PRESIDENTIAL FAVORS.

Additional Appointments Sent to the Senate for Confirmation.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Among the nominations sent by the president to the senate yesterday were William Edmund Curtis of New York, to be assistant secretary of the treasury, vice Gen. M. L. Lamborn, resigned; Charles S. Hamlin of Massachusetts, to be assistant secretary of the treasury, vice John H. Gear, resigned; James H. Keels of Illinois, to be controller of the currency, James P. Melne of the District of Columbia, to be assistant treasurer of the United States; T. Stobor of South Carolina, to be second auditor of the treasury; John B. Brawley of Pennsylvania, to be auditor of the treasury for the postoffice department; James S. Willis of Florida, to be deputy fifth auditor of the treasury; John Tracy of New York, to be superintendent of charities for the District of Columbia, vice A. G. Warner, resigned.

TRAMPS BURNED TO DEATH.

The princess thereupon left her mother's house with her family and never to return.
