Petitions Underway To Dualize Route 9

Efforts were underway this week to obtain signatures on petitions to the New Jersey State Highway Department to dualize the remaining portion of Route 9 in Madison Township. Township Business Manager John Barbagelato launched a petition signing campaign in a determined effort to obtain thousands of signatures on petitions to dualize Route 9 in the Township. The petitions read "The undersigned citizens of the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey, petition the State of New Jersey Highway Department to dualize Route 9 from the junction of Route 9 and Route 34, south to the junction of Route 9 and Route 18. This strip of Route 9 (4.7 mileslong) has been for the past two years one of the most dangerous, if not the most Dangerous, traffic Hazard in the state of New Jersey. In 1965 alone there were 78 motor vehicle accidents on the strip of highway which resulted in injuries to 89 persons and the death of one. As of June, 1966 there have been 44 automobile accidents resulting in injuries to 38 persons and the death of one. Moreover, its extreme narrowness creates a bottleneck for vehicular traffic traveling to and from Madison Township from the adjacent four lane strips. Consequently, in the interest of saving lives and improving the flow of traffic and for the necessary protection of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Township of Madison, it is absolutely essential that the State Highway department recognize its responsibility to dualize this highway immediately.

petitions will then be collected and brought to Trenton, the manager expects to have bus loads of residents accompany the petitions, which should be completed within the next few weeks.

According to Rarbergelato every township organization

Route 9 was completed in the early 1940's just prior to World War II, the State Highway Department acquired the necessary property for the dualization program but the property until this time has remained dormant. During the summer months traffic along this strip of highway is often at a snail's pace, Madison Township police are kept busy with issuing of tickets for passing on the right. Many of the long time police officers in the township refer to the strip of highway as "Death Alley," many of the accidents resulting in death or serious injury have been head on collisions.

The situation has steadily worsened as Madison Township continues to grow. With the installation and construction of Garden Apartments and homes in the vicinity of Route 9, the traffic congestion and accident rate have continued to grow at an alarming rate.

Whether the signing of petitions will have any effect on the State Highway Department to dualize the highway will remain to be seen, but probably for the first time in the history of the Madison Township will such a tremendous petition effort be accomplished.


