CITY COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR MEETING FOR AUGUST HELD LAST EVENING.

Petitions to Have Madison Avenue Extended.—A. W. C. T. V. Drinking Fountain.—Election Officers.—Secrets to be Macadamized.—Richmond Street Renamed Norwood Avenue.—Peace Street Commission, etc.

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last night.

There were present President Glavin, Councilmen Bird, Case, Johnston, Miles and Ben.

Contrary to expectation the street railway matter was not taken up. President Thomas Nevins and John H. Brown, vice-president of the railway company, were on hand, but their skillful lobbying was not productive of results.

After the calling of the roll, the minutes of the last four meetings were read and approved.

A petition presented by George H. Isabook and William M. Hillman to have Madison avenue extended so as to connect Duerr street was then read by the clerk and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A petition was received from Stephen Baldwin, Tweedy & Co., T. J. Curry, G. W. Moore and others, asking that the house of Eugene O'Connor, at the corner of Duerr and Madison streets, be removed so as to make room for the proposed street, and also one from the Methodist Episcopal church, opposing the removal of the house on the ground that it was a nuisance. These were also referred to the Street Committee.

Mrs. Tomlinson, President of the Women Christian Temperance Union, requested the Council on behalf of the Union, to be allowed to place a drinking fountain on Peace street opposite the Friends meeting house. Referred to Street Committee.

Mr. Marsh submitted the list of names of election officers. Councilman Frazer's name was on the list, and his having to present his own name and report upon it created considerable amusement.

GARWOOD.

THE NEW STATION FOR A NEW TOWN IN THIS COUNTY.

Over \$180,000 to be Expended Within the Next Six Months for Buildings and Machinery, and 800 Men to be Employed. The Enterprise Inaugurated by a Wide-Awake Plainfield.

Men are busy making a clearing at Garwood, the new station between Cranford and Westfield, which is soon to be a busy hive of industry as a result of the enterprise of a popular Plainfield gentleman, Major J. C. Paul of East Fifth street, who as the President of the American Co. of Boston, Mass., some months ago purchased three hundred acres at the place referred to, giving it the name Garwood, in honor of the treasurer of the company.

The contracts for the new buildings and machinery, will aggregate about \$150,000, and the buildings are to be completed within ninety days from July 1st. In view of the fact that the clearing is only now under way, this might seem considerable work in so short a time, but the buildings are to be principally of iron and steel, now being manufactured.

The wheels of the machinery, which are of solid steel, manufactured by a new process, have been adopted by the Reading system, the elevated roads of New York, and a number of other railroads throughout the country, and find a ready market as rapidly as they can be turned out.

The Hill Signal Company have also purchased a tract of land adjoining the Steel Company's land, and will spend about \$80,000 for their plant.

Both concerns will give employment to about 800 persons, and be a valuable addition to the industries of Union county.

The works will probably be in operation by December 1st.

The Ford Machine Tool Co. of this city are supplying some of the machinery to be used.

The company have reserved twenty acres for a future manufacturing concern, which will come under later, and help increase the importance of Garwood as a manufacturing town.

The Steel Company's works when completed will employ about 1000 men, and besides making other steel castings for railroads.

If you cannot talk of poetry, of literature, of music or of any other of the things of all of the mighty social, economic and political questions with which our generation wrestles, or of the wonderful scientific and psychological discoveries of the times, or anything else that the sage of Selby Jones first child, and learn something of them. The Fanatical Congress.
One of the most important and impressive of all the international conventions to be held at Chicago during the World's fair will be the congress of all religions. One hundred of the most eminent preachers of Europe and America constitute its advisory committee. Leading scholars and representatives of the world's modern historic faiths will be there to expound their own special theology. The Christian, Hindu, Protestant and Catholic, will shake heads with the followers of Confucius, Buddhism, Brahman, Parsee and Mohammedan. TO POSTPONE THE VOTE

A Democratic Caucus on the Appropriation for the Fair
DECIDES TO PUT IT OFF TILL FALL

The Minority Threatens to Refuse and Continue the Deadlock—The Sundry Civil Appropriation Extended After a Hot Battle in the House.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—The action in the house was long and noisy, but a week past, the debate on the resolution extending the appropriation until Aug. 4 for carrying out the provisions of the act of March 3 next. They would continue to insist on carrying out the will of the majority. Representative Dutton agreed with the sentiments expressed by his colleague.

If this programme be carried out the cause of the world's fair will be delayed, and the friends of the World's fair appropriation in the place of its opponents.

Water's Charge.
