 Verily this is a year of anniversaries. Not only have Americans generally celebrated the inauguration of the Federal government, but many of our States and South American countries have celebrated various events in their history, but few and far between have been the anniversary of their foundation. In short, Americans of all races are powerfully reminded this year that their country is no longer in its youth. In Massachusetts alone there have been celebrated the 150th anniversary of their beginnings.

Of those the 150th anniversary was, however, the most important, because in history is documentary and clear from the start. On the 3d of September the old town called together its citizens and its ancestors to commemorate the fact that the place was incorporated in 1558.
