Election Set \$5.6 Million Budget At Stake

Eight candidates will seek election to the Madison Township Board of Education in next Tuesday's School Board Election but the most important item is the \$5.6 million dollar budget proposed by the Board of Education this represents an increase of over \$890,000 on last year's school budget. Also on the ballot is a question for the purchase of some 28 acres of land on Route 516 in Cedar Grove for the cost of some \$138,657.

The entire school campaign hasn't been very active and because of the inclement weather the turn out is expected to be very light. The Board of Education depends on the residents of Sayre Woods South to carry the budget, most support of school budgets has come from the Sayre Woods South development while the budget is usually defeated in the Laurence Harbor-Cliffwood Beach and Cheesequake areas of the township.

There are currently two slates

of candidates Kerr-Roessler-Rose supported by the C.E.C. and the slate of White-Bates-Staples. There have been charges of politics hurled back and forth between the two factions. Candidates Goldberg and Maresca are independent candidates and seeking election on their own.

William Kerr, a native of Scotland has been a township resident 31 years. He has been employed by Sears and Roebuck 21 years and currently is with the firm's central service in Union.

Long active in civic affairs, Kerr has served on the school board for 12 years and also is a member of the township Planning Board.

He is a charter member of the Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad and was an American Red Cross first aid instructor 15 years.

Kerr lives on School House Lane with his wife, Alice, and their daughter, Lorna, a teacher in the township school system.

Melvin M. Roessler, a Perth Amboy native, studied accounting at St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas.

A U. S. Navy veteran, Roessler currently is employed as a senior staff accountant with Joseph J. Seaman and Co., a Perth Amboy accounting firm.

Roessler is a member of the Voorhees School PTA. He has two daughters enrolled at the school and a third will enter next year.

Roessler lives at 472 English-town Road with his wife, Frieda, and their three daughters.

John E. Rose, who was born in Honesdale, Pa., has lived in the township more than four years.

He attended Pennsylvania State University and currently is attending classes at Rutgers University.

Rose is employed at the Western Electric Co., New York City.

He has been active in Boy Scout work 10 years and has been assistant scoutmaster of Troop 36 in Old Bridge.

Rose is a member of the Knights of Columbus Council 4815, and lives at 27 Barkley Road with his wife Marie and their children, Margaret, 14, and Bruce, 9.

Mrs. Francis White, a township resident four years, was elected to a one-year board term in 1965.

She is a member and former president of the Cheesequake PTA and a charter member of the Alan B. Shepard PTA. She also is a member of the auxiliary to the Central Park Boys Club, the Central Park Chapter of the South Amboy Hospital auxiliary, and the League of Women Voters.

She has served as area chairman of the annual Red Cross fund raising drive.

Mrs. White lives in Central Park with her husband, William,

and their three sons, Kenneth, 10, Greg, 7, and William, 3. The two older boys attend township schools.

Donald Bates, a five-year township resident, is employed as an account manager in the national sales department of Texaco, Inc.

A World War II Air Force veteran, Bates attended the Pennsylvania State Engineering School.

He is active in Cub Scout work and is a member of the Better Education Committee and the John H. Glenn PTA.

Bates lives at 13 York St. with his wife Virginia and their sons, David, 8, and Danny, 7, both students at the Glenn school.

William Staples has been teaching in elementary and secondary schools 10 years. He currently is employed as a work experience coordinator at Red Bank High School.

He received a bachelor's degree in education from East Stroudsburg State Teachers College and a master's degree in special education from Newark State College.

Staples is a member of the National Association for Retarded Children, the Red Bank Teachers Association, and the Monmouth County Education Association. A marine veteran, Staples also is cubmaster of Pack 61, Madison Park Cub Scouts, and is active in Little League and Pop Warner Football.

He has three children and lives with his family at 3078 Borden-town Ave.

Jerome Goldberg, a township resident more than two years, is a native of Williamsport, Pa.

He received a bachelor's degree in political science from Alfred University, Alfred, N.Y., and a bachelor of laws degree from the University of Miami Law School.

Admitted to the Pennsylvania bar in 1958, Goldberg is a member of the American Bar Association, the Allegheny Bar Association, and the Pennsylvania Bar Association.

A U. S. Army veteran, Goldberg is an estate and gift tax examiner for the Internal Revenue Service, Newark.

Vote No On School Budget

Voters of Madison Township will have the opportunity to go to the polls this coming Tuesday and vote for three new members to represent them on the Board of Education. True representation is one of the most important things in the township--but far more important is the "staggering" school budget of \$5.6 millions---this is a record breaking budget---according to Frank Viafora, Township Tax Assessor the proposed budget would mean an average increase in taxes of approximately \$60 per home.

We're certain that everyone in the Township is capable of paying out additional sums of money but let's investigate what is in the budget.

For example have you added up all the little items termed "OTHER EXPENSES"---the figure is frightful---yet little explanation is given for these "OTHER EXPENSES"---it could mean postage stamps---but that's a lot of postage.

How many new principals are included in the new budget---we understand that the Board will plan on hiring six---if the budget is approved---where will they go? What will be their duties?

We understand that the Board of Education is planning to expand their "fleet" of buses by the purchase of 11 additional buses---the Board of Education should stay out of the bus business and get into school business. With 11 new buses you have to hire 11 new drivers---plus substitutes. We ask what is the cost of operating the present fleet of buses? What are the insurance costs? What are the gasoline costs? What are the maintenance costs? How much clerical help is used to operate the "fleet" of buses? What is the cost of replacement buses when buses fail to operate? These things must be taken into consideration before voting on this staggering budget.

We certainly agree that Our Children should be given a substantial education---but school monies should be spent on text books and necessary school equipment not the purchasing of buses---leave the purchasing and operation of transportation up to Public Service and other transportation companies---let's get out of the school bus business.

The other question on the ballot is the purchase of some 28 acres of land in Cedar Grove for a mere \$138,657---this breaks down to almost \$5,000 per acre which is ridiculously high for farm land---did you check with the tax assessor and see what it is listed on the tax books for?? Where will the township get the money to provide for sanitary sewerage---or are they planning to use a gigantic septic tank---or will the Board of Education later propose that they build a sewerage disposal plant and operate that---the same way that they are in the bus business?

Will the proposed site be advantageous to Levitt and Company who are presently building in the area? Will we transport pupils up and down dangerous Route 516?

We urge the voters of Madison Township to go to the polls and vote NO on this monstrous budget---which could be safely CUT by over one half million dollars---without endangering the education of Our Children. It has been proven that every school budget that was reduced always ended up with a gigantic amount of money at the end of the school term---the budget is supposed to be for the operation of the school plant---not for merely increased taxes---not to create fantastic "free balances."

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Was It Cold Outside

Township Board of Health officials really had a time of it over the previous weekend. With a high gale wind whipping up the snow--Board of Health officials made an apartment to apartment inspection of the Neiu Amsterdam Garden Apartments on Route 9.

The Board of Health was called in after residents of the Garden Apartments complained about sub-normal heat. The heating plant was functioning properly and the water in the system was certainly hot--however--there were many openings around air-conditioning units -- doors -- windows. To further complicate things workmen at the project had left quite a few panels covering crawl spaces off. The howling winds sped into the openings which should have been closed and infiltrated the building.

The builders of the apartments agreed later to replace all the panels over the crawl spaces and to re-caulk around windows and check the weather stripping on the doors. It is also understood that the builder will order storm windows. This should end the heating problem. Most of the complaints came from only three apartment buildings.

Chief Plumbing Inspector Gene Hulse will recommend to the Township Board of Health that a heating ordinance be introduced--at the present time there is no inspection of heating plants made by the municipality at the time of installation--the adoption of this type ordinance would certainly be a step in the right direction.

Hits At Opponents Platforms

Philip A. Maresca, candidate for the Madison Township Board of Education, lashed out at his opponents' lack of understanding of the basic responsibilities of a school board member.

"I have been to every P.T.A. meeting and every other civic meeting where the other candidates and I have spoken, and to this day I have yet to hear any of my opponents mention anything about the basic responsibilities of a school board member," Maresca said.

"Further," Maresca stated, "Their talks have run the gamut of mysticism, including such subjects as 'length of service', 'technocratic society', 'strong feelings', 'digital exercises', 'talkin records', 'records speaking', and other high sounding

phrases. All of which may be very noble in their own particular sphere, but do not have any bearing on the election of a school board candidate."

"At a time when the public interest should be aroused, for the highest budget in our history, for the solving of problems of better teachers and teaching for better pay, economy in expenditures, and improvement of physical equipment, -- not any of my opponents have mentioned the basic responsibilities that are essential for a school board member to know if any of these problems are going to be solved. As I see it, these problems are: citizen leadership, economy, adequate financing, good physical facilities, public information, evaluating policies, effective educational programs, recruiting professional staff, and developing sound policies," Maresca concluded.

Candidate Hits At "Me-Tooism"

Jerome G. Goldberg, the independent candidate for the local Board of Education election February 8, said today he was discouraged by the repeated displays of "me-tooism" by his opposing candidates.

The same absence of independent thinking on Board of Education matters has been reflected in their campaigns for election, Goldberg said.

Goldberg, who lives at 37 Dumas Road, Old Bridge, said the opposition slates of William Kerr and Mrs. Frances White have merged into a "chorus of uniform responses to issues."

Goldberg said both slates were guilty of either rejecting or accepting the proposed school budget before it was ever completed. One candidate has said, "If it's good enough for the Superintendent of Schools, it's good enough for me," Goldberg said. The other slate, in unison, opposed the budget before it was ever completed, Goldberg charged.

Both slates have demonstrated their dependence and acceptance

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING SALARY SCHEDULES AND FIXING THE MANNER OF PAYMENTS OF SALARIES FOR VARIOUS OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON."

1. Section 1 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. There are hereby established schedules of salaries and the manner of payment of such salaries for various officials and employees of the Township of Madison as hereinafter listed:

Deputy Manager -	no salary
Municipal Clerk	\$7,000.00
Director of Finance	\$8,500.00

2. Section 11A2 (a) of which this ordinance is amendatory, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Tax Assessor, tax collector, senior engineer and the Director of Finance shall be entitled to three (3) weeks vacation. All Ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication according to law.
