CRADLE SONGS.

AS THEY ARE SUNG BY DIFFERENT NATIONS.

Beautifully Portrayed in the Congressional Church Sunday School Last Evening by Ladies of Plainfield.—A Large Attendance.



A series of tableaux entitled "Cradle Songs of Nations" were given in the Congressional Church Sunday school last evening. The tableaux began at eight o'clock and lasted an hour and a half. The young ladies of the church portrayed the characters, being ably assisted in the arranging by Mrs. Patton and Mrs. Jackson.

It was a decidedly novel entertainment throughout, and no doubt all mothers present were glad to see and hear how their babies were in the far-away countries yet their babies to sleep.

The following order was observed in presenting the tableaux:

INDIAN.
The Indian Mother. Miss Poles.

The setting represented the wild outdoors of the far west. The Indian, with the tent at one side, Gypsy kettle with stirring stick, a large Indian blanket, and fastened to a tree the papoose on a board.
