## Teachers: 400 Strong Brust Must Go! Administrator: 21 Brust Stays

Well once again the teachers in the Madison Township School system are uneasy. The Teacher's Coalition voted to ask for the resignation of Joseph Brust, Madison Township Superintendent of Schools. According to a teacher who declined to be named almost 400 of the teaching staff voted for the ouster of Brust who has been underfire from the teachers as well as many of the residents of the Township since he took his office.

As one school teacher put it in these words "the residents of Madison Township might as well call the Administrative Headquarters on 10 Cindy Street, the Board of Education Funeral Home, because Mr. Brust is killing off some of the best personnel in the school system."

According to many of the teachers involved "the teachers just don't have any faith left in the Superintendent of Schools and the ouster vote is just one way of showing that the teachers in the school system are disgruntled over policy and the administration of the school system."

It has been pointed out on several occasions in the Madison American that the teachers were not happy, many of the teachers claim that salary hasn't anything to do with the teacher unrest, "It's just the system. Many of the teachers who have been employed for several years in the school system will leave the system to seek employment elsewhere, we just can't understand the Board of Education in their backing of Brust."

It must be pointed out that many of the teachers are willing to give statements but many of the teachers are afraid

that if they give any statements out, they might be "black-balled" in other communities.

To add more fuel to the fire 21 out of 22 of the School administrators voted a voice of confidence for Brust. One member of the Teachers Coalition claimed that it was to be expected that the administrators back Brust, claiming that he appointed most of the Administrators involved and they certainly should owe some allegiance to the person that appointed them." One of the sore spots with the teachers in the school system seems to be the reluctance of the Superintendent to appoint department heads and other administrators from the ranks of present teaching staff.

We would certainly say that something is wrong in the school system a parent from Sayre Woods South stated commenting on the latest headlines "I can not believe that the Board of Education should stand behind this man (Brust) when he is constantly the point of bad publicity for the township, for the past 18 months there has been constant unrest with the teachers, over the superintendent of schools, 400 teachers can't be wrong and one man right."

According to some circles there are four members presently on the Board of Education that would vote to fire Brust, but five votes are needed. The only thing overlooked in the entire "war" between the teachers and the superintendent is the youngsters attending school, what also is forgotten in the "shuffle" is that the new high school will not be ready for September 1968.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH, MAINTAIN, REGULATE AND CONTROL THE POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX, AND TO PRESCRIBE AND ESTABLISH JUST RULES AND REGULATIONS RESPECTING SUCH DEPARTMENT."

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Madison, in the County of Middlesex:

1. Section 1 of the above-entitled ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be established a Police force in the Township of Madison, in the County of Middlesex, which shall consist of a Chief of Police, one (1) Deputy Chief of Police, four (4) Captains of Police, five (5) Lieutenants of Police, eight (8) Sergeants of Police, and one (1) full-time Radio Dispatcher, and as many regular and special policemen as the Township Council may deem necessary and by resolution declare. The Chief of Police, one (1) Deputy Chief of Police, four (4) Captains of Police, five (5) Lieutenants of Police, eight (8) Sergeants of Police, and one (1) full-time Radio Dispatcher, and the regular and special policemen shall be appointed as provided by law.

2. Section 5 of the above ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. The regular police appointed by virtue of this ordinance shall constitute and be recognized and obeyed as the Township Police, and shall possess and exercise all the powers conferred by the laws of the State. They shall be faithful and diligent in preserving the public peace, in detecting and arresting within the Township all offenders against any Ordinance of the Township, or laws of the State, in protecting the rights of persons and property, and in maintaining decorum and morality in the public streets and places of resorts and in public assemblages, and in rendering timely and efficient aid and protection in all cases.

There shall be established in the Department a Detective Division. The Chief shall assign for full-time duty in such Division a Captain who shall be in charge thereof, and as many other officers as he deems necessary.

3. If any part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional in a court of competent jurisdiction, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part of provision hereof other than the part so adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional.

4. All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law.

## And So It Goes

Once again tragedy struck a volunteer organization in Our Town. The Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad was struck down by a fire which completely destroyed the Squad's Headquarters located on Laurence Parkway. Lost in the fire which destroyed equipment and supplies were four of the squads ambulances. We can not fully realize the importance of a first aid squad until tragedy strikes and we, are in need of the service of the first aid squad. Needless to say, a first aid squad is not created overnight--members of the squad have to be trained, equipment purchased and a place to house the equipment--the Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad was probably the oldest aid squad in Madison Township. They provided for many years service to the residents of Laurence Harbor-Cliffwood Beach areas and for several years responded to calls in the Madison Park area--until such a time as a first aid squad was formed to serve that area--Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad aided Madison Park in the formation of an aid squad--lending equipment and training facilities. Only last month the Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad responded to a total of 121 calls donating a total of 387 man hours. In the month of April 7,000 pounds of oxygen was used by the first aid squad. No one can deny the importance of a First Aid Squad which respond to fires, motor vehicle accidents, home accidents, hospital transports. Plans are already underway for the start of a Building Fund Campaign--preliminary conferences have already been held with Mr. Hemlin of the Amboy-Madison National Bank--several other First Aid Squads have made offers of aid to the squad--the Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad may be down--but it certainly is not out. The Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad was always ready to help the residents of Our Town--now is the time for the residents of Madison Township to come to the aid of the Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad in their hour of need.
