GARAGE FEUD HERE INVOLVES POLICE, OFFICIALS

A minor hassle between two auto towing firms loosed a storm of conflicting charges in Madison Township with members of the police department directly refuting the word of Police Chief Otto Kengetter and Committeeman James Robbins.

Originally a feud between the Charles Wilson Service Garage on Route 35 and the Wegener Auto and Body Works on Matawan Road over who should get the bulk of the accident wrecks on Route 35, the situation mushroomed to include:

1. A threat by Edward Wegener, owner of the towing service, to lodge formal charges against Kengetter and Robbins whom he accuses of attempting to restrict his business by allegedly ordering policemen not to allow his trucks to operate on the highway.
2. A flat denial of this charge by both municipal officials who produced an order dated June 21 directing all patrolmen to give preference in making an accident wreck calls on a staggered weekly basis, beginning with Wegener. Kengetter and Robbins, explaining they were making this move in the interests of "harmony" declared this was the first order given any patrolmen on the matter.

A refutation of the officials' statement by three members of the police department who were reported to have signed an affidavit alleging they had been ordered last Friday to make sure that all breakdowns and wrecks on Route 35 went to Wilson.

FOUR SLIGHTLY HURT AS CARS COLLIDE HERE

Four persons were slightly injured as the result of an accident Thursday night on Route 35 near the Pirate Ship, Cliffwood Beach, Madison Township police reported.

Injured were Thomas English, 4, June English, 14, and Ellen English, 28 months and Anna Hjorth, 24. All were removed to the Perth Amboy General Hospital by the Laurence Harbor First Aid Squad, treated for shock and released.

Ellen, the youngest child in the English car was also treated for minor contusions of the head and back.

According to police the accident occurred when the English car driven by James English, father of the children, of 126 Hilltop boulevard, Cliffwood Beach, crossed the highway at the Pirate Ship and was in collision with a car traveling south on Route 35 operated by Paul Daley of Mechanicsville.

Both drivers were issued tickets for careless driving.

MADISON BOARD MOVES TO LOCATE NEW SCHOOL

Plans for a new school for Madison Township are in the works.

The board of education at its meeting in the Browntown School passed a resolution authorizing the purchase of a 20-acre tract fronting on Route 9 in Browntown known as the Gaub tract to be used as the site of a proposed 26-room central school which it is estimated will cost \$700,000.

Walter Staeger, board president, emphasized this estimated cost includes equipment and furnishings.

The plan for the proposed school will be brought before the township voters in a special election. The plan must also be approved by the Township Committee and the State Department of Municipal Government.

Funds for the construction of the proposed school will necessitate the issuance of a bond issue which will hike the total township indebtedness over the maximum fixed by law and the school board has already contacted the department of municipal government for the necessary permission.

Though 18 classrooms represent the township's minimum need at this time, Staeger explained, plans have been made for 26 classrooms with an eye toward making provision for a junior high school in the future.

The proposed school would house fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade students. The lower grades would continue to attend classes in existing township schools.

Staeger announced he will appoint members of the township's PTAs to act as a public relations committee for the passage of the proposed school plan.

The board also approved all teacher contracts for the 1954-1955 school year.

YOUR GARDEN THIS WEEK

Where the garden is under clean cultivation or can be mulched suitably, it is possible to control annual weeds. The use of hoe, scuffle or Dutch hoe or a rake will serve to destroy annual weeds and seedlings of many perennial weeds.

The introduction into the garden of weed-like plants that spread rapidly by underground rootstocks is dangerous. These in a very short time may kill out more desirable plants and occupy the whole space. Two such plants are Polygonum cuspidatum and Artemisia vulgaris.

Polygonum cuspidatum is often called Japanese Bamboo, probably because of its jointed stem, but it is not related to bamboo, which is a grass. It is a relative of Smartweed, Lady's Thumb and Silver Fleeceline. Some gardeners are attracted by its bold character, but the leaves are large and the texture is coarse.

So, if someone offers you some "Japanese Bamboo," refuse it politely. Once established in the garden, it is difficult to eradicate.

Artemisia vulgaris has no generally accepted common name. Up to the time it is a foot or so high, it can be mistaken for chrysanthemum. It was brought into this country as a ground cover.

As such it worked well, but the planter was soon sorry he had ever started it. So far no selective weed killer has been effective against this pest.

So for both of them, in gardens, the best way to get rid of them is by use of the hoe and plenty of elbow grease. It is possible to kill any plant by destroying its leaves as soon as they form. This prevents the manufacture of plant foods needed for growth. To destroy the two plants mentioned, use a sharp hoe or grub hoe and cut new shoots off as soon as they appear above ground.

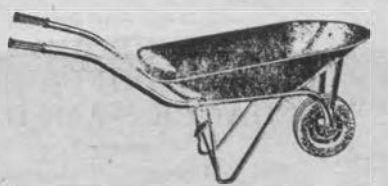

WEEKLY TEST ON CHILD SAFETY

(Feature No. 4)

What's Your Answer?
The New Jersey Weekly
Child Safety Quiz

The question below was asked of 30,000 New Jersey parents recently in a study of parental attitudes toward situations which may prove hazardous to children.

The study was the joint effort of the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers, the New Jersey State Safety Council, the New Jersey State Department of Health, and the National Safety Council.

It is endorsed by the Medical Society of New Jersey and the New Jersey Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

There is frequently more than one solution to a given situation. In the situations used in this series, however, there is one answer which would be the best of the four choices.

Check the answer which you think would be most likely to assure the safety of the child without being an unreasonable imposition on the parent. Then compare your answer with the one given below.

Christmas holidays are just over. Mary, age 3, and Billy, age 5, have received many toys as presents and they are still excited about trying them all out. The toys are scattered about the floor in the living room. The parents should:

1. Tell them not to keep toys scattered on the living room floor but use their own room for that purpose.
2. Provide a storage box or shelves for toys and have the children place the toys in the box when they are through playing with them.
3. Give them each only one toy to play with at a time; whenever they finish with one toy they should return it to the parents in exchange for another toy.
4. Tell the children they can leave the toys out on the floor but they should be careful and watch their step in order not to fall over the toys.

Dr. Renee Zindwer, Chief of the Bureau of Maternal and Child Health of the New Jersey State Department of Health, who prepared the questions in consultation with the Professional Examination Service of the American Public Health Association, advises as follows with reference to the situation:

We consider answer number 2 as the proper one. The reason for not having toys kept on the floor is the danger of tripping and falling. This is true whether the toys lie around in the living room floor or in any other room. Therefore, answer number 1 would not be desirable. Answer number 3 in our opinion would be too restrictive and answer number 4 would be hopeful but not too helpful.

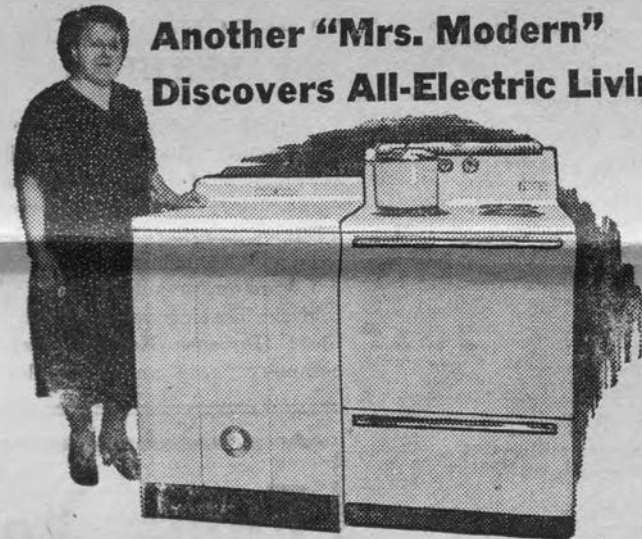

ROLLO BUS ASKS 50 PERCENT HIKE IN FARES HERE

The Rollo Bus Co. of Keyport has asked the Public Utilities Commission for permission to increase its fares up to fifty percent on lines serving Freehold, Matawan and Keansburg.

Company president Peter Rollo told the hearing before PUC President Hortense Kessler that his company faced an annual loss of

almost \$55,000 if the increase were not approved. He stated that even with the new rate the company would lose approximately \$29,000 yearly.

Cross-examination by Mrs. Kessler brought out that the potential loss on the new rate was based on an anticipated drop in passengers of 15 per cent. Rollo estimated a deficit of almost \$5,000 a year if the company lost no passengers. The hearing will resume today (Wednesday).
