CHILI SEEMS SO CLOSE TO UCCIE SAM.

A Practical Apology for Insults to Uccie Sam.
THE WHITE, THE REDS WILL WAIT

Secretary Tracy's Fleet of South War ships could not get to Valparaiso in a month, but they will not go unless the Junta gets away again.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—Chili is coming to her senses. The Junta has withdrawn the petty persecutions to which it has been subjected have ceased. Such is the substance of a telegram received from Mr. Egán at a late hour. It is quite probable also that no further attempts will be made to molest the refugees who have sought shelter at the American legation. President Harrison believes that the troubles at Santiago are now practically over. He believes, too, that Chili's backwardness in the first stand taken by this government, and that, had we not acted so promptly, the gravest consequences must have ensued.

Minister Egán's Ultimatum.
The exact nature of Minister Egán's instructions are not made public. It is known, however, that the minister has told the Junta that the United States would tolerate no further indignities either upon itself or the refugees who have sought the shelter of our flag. This brought the Junta to its senses, and according to Mr. Egán's telegram it is now extricating itself as gracefully as possible from its awkward position. The troubles, of course, are not over. More or less action will be required as long as Mr. Egán remains at Santiago, but the acute symptoms have passed.

The Case of the Refugees.
The difficulty growing out of the refugees who have been sent to Valparaiso is an important question to be considered. Notwithstanding the fact that the German minister operated the doors to the refugees, and that Baltimore, the most conspicuous refugee of the group, sought safety at the Argentine legation, it is still a question with the administration whether Mr. Egán ought to have pursued the course he did.

This, however, was a minor matter so long as the Junta showed a disposition to insult and annoy our representative. The president's first determination was to let the national honor be sacrificed to accomplish the rest of the problem in a matter of comparatively easy solution.

The President was of the opinion that at the cabinet meeting it was suggested that perhaps the persecution of Mr. Egán ought to be regarded as a minor matter and not be construed as an insult to the United States. To this the president is said to have assented.

From Minister Egán's dispatches and from those of Captain Schley of the battleship, the Junta placed a guard around the American legation at Santiago and arrested a number of Chilean sailors. The Junta also put a guard around the Baltimore to prevent refugees from going aboard and Captain Schley complained of insolent and harsh treatment generally of the officers and men of the vessel and of the sailors in the legation. There seems to be no doubt that the Junta has been unnecessarily severe and uncivil in its treatment of the refugees.

The Uprising in Guatemala.
CITY OF MEXICO, via GALVESTON, Texas, Sept. 30.—A dispatch by courier to New Orleans, from the frontier, from Guatemala and having diplomatic origin, fully confirms the reports that the revolution in Guatemala is now in progress. It seems that Manuel Martinez, the son of a former Guatemalan minister in Washington, and a Spanish officer of the army, addressing the multitude on Sept. 15, which is Independence Day, when groups of his remarks were cheered by the multitude, and a struggle commenced for the possession of the platform.

Another Louisville Bank Failure.
LOUISVILLE, Sept. 30.—The Kentucky Savings bank, the fourth bank that has failed in Louisville since six months, has closed its doors. Unlike the other failures, however, the depositors in this instance will be paid in full.

Give Her Life for Her Child.
LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Sept. 30.—Thomas Hamberger, while endeavoring to save his four-year-old son, who had strayed on the track of a runaway train, was struck by a car and instantly killed. The child was fatally injured.
