Meeting Held

The September meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Free Public Library of Madison Township in Laurence Harbor, which is sponsored by The Women's Club of Laurence Harbor, was held at the Library Wednesday evening.

Mrs. David Watson, President, reported that during the summer 1297 books had been circulated, including 557 juvenile books to members of the Summer Tall Paul Reading Club. At regular library sessions 415 adult fiction books and 26 adult no-fiction books were circulated, as well as 283 juvenile fiction books and 6 non-fiction books.

Mrs. Walter Hutchison reported that 60 books had been donated by interested friends of the Library and had been catalogued

and added to the shelves during the month of August; also 95 books had been discarded.

Mrs. William Weeks reported that 120 paper back books had been put on the shelves, for the use of people who prefer to read paper backs.

Miss Barbara Holmes reported that several books have been outstanding for quite some time and efforts are being made to have these books returned. Borrowers are asked to please return books when due so that they may be enjoyed by other readers.

Mrs. James Vineyard expressed her appreciation for the assistance given by volunteers at the summer Tall Paul Reading Club and Story Hour during July and August. The sessions were well attended by children from several areas of the Township. Plans were discussed for a

card party to be held at the Library on Friday, September 29th. Mrs. Vineyard and Mrs. Hutchison were appointed to serve on this Committee.

Ground Breaking Set

Approximately one year ago (1966) the voters of Madison Township went to the voting machines (in small number) and approved plans and building for a second high school for Madison Township. On Sunday September 24, the Board of Education will finally hold ground-breaking ceremonies for the new \$4 million dollar plus school which will actually contain some 21 regular classrooms, the ceremonies will get underway at 5:30 p.m. with various school board members and school officials in attendance.

The four million dollar plus building being constructed on a 58 acre tract is supposed to be completed by the fall session in 1968, actual construction of the building is not underway as yet, with the weather setting in and the possibility of a nationwide steel strike, plus a shortage of construction steel it is very doubtful that the school will be completed on schedule.

The completed building will contain some 178,000 square feet of space.

On October 10th, the voters of Madison Township will have the opportunity to vote for additional schools, the total bond issue of two (middle schools) and a new elementary school will cost the taxpayers of Madison Township something like \$6,950,000 or in round figures \$7 million dollars.

Board of Education president William Rice and other members of the Board of Education will be on hand at the ceremonies.

Beginning on the edge of Raritan Bay at the mouth of Margarets Creek and from thence running (1) Westerly up Margarets Creek to the middle of the New York-Long Branch Railroad; thence (2) Southerly along the middle of the New York-Long Branch Railroad to the Madison Township boundary line (said line also being the county line between Middlesex and Monmouth Counties); thence (3) Easterly along said boundary line and partially along Whale Creek to the middle of N. J. Highway 35; thence (4) Northerly along the middle of N. J. Highway 35 to the Northerly line of Cliffwood Beach; thence (5) Easterly along the Northerly line of Cliffwood Beach to the edge of Raritan Bay; thence (6) Northerly along the edge of Raritan Bay to the beginning.
