Unique Catholic Education Program Planned

An Adult School of Religious Education will be offered at St. Thomas the Apostle Catholic Churchin Old Bridge, beginning on Monday, October, The complete program is sponsored by the Knights of Columbus Council

4815 of Old Bridge.

The program has the approval of His Excellency George W. Ahr, Bishop of the Trenton Diocese, and will be the only complete program offered on the parish level for Catholics in this area. While the course programs are directed to Catholic who would like to know more of their religion, an Inquiry Course in Religion covering a basic review of Catholic Doctrine is available to non-Catholics without cost.

The overall program for the Adult School of Education for 1966-67 will consist of six classroom courses, a lecture series and several discussion

The classroom program offers six complete courses. On Mondays, beginning Oct. 3, at 8 p.m. a scripture Courses on the Parables of Jesus Christ; at 9p.m. a Survey Course in Catholic Church History. On Tuesdays, beginning October 4, at 8:15 p.m., an inquiry Course in Basic Catholic Doctrine, also at 8:15 p.m., a Lay Theology Course in Religion, On the third and fourth Wednesdays of each month, beginning on October 19, at 8 p.m., a Scripture Course on the Epistles of St. Paul, and at 9 p.m., a course in Christian Leadership and Presentation.

Registration can be completed

at the first session on the evening the course is given. Aregistration fee of \$2. will be charged for each course taken. The Inquiry Course is free to non-Catholics.

The Lecture Series to be scheduled in 1966 will cover Cana Conferences on marriage for those already married. At these conferences the following topics will be discussed: the husband-wife relationship, the parent-child relationship, and the spiritual life of married people.

Discussion groups planned for January through early spring will cover vocational and sex education for the teen-ager.

In addition, the CYO Program held every Thursday evening, at 8 p.m., offers a complete religious education for the teen-ager.

Kennel, Plumbing Codes Adopted By Council

At the regular meeting of the Township Council held at the Municipal Building on Route 9, the council approved on final reading an ordinance updating the Kennel Ordinance and the local plumbing code. Both ordinances had previously been recom-mended by the Board of Health and the Chief Plumbing Inspector.

The newly enacted Kennel Ordinance which was termed an emergency ordinance takes effect immediately and establishes rules and regulations for the operation of dog kennels in the Township. The ordinance met some heavy opposition at the Board of Health meetings because many of the kennel operators felt that the requirements created undue hardships on kennel operators. The operation and maintenance of the dog kennel will be conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations established by the State Department of Health pursuant to N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.14. The Kennel Ordinance calls that Kennel shall mean any establishment wherein or whereon the business of boarding or selling dogs or breeding dogs is carried on, except a pet shop. The new ordinance also calls for inspections by Health Officials on a regular basis of at least once in every three months. The records concerning the operation of the kennel shall be available for inspection of the Health Officials. The records shall show the type of dogs, the ages of dogs, whether they are registered with the American Kennel Club and whether said dogs are for sale or for breeding purposes. It is expected that the newly adopted

ordinance will be challenged by several dog kennel operators in

the Township.

The council also discussed relaxation of age restrictions at the Cheesequake Park Village, action was withheld. The development located on Gordon Road, near the entrance to the Cheesequake State Park had requested that occupancy be permitted for persons above 18 years of age, provided that at least one of the occupants of each unit is at least 52 years of age. Through their attorney Monroe Markovitz of Union, the development also asked that the age be reduced for occupancy from the present 55 years to 52 years old minimum age of apartment residents.

Township Manager John Barbegelata announced at the meeting that over 18,500 signatures have been obtained on petitions urging the State Highway Department to dualize Route 9 from Route 18 to Route 34 intersections. The drive was started several weeks ago in an effort to dualize what Barbegelata terms the most dangerous section of highway in the State of New Jersey, in the petitions which were designed by the Business Manager it was pointed out the number of deaths and injuries that have occurred on the section of the unfinished highway.

Residents of Central Avenue and Maple Avenue complained of construction of Sanitary sewerage lines on the streets and recent heavy rains have made the streets practically impassable according to residents using the roads. The manager promised that the situation would be investigated immediately.

And So It Goes

With the special school election coming near there are several questions which remain to be answered by the members of the Board of Education. We would like to know where in the world did they ever come up with a figure of \$5,700 per acre for land off Route 516? What was the sum paid for acreage in SayreWoods South when the Board of Education entered condemnation procedures against a local farmer? We doubt if there is any land in Madison Township with the exception of a shopping center that is valued at this fantastic figure. There are hundreds and hundreds of acres of land that can be purchased at far less money. Doubt our words take a look at the Township Tax Assessors Books, Supposing that the Board of Education purchases the land off Route 516, where will they get sanitary sewerage, will Matawan allow the Board of Education to tie into their system? Or will the Board of Education build a package sewerage treatment plant --- we certainly hope that they don't intend to use septic tanks for the schools? These are but a few of the questions which have yet to be answered by the Board of Education. We repeat there is no doubt that additional classrooms are needed in the school system but what about utilizing acres and acres of ground that we already own. What about the rear of the Number 18 School in SayreWoods South on Bushnell Road? What's the matter with building a school on that site? What about the acres and acres of land at the Madison Park School? Couldn't another school be built at that site? Both land parcels represent acres and acres of level ground, both sites are desolate and become mud flats following heavy rains --- these two sites should be utilized for the building of additional schools. We still maintain that there is enough land area at the present site of the high school to build additional rooms on the present facility. The Board of Education presents a story that the present heating system is too small for expansion of the school plant -- we wonder if the Board of Education ever heard of "Electric Heat" --- each additional school room could have individual control electric heating units ---we are sure that the Jersey Central Power and Light Company has made installations in many schools---The Board of Education should realize that despite their expensive tastes -- there are no millionaires living in Our Town---most of the residents are plain workers --- many of the older residents in Our Town have already tightened up their belts--many of them gave up that extra pack of cigarettes just to pay for the present high school --- about the only other thing many of them can do is to give up eating altogether ---We urge that the residents of Madison Township go to the polls and vote no on this fantastic referendum --- whether you live in a Garden Apartment or home the cost of the school referendum because of the fabulous prices to spend for the acquisition of land ---(continued on page 4)



FEUDING AND FUSSING: Well things still are pretty hot in the ranks of the G.O.P. One of the contenders for the post of Municipal Chairman feels that he was let down by his club in getting additional support for the top post. CONGRATULATIONS: Congratulations are certainly in order to Township John Barbegelata, Township Business Manager on his efforts in obtaining more than 18,500 signers on petitions to dualize Route 9 from the Route 34 intersection to Route 18 intersection. Perhaps nothing will come from the effort but at least all the "wheels" in Trenton will know that there is a place called Madi-Township. To our recollection this was the largest amount of signatures ever obtained on a petition in Our Town. The manager is really concerned about traffic and safety problems in the Township, we understand he's also pressing for some solution at the Whited Brown School on Route 34 in Cheesequake.

POLICE DEPARTMENT: Understand that additional patrols will be added in the near future to handle the lower end of the Township in the Lakeridge-Heatherwood area. The police department is spread out pretty thin at times. We still feel that two men in a patrol car especially at night would be the greatest aid for the police department. Look for several more promotions in the very near future. One of the problems confronted by the police department is vacation days with all the cops we now have they can't all have their vacations in the summertime.

INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION: Recently we spoke to one member of the Industrial Commission in regards to the industry plant that was announced to be located in the township. He claims he didn't know a thing about the installation and stated that he would explore the matter deeply because the announcement might have been premature and if not there are several interesting questions which still have to be answered. He wants to see signed contracts and a lot of other questions raised before the township goes all out.

BOARD OF EDUCATION: Understand that one of the top notch workers for the Board of Education recently resigned. transportation business is still fouled up. Understand that they will soon hire a transportation co-ordinator from the Morristown area --- we think the Board of Education needs more coordinating than the transportation.
