint rests with other Township Boards or bodies as provided for herein or by general law or ordinance. ordinance.

2. Probationary Period: Right of Suspension or Dismissal

(a) Each new employee shall serve a probationary period of six (6) months. If, at the end of 6 months the probationary employee shall have been deemed to have successfully completed his probationary period by means of written recommendation by the department head and the Municipal by the department head and the Municipal Manager, the employee shall be granted status as a regular employee with all rights and privileges pertaining to his employment or position. If, however, at the conclusion of his probationary period, the emand privileges pertaining to his employment or position. If, however, at the conclusion of his probationary period, the employee shall not have been deemed to have successfully completed his probationary period he shall be dismissed. Nothing contained in this ordinance shall be construed to prohibit the suspension or dismissal of a probationary employee at any time during his probationary period if in the best interests of the Township.

(b) Each new police officer shall be required to satisfactorily complete a basic police training program recognized by the New Jersey Police Training Commission prior to receiving a permanent appointment.

prior to receiving a permanent appointment.

Permanent Employment status after Satisfactory Completion of Probationary Period: Ground and Manner of Removal Employees who satisfactorily complete

a basic police training program recognized their probationary period shall have per-manent employment status, conditioned upon good behavior and satisfactory job performance, and where required by statue, continued residence in the Township. They shall be subject to removal by the appointing authority only for cause or for reason

ing authority only for cause or for reason of economy,
5. Types of Separation
Classified employees who have acquired permanent employment status, as provided in Section 24, may be temporarily suspended from the Township's employ by layoff or suspension, or permanently separated by resignation or dismissal, as more particularly set forth in this article.

Layoff Whenever there is a lack of work or a whenever there is a lack of work of a lack of funds requiring a reduction in the number of employees in a department of the Townshipgovernment, therequired reductions shall be made in such job classification or classifications as the Township Council may designate in con-sulting with the department head. Employees shall be laid off in the inverse order of shall be laid off in the inverse order of their length of service. Within each affected job class, all temporary employees shall be laid off before probationary employees, and all probationary employees shall be laid off before any permanent, employee. Employees so affected shall be given a mini-mum of 2 weeks' notice or 2 weeks pay in lieu thereof. in lieu thereof.

7. Resignation

An employee may resign from his posi-tion by tendering a written resignation to his department head, who, in turn, shall forward it to the Municipal manager. Unless there are disciplinary charges pending against the employee, the Municipal Manager shall notify the employee in writing the acceptance of his resignation in good standing. An employee shall give a minimum of 2 weeks notice before the effective date of his resignation. Failure to do so may result in loss of vacation and sick credits.

(a) An employee may resign from his position by tendering a written resignation to his department head, who, in turn, shall forward it to the Municipal Manager. Unless there are disciplinary charges pending against the employee, the Municipal Man-ager shall notify the employee in writing the acceptance of his resignation in good standing. An employee shall give a minimum of 2 weeks notice before the effective date of his resignation. Failure to do so may result in loss of vacation and sick credits.

(b) Absence without leave or failure to report after authorized leave has expired or after such leave has been disapproved or revoked; provided, however, that any regular member or officers of the Police Department who, shall be asent from duty
