The number of individual cash donors among the people of Plainfield and North Plainfield contributing to the Hospital during the year was seventy-four, and the amount of such donations \$1,065.

Through the King's Daughters, the Hospital Sunday collections and the Woman's Auxiliary Board many others contribute cash, and others, still, contribute provisions, clothing and other goods sent to the Hospital; in these classes of contributions, however, many of the 74 regular donors are repeated again. More money is needed. This year more than \$600 has been expended in excess of receipts. It is clear that more than 74 regular cash subscribers might be on the Hospital books. In the summer months the receipts are always small. The Hospital begins the new year with almost nothing in the treasury, and something ought to be done.

There have been in the Hospital during the year about 120 patients, who have remained, on an average, 30 days each. This is equal to a constant number of 10 patients in the Hospital every day throughout the year. Besides these there have been treated in the Hospital 58 patients. The Hospital has no endowment, and no debt except a mortgage of \$1,500, on a portion of the Hospital grounds.
