Madison Township Board Of Education Under Fire

The Madison Township Board of Education came under "fire" at the regular meeting of the group held at the Madison Township High School. Resident led by a delegation of bus drivers protested actions of the Board of Education.

The Board of Education in a 5-4 vote failed to reinstate Timothy Keating of Cottrell Road, Cheesequake, Keating had previously been discharged by the Board of Education. Keating is a member of the local Teamsters Union which is alleged to have at least 15 members in the staff. Madison Township School Bus drivers earlier this year had "pulled" a one day strike and cited various grievances to the Board of Education.

Speaking in behalf of Keating was a representative of the Union, Bus Drivers queried the Board of Education in an effort to determine the procedure to file an official complaint against Earl Rapp. Rapp is presently serving as transportation co-ordinator and has come under discussion at recent meetings of the Board of Education.

The Board of Education in another split vote-voted to hire the following Edward Reber to be appointed chairman of the Business Department at a salary of \$10,950 per year. Patrick O'Donnell appointed Chairman of the English Department for a salary of \$9,800 and James Simes Appointed Chairman of the Science Department at the salary of \$9,325.

The Board of Education also voted that Site Engineers, Inc., be awarded a contract for test borings at the three elementary school for the bid price of \$5,578. Also

bidding on the work was Raymond Concrete Pile with a total bid of \$6,024.

Residents also spoke out against the announced student placement for high school students, pupils slated to attend the NEW HIGH SCHOOL are pupils residing on the east side of Deep Run, on the north side of Route 516, on both sides of Higgins Road, on the north side of Tiecetown Road, on the South Side of Spring Valley Road, on the southwest die of Highway 18 on the west side of English-town Road on the south side of Greystone Road.

Pupils attending the present HIGH SCHOOL, residing on the west side of Deep Run, on the south side of Route 516, on the south side of Ticetown Road on the north side of Spring Valley Road, on the northeast side of Route 18, on the east side of Englishtown Road, on the north side of West Greystone Road, these pupils will attend the present high school. Many of the parents attending the meeting questioned the "accreditation" of the new high school and stated that it would be sometime before the new high school ever received accreditation and that pupils attending the present high school would be accredited and the new school would not be. According to some spokesman pupils from Madison Park and the Laurence Harbor area would attend the new high school which would not be accredited.

Complaints about pupils having to be picked up by their parents from various schools because they the pupils were excluded from transportation.

Once again the Madison Township Board of Education has shown the teachers in the Madison Township School system that there is no chance for advancement in the local school system. The Board of Education has voted once again to choose Department Heads from out of the school system. We believe that this is a definite "slap in the face" for the many dedicated school teachers in Our system. We feel that promotions to department chairmanships should come from the ranks of the teachers presently employed by the Board of Education. At the same meeting of the Board of Education the Board voted to hire thirty-three new teachers---of the group hired eighteen of teachers have no experience in a school system. Once again the Madison Township Board of Education has shown that the present system is merely a training ground for teachers. Mr. Brust can expect additional resignations from his present teaching staff---it is quite obvious what effect this could have on the entire school system---we end with teachers with no previous experience and who are unable to cope with the disciplinary problem in Our School System and you better believe that we have one---and the problem is getting out of hand---residents are also in an uproar about the "ac-

creditation" of the NEW HIGH SCHOOL---this building according to earlier hopes of the Board of Education was supposed to have been ready for occupancy September 1968---from the looks of things at the NEW HIGH SCHOOL site---we sincerely doubt as whether the school will be ready for occupancy by September of 1969---according to one reliable source the NEW SCHOOL is about six months behind in schedule right now and things don't appear to be getting any better---all the plumbing, heating and electrical work remains to be finished---some plan that is acceptable to the Madison Township Sewerage Authority has to be completed---until these things and many other items such as school desks and hundreds of pieces of equipment are purchased, delivered and installed there can be no hope of completion of the NEW HIGH SCHOOL let alone any talk about the occupancy of the high school---if the Board of Education doesn't stop dragging their feet---the opening of the school might take place in 1969---what happens to the present over crowded system??? We think the time is "ripe" for an appointed Board of Education---the present system doesn't seem to be working out to the complete satisfaction of the educational system AND SO IT GOES----
