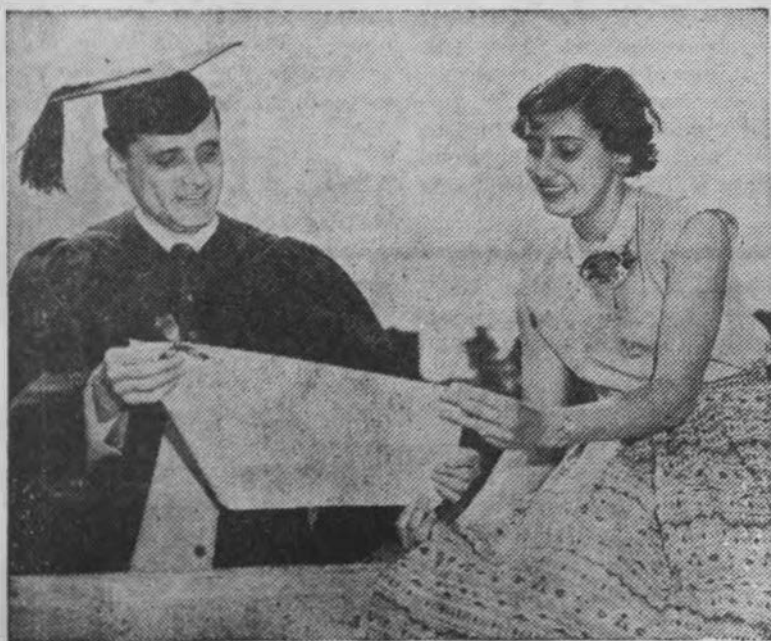

OVER 2,000 SIGN PETITION FOR MOTOR INSPECTION STATION

Over 2,000 motorists throughout the Bayshore area have signed a petition requesting the State Department of Motor Vehicles to provide a vehicle inspection station in this district. Former Keyport Councilman Alfred T. Poling, who instituted action to have an inspection station authorized for the Keyport area in August of last year, disclosed that Motor Vehicle Director William J. Deardon said the inspection station was contemplated and it would also include drivers license testing facilities.

Serious study is being given by state officials to information concerning the population and automobile usage within a six mile radius of Keyport supplied by Mr. Poling in letters to Governor Meyner, Secretary of State Edward J. YOUR GARDEN THIS WEEK

Pruning of woody plants is desirable for their proper maintenance. Many gardeners are not conscious of pruning needs except perhaps in the case of roses, and this is chiefly true with the so-called hybrid tea roses, the bush roses that bloom abundantly in June and late summer.

If pruned properly, and other good cultural practices are followed, the plants will be maintained in vigorous condition. If not pruned, the result will be a matted mass of branches and twigs, some dead, with short-stemmed flowers and smaller blooms.

There is nothing mysterious about pruning, although if you have not had much experience, it would be well to remember what you do and study the results.

Dead canes should be removed as close to the base as possible. Then look over the plant carefully. Canes to be retained should have a bright color. Have side twigs died back to a main cane? If there is a sunken brown or black area at the base of that dead twig, it often indicates disease. Make the cut below such areas.

Remove weak shoots that are thinner than a pencil. Then take out old canes that have brownish or grayish bark. This should leave five to seven strong canes growing from the base of the plant. Cut these back to 12 to 18 inches.

Keep in mind that this type of rose produces its flowers on wood that grows the same season. For this reason it is desirable to have fresh canes develop each year from as close to the base as possible.

In pruning the so-called floribunda roses not much cutting back is necessary. Thin out a few of the oldest canes and cut to remove last year's flower stems that remain.

If you are interested in pruning you can get a copy of "Pruning Shrubs," Bulletin 771 of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station from your county agricultural agent or the bulletin clerk at the Station in New Brunswick. This is free to residents of New Jersey.

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TEST YOURSELF FOR SAFE DRIVING

What Do You Know About Safe Driving? Test 3

Which one of the choices given below best completes the statement? Underline your choice. Correct answers are given under the test.

1. The "right of way" is something that a driver never has, but can always give—for safety. When two vehicles enter an uncontrolled intersection at the same time from different roads, neither of which is a through street, the right-of-way rule is: (A) the driver on the left yields to driver on the right; (B) the driver on the right yields to the driver on the left; (C) the driver on the right always has the right-of-way.

2. A driver entering a through street from a private driveway, alley, or secondary road should: (A) sound horn, then proceed cautiously; (B) look both ways, sound horn, then drive into the street; (C) yield the right of way to all approaching vehicles.

3. Since most accidents occur at intersections, all drivers should know when the law requires them to yield the right of way to others at intersections. MOTORISTS ALERTED
FOR JUNE 14th
DEFENSE TEST

New Jersey regulations for highway transportation during the nation-wide air raid test "Operation Alert" on June 14 were announced today by the New Jersey Division of Civil Defense and Disaster Control.

In a special directive, State Director Leonard Dreyfuss ordered that all vehicles be halted as soon as practicable when the red alert sounds and drivers and occupants seek shelter.

Drivers were cautioned not to stop their cars in the middle of the road but drive to the side of the road or the curb.

Fire engines, ambulances, doctors or volunteer firemen on emergency call will be allowed to continue, the directive said. Doctors and volunteer firemen who are driving their private cars will first have to show proper credentials.

Traffic entering the state from New York and Pennsylvania will be halted at the New Jersey border.

The movement of all highway vehicles will be subject to the control of police authorities on duty at the time of the alert.

Drivers will give consideration to the convenience and safety of passengers in their vehicles in selecting stopping points, with respect to (1) other traffic, (2) availability of public shelters, (3) if no public shelter, availability of any shelter or protections in outlying districts on the open highway.

Drivers and passengers should not, however, attempt to go into private homes during "Operation Alert" as the test is called.

WEEKLY TEST ON CHILD SAFETY

(Feature No. 1)

What's Your Answer?
The New Jersey Weekly
Child Safety Quiz

The question below was asked of 30,000 New Jersey parents recently in a study of parental attitudes toward situations which may prove hazardous to children.

The study was the joint effort of the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers, the New Jersey State Safety Council, the New Jersey State Department of Health, and the National Safety Council.

It is endorsed by the Medical Society of New Jersey and the New Jersey Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

There is frequently more than one solution to a given situation. In the situations used in this series, however, there is one answer which would be the best of the four choices.

Check the answer which you think would be most likely to assure the safety of the child without being an unreasonable imposition on the parent. Then compare your answer with the one given below.

It is family wash day for Mrs. Jones. She has forgotten to set the alarm clock and breakfast was late for her husband and 7-year-old school child. They had to rush to leave the house. Her 1-month-old baby and 5-year-old Johnny are home with her. She is late in starting her wash. It is now time to give the mid-morning feeding to the baby. What should she do?

1. Make the baby comfortable and prop the bottle with a pillow or roll a blanket.
2. Take time to sit down to hold and feed the baby.
3. Make the baby comfortable and place the bottle in a bottle holder designed for the purpose of saving time for a busy mother.
4. Prop the baby up in a crib or carriage and let the 5-year-old hold the bottle for the baby.

Dr. Renee Zindwer, Chief of the Bureau of Maternal and Child Health of the New Jersey State Department of Health, who prepared the questions in consultation with the Professional Examination

Service of the American Public Health Association, advises as follows with reference to the situation:

Despite the fact that Mrs. Jones is obviously rushed and probably somewhat upset about getting a late start she should take the time to sit down and hold and feed the baby (choice number 2). This choice is not only important from the safety viewpoint but also because the baby needs the feeling of security and love which he gets by being held in the mother's arm and close to her while feeding. The other three choices contain a serious risk of choking. Choices number 1 and 3 utilize mechanical devices which cannot be geared to the baby's specific rate of feeding nor watch him, should he vomit, and a 5-year-old child (answer number 4) is too young to assume adequate responsibility.

building campaigns, much of it fringing on the new Parkway route.

In rural sections, Middletown Township, over a section of which the new highway will cross, has been enjoying a phenomenal home-building boom. It topped more than 50 other Monmouth communities in 1953 and was reported forging ahead of last year's record.
