

## THE MARCH OF LIBERTY.

The Venerated Bell That Heralded Freedom to Our Land.

173 TRIP THROUGH PENNSYLVANIA.

It is taken to the World's Fair at a specially designed car. That All May View It as It Passes By—History of the Trip.

PHILADELPHIA, April 24.—This afternoon the Liberty Bell was taken from Independence Hall to the Pennsylvania Railroad station for the thirty-second and Market streets, escorted by a brilliant parade. The bell was placed on a specially designed truck, drawn by eight horses, all in plumes and shining harness. Around the bell were the four stalwart reserves, whose duty it was to stand by the bell night and day, while it is away from its hiding place in the vaults of the State House. The truck was escorted by a company of soldiers in blue and red uniforms. The parade was a magnificent sight, and the bell was carried with great care and honor.

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## POPE AND EMPEROR.

Meeting of Germany's Ruler with the Prince of the Church.

ROME, April 24.—Cheering thousands crowded the streets yesterday to witness the passage of the Emperor William of Prussia and the Pope. The Emperor, dressed in the uniform of a Prussian general, was accompanied by the Prince of Bismarck and other high dignitaries of the empire. The Pope, dressed in his traditional white and gold vestments, was accompanied by a large retinue of cardinals and bishops. The two leaders of the world met in a friendly and cordial manner, and the Pope expressed his admiration for the Emperor's reign.

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## OFF FOR NEW YORK.
