# Traffic Jam Ahead

If that bus is late to arrive after March 6 from New York, don't panic, don't get upset because for at least 30 days following March 6 the condition won't improve, we can only see heavy traffic delays on Route 9.

On March 6 work is scheduled to get underway for the construction of a center barrier on U. S. Route 9 on the Edison Bridge and the approaches between the Borough of Sayreville and Woodbridge Township. The Edison Bridge which spans the Raritan River is one of the state's most heavily traveled bridges. It had an average daily traffic volume of 54,600 vehicles last year.

Frapaul Construction Company of Rochelle Park was awarded the contract for construction of the center barrier and related facilities in the area extending 1 and 3/4 miles between Sayreville and Woodbridge. The Edison Bridge itself is 4,325 feet long and52 feet wide from curb to curb. The center barrier, 24 inches wide and tapering will be doweled into the concrete deck pavement and approaches. There will be some 8,855 feet of center barrier installed.

Before last July 25, the bridge carried traffic in five lanes, through operation of an overhead traffic signal lane control system, the center lane was reversible. State police activated the lane for either northbound or southbound traffic during rush hours throughout the year and

ricularly during summer weekend. With increasing traffic during recent years, accidents, particularly head-on collisions, became more frequent and severe,

After much protest by Sayreville officials, the Highway Department was prompted last July to find out whether the bridge could handle traffic through use of only two lanes in each direction at all times. The center lane was closed by marking off its pavement and installing traffic cones.

The four lane test was observed periodically by State Department representatives and Sayreville police. Traffic moved freely and safely and it was decided to undertake the present project, most of the traffic cones were soon victims of automobiles

striking them and were soon demolished.

Because of the heavy traffic on the bridge the contractor will be limited to closing one lane at a time on the bridge. From 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily he will be permitted to occupy the inner southbound lane, leaving two northbound lanes and the southbound curb lane clear for traffic. From 3 p.m. until the end of the day the contractor may occupy the inner northbound lane, leaving the two southbound lanes and the northbound curb lane open to traffic.

What will happen when a huge tractor and trails broks down near the top of the bridge anytime the contractor has one of the lanes closed down can only be imagined.

We predict very heavy traffic and much delay as work on the Edison Bridge is undertaken. The State Highway Department has advised of alternate routes. Drivers may detour the construction area by using the Garden State Parkway bridge west of the Edison Bridge or the Victory Bridge east of it. However, traffic is expected to increase at the key Perth Amboy intersection when motorists may bypass the construction area through use of the Victory Bridge. So for the next 30 days following March 6, HAPPY MOTORING.

# Seek Competent Tax Advice---Now

Newark, N. J. — Taxpayers seeking professional help in filing their 1966 Federal income tax returns should select only qualified and reputable advisors.

Joseph M. Shotz, District Director of Internal Revenue, advises taxpayers who need professional help to make appointments and arrangments now. As the April 17 filing deadline comes closer, reputable full-time tax practitioners will become increasingly busy.

Even though your records may not yet be complete, the practitioner you select now could be able to start work on your return and allot the time necessary to properly complete it.

Although Internal Revenue does not recommend any particular tax practitioners, Mr. Shotz passed on some suggestions which will help taxpayers to select a responsible individual to prepare their tax returns.

Choose a tax practitioner who has a permanent address so that you know he will be around to answer any questions after your return has been prepared and filed.

Beware of the expert who boasts that he knows all the angles, who guarantees refunds, wants a percentage of the refund or suggests that your refund check be mailed to his address.

Be sure that the individual who prepares your return signs it and includes his permanent address on the line provided at the bottom of the tax form. You should record his name and address for future reference and keep a copy of the return yourself.

Director Shotz concluded, "No matter who prepares the return, the taxpayer himself is responsible for its accuracy. This means that he will be responsible for full payment of any additional tax, penalty or interest resulting from an incorrectly prepared return. Taxpayers may delegate the work of preparing a return but they cannot delegate their tax responsibilities."

# Mandate Of The People Ignored

The voters of Madison Township on February 14, 1967 soundly defeated the proposed \$7.6 MILLION school budget by some 375 votes. The defeat was a mandate of the people. The voters of the Township obviously showed protest to the Board of Education's wanton program of spending and overpowering taxation. The members of the Board of Education had an obligation to the voters of the township they should have reduced the proposed budget by at least one half of a million dollars. The Board of Education instead will submit the unrevised budget to the voters on March 1. The same \$7.6 Million dollar school budget. Perhaps some members of the Board of Education can shrug their shoulders and say "Well, the people didn't know what they were voting for, the budget was only defeated by 375 votes." - or - "Not enough voters that were in favor of the budget bothered to turn out to vote and the NO votes showed up." We wonder what the reaction of the Board of Education would have been if the budget had been approved by two votes - then of course it would have been a mandate of the voters - Board of Education members would then have said "the budget was approved by a majority of the voters and it was a mandate." We believe firmly that the voters of Madison Township showed their disgust of the super-duper budget presented by the Board of Education and wanted the budget reduced. This we feel was the mandate of the people. We urge a NO VOTE on MARCH 1.

# **New Room** Is Place for **Improvement**

If your modernization plans include a room addition - be it study, enclosed patio, porch or playroom - don't feel that the new room must conform to possible restrictions found in the rest of the house.

For example, your presentheating system may be inadequate for the additional room. It may require extensive ductwork and space-eating radiators, and may generate dust and dirt.

If so, consider installing electric heat in the new room. Installation is simple and not expensive, and the system is noiseless, dust free, and does not require bulky equipment. A big attraction is that it allows the use of individual room thermostats so you can control the heat in the new room without affecting the temperature in the rest of the house.

No matter what heating system you choose, windows make an important contribution to insulation and heating efficiency. Wood windows of ponderosa pine with insulating glass are a practical choice because wood, as a natural insulator, cuts heat loss and saves fuel dollars. The wood sash, in combination with insulating glass also eliminates the danger of messy condensation which can occur when warm, humid indoor air strikes a cold window.

When adding new rooms, many homeowners take the opportunity to use more extensive glass areas or more decorative window treatments. They may use sliding windows or doors, or have a wall of awning or hopper windows. With ponderosa pine units, wide-view windows offer no problems.
