Soventeen were paroied under the new law. The workshops, are comfortable and well kept. The work performed by the prisoners is in the line of hostery, shoes, mats, break-es, shirts and pants. The cost of run-ning the prison last year was \$163,452.-55; amount realized by the contracts.
