

HELPS IN TROOPS

Pennsylvania's National Guard Massed at Homestead.

WON UNION MEN COME NEXT

As They Thought They Will Be Brought in Under Cover of the Militia.

The soldiers are ordered not to fire without a command from the officers in charge, but if the order is given they are to shoot to kill. The strikers were to receive the militia with open arms. Two of the soldiers were in the line.

Homestead, Pa., July 12.—By the time the entire National Guard of Pennsylvania was gathered in Homestead, the maneuver was very ably managed by the military authorities. The entire army disembarked at Bryansburg, on the river and was then sent to Homestead. They quietly ascended the bridge and entered the town. There is a pool authority for believing that the plan of campaign includes the installing of sentinels men in the Carnegie mills within a few hours.

READY FOR THE TROOPS.

The Homestead Workmen Vote to Receive Them with Open Arms. Homestead, Pa., July 12.—At the mass meeting of strikers it was decided to receive the militia with open arms. All the workmen were directed to assemble in the Carnegie mill and to receive them with hands and music to the rendezvous. The greatest en-

thusiasm marked the meeting, and the name of Governor Pattison was frequently cheered. The mass meeting effected a remarkable change in the conditions of the strikers.
