GOVERNMENT MEDICAL STAFF.
Surgeon and Apointments in the Hospital Service.
WASHINGTON, March 18.—The resignation of Dr. Frederick C. Johnson, chief of the medical staff of the Marine Hospital, has been accepted by the secretary of the treasury, to take effect April 1st.

The quarantine steamer John M. Wood was to be required for service, so as to be ready for the opening of the season of service for the quarantine of the marine hospital at New York, Wash. City, as United States quarantine officer for that port under the act of March 25, 1903. By that act any medical quarantine officer can hold an appointment in the medical staff of the government, and officers for quarantine purposes. Such appointments do not carry with them any compensation.

A board of surgeons has been appointed by the secretary of the treasury for the purpose of recommending an assistant surgeon in the marine hospital service. The board consists of Surgeons Johnson, Johnson, and Johnson, and will meet on the 21st of this month.
