A Deluge in Baltimore
BALTIMORE, June 20.—The last storm with which the city has since the memorable storm of 1870 occurred here Saturday. The rain fell about 2 o'clock. By 3 o'clock it had become a veritable deluge, and next hour and a half four and a half inches of rain fell. The various small streams and about the city, notably Chateworth Run and Harford

rushing torrents, and the dwellings and other buildings along the river inundated. Jones' Falls, the distribution stream which runs through the city, was swollen to an immense volume, overtopping its banks, pouring quantities of water into the lower part of the city. Holiday and other streets were flooded them to the extent of 20 feet. Boats were brought into the city, and people and police in traversing the flooded streets were obliged to investigate the damage. The water destroyed the houses by the flooding of the streets, and the goods stored there were destroyed to the value of \$10,000. A little stream, called the "water house,"
