Hornster Named Mayor--Mrs. Brown Acting Manager

Leonard Hornster of Cliffwood Beach became the Mayor for Madison Township at the 1968 re-organization meeting held at the Township Municipal Building on Route 9. The meeting got underway at 1:00 p.m. Township Clerk Mrs. Mary M. Brown was named acting manager until a replacement is found for Mr. John Barbergeleta who resigned the post, the former township manager had been ill for sometime and was under the care of a doctor.

In his New Year's address to the residents of Madison Township Hornster promised a much improved road program, better recreation facilities for not only the youngsters of Madison Township but the adults as well. Hornster also pointed out the need for a new Municipal Building and stated that he will continue to press the State Highway Department for the dualization of Route 9.

The following appointments were announced: Hornster to a one-year term on the Planning Board; Democratic Councilman Harry Messenger to a two-year term on the Planning Board; Anthony Pasquale, a five-year term on the Municipal Utilities Authority; George Stone, five-year

term on the Sewerage Authority; Michael Connors, four-year term on the Sewerage Authority; Martin Tosseto, five-year term on the Zoning Board of Adjustment; Councilman Victor O'Brien to a two-year term on the Welfare Board.

Re-appointed to one-year terms were: Marc Gordon, township attorney; Alden Jolly, violations clerk; Joseph J. Seaman and Company, township auditors; Dr. Alan Weinstein, township physician; Mrs. Brown, municipal tax improvement search officer; Ten Eyck Ronson, civil defense director; George Fiore, registrar of vital statistics; and the Amboy-Madison National Bank, legal depository of the township.

Hornster appointed councilmen as liaison to municipal boards and authorities: O'Brien and Macrae to the Municipal Utilities Authority; Messenger and Tierney to the Sewerage Authority; Spiros Columbus and Dealy to the Board of Education and all councilmen to the Industrial Commission.

Knight Reelected

Robert Knight of Laurence Harbor was unanimously re-elected Chairman of the Madison Township Recreation Commission at its annual reorganization meeting held on Tuesday, January 2nd, 1968.

Mr. Knight, who is often referred to as "Mr. Recreation" in Madison Township, is beginning his eighth year as a member of the Commission and his third consecutive year as Chairman. Well known throughout Madison Twp. for his great interest and devotion to recreation, Mr. Knight was the founder of the Babe Ruth League, the Carlton League, the Pop Warner Football League, and the Soccer League. He also initiated the first series of outdoor dances and Easter egg hunts, and served on the first Jr. Olympic and Swim Olympic Committees.

In his acceptance address, Knight stated that the Commission will, in 1968, concentrate on more recreation programs for teenagers and adults and on an expansion of programs for the younger children. He also noted that in 1968 the Central Park-Cheesequake area will expand its recreation program by participating for the first time in soccer, football, boxing, wrestling and Babe Ruth Baseball.

Other officers elected for the coming year were William Glatstein, Treasurer; Mrs. Grace Rutan, Corresponding Secy.; and Mrs. Marge Kenney, Recording Secy. Madison Twp. Recreation Comm. J.B. Garland, Publicity Chairman

Mr. Rinaldi added that trained personnel will be available at all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service to answer any questions that reporting aliens might have regarding immigration and naturalization matters.
