

INJUNCTION GRANTED EASTER SUNDAY.

BY CHIEF JUSTICE HENSLY ON SATURDAY.

Stopping the Plainfield Street Railway from extending its road on Somerset Street, from Front Street to the Brook.

The New stated on Saturday that an injunction would probably be asked for to prevent the Plainfield Street Railway Company destroying Somerset street with its tracks.

On Saturday Chief Justice Denby of the Supreme Court granted Lawyer W. K. McClure a writ of certiorari in the suit of Mr. T. M. French against the city of Plainfield and the Plainfield Street Railway Company ordering them to surrender before April 10th, the ordinance locating the street railway tracks on Somerset street, between Front street and the Brook. This writ will serve as an injunction preventing the laying of the tracks until further orders from the Court.

The ground on which the writ was granted is that the company never secured the consent of the land owners. A gentleman who resides in North Plainfield and has been heartily in favor of the railway to-day castigated the street railway project on the sides of the street preparatory for use. He says that they are not the same as the company's representative exhibited at the City Chamber, which last with general approval, as it was seen such rails would not damage vehicles. This, however, is not the case with the rails to be laid, which in his judgment and the judgment of others will be sure to wreck on carriages wheels.

LOCOMOTIVE SPARKS.

Set fire to a Trestle and a Barn Yesterday.

THREE ALARMS OF FIRE

TWO IN THE CITY AND ONE IN THE BOROUGH SATURDAY NIGHT.

A Large Explosion in Accountable for One, and the Lasting Ice House the Cause of the Other Two.

Residents of the city and borough were startled Saturday night by three alarms of fire within an hour. Two were sounded in the city and one in the borough. The first alarm was given at eight o'clock from box 18, corner of Front and Richmond streets. The fire was in a house on East Third street, owned by Mr. Thorn and occupied by a family named Richter.
