Endorse Madison Police Pay Increase

The Madison Township P.B.A. #127 have requested from the Township Council that the starting salary of a patrolman be raised to a mere \$6,100 and that subsequent pay increases be granted up and down the ranks. Democratic Municipal Chairman Joseph Pandozzi, a former Township Committeeman recently went on record favoring the pay increase and several other local officials are expected to soon voice support of the proposed pay increase. As a whole the police in Madison Township are doing a pretty good job - and it is our opinion that the Madison Township Police Department is probably the best organized and trained in Middlesex County - Unfortunately there are some residents in Madison Township that have objection to police raises, police benefits and in fact generally police. There are many that suggest that the local police aren't needed and argue that the State Police be contacted to provide police protection for Our Town - we have no criticism of the State Police but we do not feel that they are presently in a position to offer police protection to the residents of Our Town - we do agree with them on one point - that here in Madison Township the taxpayers are supporting a local police department - many communities especially to the south of Madison Township - have no police departments

and rely solely on the State Police - so that in actuality we in Madison Township are paying not only for our own police protection but are also contributing to the support of police protection for other communities - this we believe is unfair. With crime ever on the increase every community should establish their own police department, in the case of small communities several of them should band together and create regional police forces - the State Police should patrol the State Highways, Turnpikes and Parkways - the Madison Township Police Department has continued to expand - a fair salary should be made available to members of the department - police protection is one of the least expensive insurance policies available to the general public - in Madison Township due to patrolling - the general crime rate has been kept down - there are few robberies - few rapes - mugging is practically nil - this just doesn't happen because we believe that we are nice people - this happens because we do have a fine police force - in order to keep a police department free of graft and corruption then the taxpayers must support their police - The Madison American supports the police pay increase. We urge the sane and sensible residents of Our Town to do the same. Thank you.

Lederman, Director of Finance of the Township of Madison, in the County of Middlesex, and State of New Jersey, will sell at public sale on Wednesday, February 1, 1967, at 10 a.m. of that day, or at such other time and place to which said sale may then be adjourned, at the collector's office, in the said Municipal Building, each and all of the several plots and parcels of land assessed to the respective persons whose names are set opposite each respective parcel as the owner thereof for the total amount of municipal liens chargeable against said land respectively as computed up to the first day of July, 1966; all as described in, and particularly set out in a list of the land so subject to sale, bound in book form and now a permanent record in my said office, as required under the provisions of Article 4, Chapter 5, Title 54 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey, 1937, entitled, "Sale of Real Property to Enforce Liens," Section 54:5-19 to 54:5-111.

1. Several years ago an attempt was made by Public Service to establish several 'Bus Stops on Throckmorton Lane in the Sayre-Woods South Development. If we remember correctly the buses were to travel down Throckmorton Lane and then out to Gaub Road and 516. This would have provided better transportation service in this writers opinion. The residents of SayreWoods South vigorously protested the proposed route and the buses were routed on Route 9.

The condition which you describe is not only dangerous to commuters walking or waiting for buses, but creates a hazard to all operators of motor vehicles. I am sure that if you contact John Barbergelato, Township Business Manager and inform him of this dangerous situation some action would be attained. The Business Manager has been carrying on almost single-handed a feud with the New Jersey State Highway Department to correct the hazardous situation which now exists on Route 9. We are of the opinion that perhaps the manager is not presently aware of the bus stop situation, appropriate action would soon follow.
