PLYMOUTH BRETHREN IN CHARGE.

They Are Holding Their Summer Meetings on the Grounds of F. J. Lotzmann, in North Plainfield.—The Meetings Are Open to the Public in the Evening.

A large and pleasant looking house, standing well back from the road and surrounded by a spacious lawn upon which are several tents, is the place where the Plymouth Brethren are holding their meetings. These meetings were begun last Wednesday and will continue until next Monday. They are being held on the property of F. J. Lotzmann, Chatham street, North Plainfield, and the place is admirably situated for the purpose. On entering the grounds, which are at the head of Elm place, on the left is the first tent. This is used for reception purposes and contains among other things writing tables, comfortable chairs, several cases of books and other useful articles. Almost directly opposite is the tent in which the meetings are held, while in its rear is the dining tent. In the center of the grounds stands the house, and in its rear are the stables and garden.

In all there are about four hundred persons present. They have come from Nova Scotia and Canada on the North, from Nebraska on the West, from Louisiana on the South and from Massachusetts on the East. Some, too, are here from Cuba, England and Scotland. All Christian denominations are represented, for the Brethren do not regard one creed as being any better than another. They only require that the members shall be true disciples and followers of Christ, believing in Him with their whole hearts and trying to follow in His footsteps.

The daily routine of the meetings is as follows: In the morning at seven o'clock a prayer meeting is held. Breakfast is served at eight o'clock and at ten o'clock a meeting is held.
