The man was a big, strong, muscular man and he soon had the best of his adversary, but he had not counted on there being more men in the house and he was suddenly hit from behind by one of the man's companions, of which there were two.

The three men started off last night, but Stewart, when he found they were getting the best of him, pulled out his revolver and began to shoot. This was too much for the robbers, and they started on a run, with the marshal in pursuit.

They proved to be too well armed to be taken by the marshal, however, and he was left in the lurch. But Stewart did not give up, he followed them, and finally secured one of the trio. This one he captured, but the other two may be taken at any time.

As no one would accept the chairmanship Mr. Dayton elected himself to fill that position. Mr. Louis H. Brown was elected to the position of Secretary and Mr. Brown and Mr. Dayton were appointed as judge and inspector, respectively, but they were not kept very busy counting the votes.

The first nomination was for mayor. Delegate Loughlin nominated Mr. Otto Brown for that office. The second nomination was for recorder, and Mr. Brown was not present that it was all wrong, unless the delegate had the person's consent, as he himself had been placed in that position.

Mr. Brown said he was positive Mr. Brown would not accept a nomination, as his health would not permit. Mr. Brown's name was not accepted.

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LIZZIE BORDEN MAY GO FREE.

Belief that the grand jury will not indict Lizzie Borden for the murder of her father, Andrew Borden. It is quite certain that on new evidence of her jury, the evidence is not considered sufficient to warrant the holding of an indictment. There is yet nearly a week for unearthing fresh evidence, and in that time enough may be gathered to make the case as an entirely different affair. As conditions are now the chances for Miss Borden's early release from confinement are bright. If she is indicted and the jury at that trial fail to convict there would be little hope of ever bringing her before the court again, even though she should be charged with the murder of her father. If the grand jury sets her free it does not mean that she is forever charged with the crime, she can be hauled up at any time on a new charge, provided there is at the time fresh and convincing evidence against her. The probabilities are strongly in favor of her going free.

FOUR MEN HELD UP.

Worked Wasted and Bashed His Head With a Gun. DANVILLE, N. J., Nov. 26.—The grand jury of Danville, N. J., held up Dr. J. J. Correll, of the same place, covered him with a shotgun, and caused him to sign a check for \$1000, for the use of the First National bank of this city. Next morning to Grover Brown, of Danville, and advised him with his shotgun, made him write out a check for \$1000. The work was done by Undertaker Vorhis and demanded that he write a check for a similar amount, but the undertaker talked him out of it. The robber proceeded to Dr. Smith's office, and demanded a check for \$1000 on penalty of death. At this point a constable arrested him.

Train Robbers at Work.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 26.—The Portland and Seattle train on the Northern Pacific railroad was held up near Hot Springs by three masked men, who robbed all of the male passengers in the Pullman sleeper. Warden, six in all. They secured \$1300.

DANVILLE, Ky., Nov. 26.—Samuel Worthen, joint agent for the Louisville and Nashville and East Tennessee, Virginia and Georgia railroads at Jellico, Tenn., was assassinated at midnight last night by an unknown party.

THE BREAKERS BURNED

Cornelius Vanderbilt's Newport Villa Goes Up in Smoke.

THE VANDERBILT'S NARROW ESCAPE

They Tried to Save a Few Things and Were Nearly Entrapped by the Flames. The Silver and Jewels Placed in the Mansion's Big Safe.

NEWPORT, R. I., Nov. 26.—"The Breakers," the beautiful summer residence of Cornelius Vanderbilt, was burned to the ground between 4:30 and 6 p. m. It was the greatest fire Newport ever knew and destroyed thousands of spectators.

At 4:30 a servant notified Mr. and Mrs. Vanderbilt, who were entertaining Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Wharton in the library, that the house was filled with smoke. The servant was ordered to have the firemen notified by telephone. Mr. Vanderbilt followed the man down the hall, but upon reaching a minute later flames were bursting into the hall from all directions.

Mr. and Mrs. Vanderbilt tried to save a few personal relics, and in doing so nearly lost their lives. In five minutes the house was a mass of flames, and in less than an hour it was nearly consumed.

The firemen were powerless. Mr. Vanderbilt stood by and encouraged them for a time, when he gave it up and told them the building must go. Only a small part of the servant's wing was saved.

The 50th Alarm a Mistake. A great error was made in sending a full alarm, rather than a regular alarm. The delay was costly. Another serious drawback was the lack of water pressure.

All the rich tapestries, rare paintings, valuable bric-a-brac and fine decorations and furnishings were beyond rescue. The house was built about a dozen or fifteen years ago for Pierre Lorillard, of New York, and was purchased, with the contents, by Mr. Vanderbilt in 1880 for \$400,000. More than \$100,000 was expended in additions and improvements to the building.

The villa was of irregular shape, about 100 feet in size, from one end to the other, in height, the lower part being of brick and the upper of wood, with numerous towers and turrets.

The character of the furniture and decorations by judgment from the fact that in a single hall were hung tapestries estimated to be worth \$50,000 and more. Members of the family and servants alike lost their clothing.

Silver and Jewels Saved. Mr. Vanderbilt and family found temporary refuge in the garden's cottage on the premises, and were afterward entertained by neighbors. Mr. Vanderbilt could give no accurate estimate of his loss, which he said was largely covered by insurance through New York brokers.
