CHARLESTON, Aug. 30.—The election for state officers, congressmen and presidential electors virtually occurs in this state today, when the Democratic primary is held. There are two tickets in the field—one headed by J. C. Shephard, conservative Democrat, for governor, and the other by B. K. Tillman, who represents the Alliance. The Tillmanites claim to be able to carry the state by 3,000 majority. The conservative claim to be sure of 150 out of the 330 delegates who will constitute the state convention. The campaign has been the most bitter that has been known in this state since 1876.

Chicago Winner. From AMERICA'S 30th state administration was knocked out in the Democratic primary elections. In the Third congressional district, the Chicago Mayor, Richard Daley, secured a majority of the delegates to the ward delegate conventions. It is expected that he will carry five of the 10 wards comprising the district, and his friends claim that he has secured seven. Daley was opposed by Assistant District Attorney William W. McGowan, whose nomination came being sponsored by the state administration, including National Chairman Hanesly.

The Disease in England.
LONDON, April 12.—A death occurred to-day at Bolton, Lancashire, twelve miles from Manchester. Ida Sanyan, a Russian woman from Hamburg, was admitted into the hospital at Bolton, where she was nursed by Caroline Lane, an English girl, aged twenty, who was also admitted to the London hospital, believed to be suffering from the same disease.

John Carr, a seaman on the infected steamer Gerona, from Hamburg to Middlesbrough, died in Middlesbrough of Asiatic cholera, after suffering from the disease for five days with disinctness. The hearse took the body directly to the graveyard and the coffin was lowered into the grave without any religious ceremony. The nurse, the surgeon and his assistants attended the funeral.

On account of the cholera, the steamship service of Daniel Carr & Co., to Hamburg, London and South Africa, has been suspended. The chief stevedore here at Hull has written to the agents in London, the company, to refuse all applications for passengers intending emigrants.

The Disease at Berlin.
BERLIN, Aug. 30.—Several cases of cholera have been reported from Berlin, the German capital. The epidemic is said to be spreading from Hamburg as there have taken ten cases in the last few days. The outbreak of Asiatic cholera is reported from Westphalia, a military of the empire. The number of cases in the city is twenty.

A Cure for Cholera.
BERLIN, Aug. 30.—Fritz Frohnert, who was the first person in Berlin that contracted cholera, has been saved by being inoculated with cholerae sodium, a preparation advocated by Professor Koch.

Banker Redfern Fails.
LONDON, Aug. 31.—Redfern, Alexander & Co., importers and bankers of London, have failed. The firm have failed owing to liabilities amounting to £250,000.
