"THRILL HILL" ADDS ANOTHER YOUTH TO INJURED LIST

According to police, James Kube of 15 Shore Concourse, Cliffwood, a passenger in a car operated by Joseph F. Diniz of 25 Arbordale Drive, Cliffwood, was treated by Dr. Ralph E. Berman of Keansburg for laceration of the scalp and lip and released.

Diniz told police an unidentified car, carrying only parking lights, shot across his path just as he reached the crest of the rise in the road. In an attempt to avoid a collision, Diniz said, he pulled his car to the side and skidded off the road into a ditch.

Diniz was issued a summons for careless driving.

STATE PROBING DEATH OF FISH IN RARITAN BAY

The New Jersey Division of Fish and Game reported yesterday afternoon that a probe of Raritan Bay waters in an effort to determine the cause of fish losses had revealed the losses were not traced to pollution.

The division reported it had checked an endless number of rumors and reports of pollution, dumping and detonation since May 17 when large numbers of bunkers along with some stripers and eels began washing up on the shore.

Visitors to Staten Island waters over the weekend reported the number of dead fish there far in excess of what has been seen locally. Reports that stripers and blues were heavy victims lately were made predominantly from Island waters.

Whatever the cause for the fish losses, the state game division reported, it is now abating according to the results of their investigation.

Two area fishermen's associations, the North Jersey Commercial Fishermen's Association and the Belford Seafood Cooperative Association have also urged the probe of bay waters to determine the cause of an unusual loss of food and game fish in recent weeks.

The New York state Conservation Department has collected samples of the water around Staten Island as well as fish specimens reclaimed from the water.

Oil is often trapped thousands of feet below the surface of the ground in rock formations whose natural pores are so small that the oil cannot move readily through them. To start the much-needed oil moving, petroleum engineers often "acidize" the reluctant well. Hydrochloric acid, which has a dissolving effect on most limestones, is forced under high pressure down the well and into the oil formation. This dissolving action, coupled with the pressure, breaks down

YOUR GARDEN THIS WEEK

Spring came on with a rush this year, bringing many garden jobs to do, seemingly all at once. That extra hour of evening daylight comes as a real time bonus for many a gardener.

Warm days, like some we have been having, dry out the soil and destroy germinating seedlings, particularly those grown from tiny seeds that must be sown almost on top of the ground. When these fine seeds sprout they need moisture right at hand if they are to survive.

Veteran gardeners have found that salt hay is useful for covering seedbeds, but burlap, muslin or similar materials that shade the ground and hold moisture on the surface can be used to advantage. Some of the other materials that might seem to be suitable may hold weed seeds.

Hardy annuals can be transplanted to the open ground now with little worry about frosts, and if you want to gamble, you can even set out the tender ones. But this can be risky, as killing frosts have been recorded in Central and North Jersey as late as May 15.

Be sure, when you transplant, to firm the soil well around roots of plants or water in your plants. That is, wet the plants, press the soil around the roots and apply water or starter solution. When soil presses against roots all around there is less danger of drying out. Old berry baskets turned over young plants protect them from the heat of the day.

Be sure to pinch off some of the leaves of larger plants when you

move them to give roots a better chance to function.

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TEST YOURSELF FOR SAFE DRIVING

Test 2

Which one of the choices given below best completes the statement? Underline your choice. Correct answers are given under the test.

1. Overtaking and passing another vehicle going in the same direction is permissible only when the driver of the overtaking vehicle has an assured clear and unobstructed view of the road ahead for at least 500 feet. This means a driver should overtake and pass: (A) only when he increases his speed enough to pass in less than 500 feet; (B) whenever necessary to get around a slow-moving truck; (C) only when he is sure he has sufficient space and time to pass.

2. Unless traffic is moving in two or more continuous lines in one direction, overtaking and passing another vehicle on the right-hand side is permitted only under one of the following conditions: (A) when the dirt or gravel shoulder is sufficient width; (B) when the vehicle ahead is driving in the left, or inner, traffic lane and fails to give way to the right; (C) when the vehicle ahead is about to turn left.

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PARENTS URGED TO PLAN FOLLOW UP OF POLIO TESTS

Roland J. Hines, chairman of the Monmouth County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has received notice today of plans for polio follow up from the New York headquarters.

The importance of a continuing medical follow up on all children participating in the polio vaccine field trials was stressed today by Dr. Hart E. Van Riper, medical director of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, sponsors of the tests.

Pointing out that many children participating in the polio vaccine trials would be going to summer camps, on vacations, or moving to new areas, Dr. Van Riper said,

"To scientifically evaluate the effectiveness of the trial polio vaccine, it is vital that continuing medical follow ups be made on these children, whether they received vaccine or not. This includes children whose parents did not sign request forms for participation, as these children's health records can help serve as controls.

"If a child in this group goes to summer camp or on vacation and becomes ill after a contact with polio, the local health authorities in the child's home area should be notified. In case families with children in the test group move out of a trial area and one of the children comes down with an illness diagnosed as polio, the parents should inform the local health officials that their child was in a polio vaccine test group. This information should include the name of the child's former school and what part the child played in the trials.

"The cooperation parents give in such situations will facilitate the evaluation and enhance the validity of the test. We are all waiting for the answer to the vital question—will the trial vaccine give protection against paralytic polio under conditions of natural exposure? Your help is needed in arriving at the answer."

TO HONOR DURANT FOR NEWS STORY OF ATTORNEY AID

Daniel E. Durant of the reportorial staff of The Newark Evening News will be awarded an engrossed scroll by the New Jersey State Bar Association at the annual meeting of the Working Press Association of New Jersey at Asbury Park June 5 in recognition of the year's best newspaper story on the legal profession.

The scroll will be presented by Robert J. Tait Paul of Camden, first vice president of the State Bar Association, at the Working Press group's banquet in the Monterey Hotel. Paul will represent Forster W. Freeman, Jr., of Paterson, State Bar Association president who will be on the West Coast to attend a convention.

Durant's award-winning article, under the heading "Costly Legal Service Given Free", appeared in The Newark News October 11, 1953. It described the court-assigned free legal representation assured to defendants who otherwise could not pay for counsel, pointing out that under New Jersey's system "the constitutional right of each defendant to have counsel becomes more than a phrase."

WEEKLY TEST ON CHILD SAFETY

(Feature No. 1)

What's Your Answer?
The New Jersey Weekly
Child Safety Quiz

The question below was asked of 30,000 New Jersey parents recently in a study of parental attitudes toward situations which may prove hazardous to children.

The study was the joint effort of the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers, the New Jersey State Safety Council, the New Jersey State Department of Health, and the National Safety Council.

It is endorsed by the Medical Society of New Jersey and the New Jersey Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

There is frequently more than one solution to a given situation. In the situations used in this series, however, there is one answer which would be the best of the four choices.

Check the answer which you think would be most likely to assure the safety of the child without being an unreasonable imposition on the parent. Then compare your answer with the one given below.

It is a summer day and Mrs. Thompson is alone in the house bathing her 7-month old infant. Next to the bathinette there is a table on which she dries and dresses the child. The doorbell rings. What should she do?

1. Dry the baby, wrap him up in a blanket or large towel and place him on the table next to the bathinette.
2. Place the baby in a sitting position in the bathinette, go to the door and ask the person to wait until she has finished.
3. Quickly dry the baby, wrap him up in a blanket or large

towel and take him with her when she opens the door.

4. Not answer the doorbell.

Dr. Renee Zindwer, Chief of the Bureau of Maternal and Child Health of the New Jersey State Department of Health, who prepared the questions in consultation with the Professional Examination Service of the American Public Health Association, advises as follows with reference to the situation:

We consider number 3 the best choice. If Mrs. Thompson would choose answer number 1, the baby might wiggle and fall off the table while she answers the doorbell. As far as answer number 2 is concerned, it is quite possible that the baby might slide from a sitting position, submerge the head under water, and drown. Since it is summer, we can assume that the outside temperature would be such that the baby would not be exposed to a detrimental temperature change when the mother takes him with her to open the door. Solution number 4 would, of course, be safe, but also cautious beyond necessity. The doorbell may announce an important caller.
