

## TO HER YOUTHFUL HOME

Mrs. Harrison's Body on Route to Indianapolis.

## VERY SIMPLE FUNERAL SERVICES.

All the members of the Cabinet accompanying Secretary Tracy accompany the President on his last journey to his boyhood's home.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—There has been no official recognition by the executive branch of the government of Mrs. Harrison's death, except display at half mast of flags on government buildings. The departments opened this morning the same as on other days, and by the wishes of the family the business of the government is running on as though the country had not lost the wife of its executive.

In the United States supreme court, however, Chief Justice Fuller announced that as a mark of respect to the memory of the United States and to the memory of Mrs. Harrison the court would adjourn until Friday morning.

At about noon yesterday President Harrison for Private Secretary Hallford and said that if it was possible to have the body of Mrs. Harrison brought to the White House he would be glad to see it.

The body of Mrs. Harrison was placed in the cabinet yesterday afternoon and was later quietly removed to the East room, where the funeral services took place this morning.

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## ANOTHER BIG DEAL

Alliance Between the Boston and Maine and Reading Systems.

## THE FORMER PRESIDENT REIGNS

And A. A. McLeod, of the Reading Road, is Chosen to Succeed Him, While Retaining His Present Position.

Boston, Oct. 27.—A great railroad combination, rumors of which have been in the air for several weeks, was consummated yesterday. Particularly interested in the Boston and Maine and Philadelphia and Reading railroads have made a friendly alliance.

This explains the surprising activity which has been going on in the market place of Boston and Maine stock during the past fortnight. Vanderbilt interests were not the purchasers, as currently believed, but President McLeod, of the Boston and Maine, and his associates, and it is known that they have acquired large blocks of the stock. This is the first step in the consummation of the plan.

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## KILLED WITH A STILETTO.

A Mysterious Murder That Puzzles South Jersey Officials.

HAMMONTON, N. J., Oct. 27.—In Atlantic County, that over the hill which divides it from Camden country, a brutal murder was committed. The victim is an Italian woman, and yet her name is unknown.

The woman's body was found on the road leading from the Atlantic city to Camden. She was lying in a pool of congealed blood, and had evidently been dead for some hours. The side of her neck and her throat were lacerated, and four feet from her head a stiletto was found.

The body was brought to this place, and the local authorities are investigating the murder. So far they have learned but little. The woman has not yet been identified. She was about 30 years old, of slender build and four feet ten inches in height. She was seen in this place on Monday, when she purchased some knives and stilettoes and other articles from a man who was selling them.

The woman evidently belongs to the colony of Italian berry pickers who came from Philadelphia recently to work on the cranberry bogs. She was evidently killed by an Italian, but it will be difficult to follow the mystery.

Morey is Merciful. It is understood that at the cabinet council today Mr. John Morley, chief secretary for Ireland, will suggest proposals for the release of all political prisoners in Ireland. The ministerial decision will involve the question of amnesty to the men convicted of dynamite outrages a few years ago. The principal prisoners are confined in English prisons. The conservative papers do not object to the release of the Fenians Mallon and Dowling and the other men who have been in prison for two-thirds of their lives. Even the Right Hon. Henry Matthews, whom some secretaries accused that dynamite might be extended to these men.

Is the Mafia in Philadelphia? PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 27.—The trial of Antonio Manno for the murder of Connelly in Philadelphia in July last, which has been fixed for this week in the court of oyer and terminer, was postponed on account of the absence of material witnesses. It is alleged by Manno's counsel that Manno's friends have been hounded by the police into the Mafia like association and proclaimed the vendetta against any man who will swear in Manno's favor. The Marriage of Edwin Gould. NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Edwin Gould, Boston and Maine, has recently acquired greater facilities, and is building the largest grain elevator in the United States which will be equal in capacity to all the other elevators in Boston combined, and which will be utilized to handle the grain traffic of New York and all routes of the Reading system. It is believed by its friends that the new building is to be constructed in a conservative to both corporations, and that Boston will receive incalculable benefit as the central distributing point for the enormous volume of grain and coal which will reach the city. The aggregate mileage of over 9,000 miles, will carry upon its pay rolls over 100,000 employees.

In an interview regarding the alliance proposed between the Boston and Maine and Philadelphia and Reading systems, it was stated that the entrance of the Reading into the Boston and Maine was of great importance, and that the large expenditure recently made by the Boston and Maine in the acquisition of the property of the McLeod estate was a part of the plan to acquire the Reading system.

McKinley in Pennsylvania. NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Many prominent visitors called at National Republican headquarters yesterday, including Senators Aldrich and Quay, Congressman Quisenberry, of New York, Congressman Baughman, of New York, and B. Alleged Plot to Kill Simpson. WHELAN, Kan., Oct. 27.—Jerry Simpson has been warned that a conspiracy to kill him has been uncovered, and from now until he has completed the tour of his district he will be accompanied by a body guard. Details are given of the alleged conspiracy, including a number of names written in arranging to secure a man to kill Simpson for \$50,000, which was finally done.

Deadly Lebel Rifle. PARIS, Oct. 27.—Admiral Dabney was to the effect that in the recent engagements the Lebel rifle worked with a notable lack of accuracy, and that the slightest protection from the deadly missile, which pierced and killed without warning, was sufficient to save them. The dead will be buried on an immense funeral pyre.
